I believe this would merit your consideration in casting your ballot in my behalf on August 25th.


I have been opposed . . .

Hand Sures Some States

At the time of the signing of the above endorsement, it was contemplated that there might be a vacancy in the District Judge's office. The vacancy did not occur, but the endorsement of Allen Harp by Williams, Broughton and Forbis, not for District Attorney but for the higher office of District Judge, clearly shows the real respect they held for Allen Harp's character and ability before they decided they wanted to take the job of District Attorney away from him and appropriate it to their own law firm. With very few exceptions the lawyers of the 100th Judicial District signed this endorsement. The lawyers whose signatures appear on the above endorsement have not been contacted with reference to an endorsement in this particular race and their signatures thereto does not necessarily mean that they are supporting Allen Harp in this campaign.

During this campaign Allen Harp's character has not only been attacked but even his political affiliations have been misrepresented. The Forbis forces would have the loyal Democrats believe that I am a Republican. At the same time Mr. Forbis admits that he voted for Eisenhower. His campaign manager in Carson County is Friday Hughes, the Carson County Republican Chairman. Mr. Hughes has been taking Forbis to various towns in Carson County seeking support for him. I have never voted anything but the democratic ticket in my life and those who are close to me know this to be a fact. Many of the people and acts of the Democratic Party have not pleased me, but I have always felt that the interest of Texas and the

South were best served by the Democratic Party. The fact that all four of my great grandfathers were confederate soldiers could have something to do with my attitude.


