Team Wins Two Warm-Up Games

The Bovina High School Mustangs scored a 99-77 win over the Whitharral Panthers in a warm-up game played here Friday evening.

Scott Scaff and Manuel Porras got the scoring started. Scaff scored three baskets and three from the foul line, and Porras added a pair from the field and three at the line as Bovina opened up with a 25-18 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Denver Riddle picked up the scoring obligation in the second quarter, hitting three baskets and six of eight from the foul line—a 12-point effort, to pace Bovina to its 49-43 halftime lead.

Kenny McLaughlin hit a three-point goal in the quarter. The Panthers had outscored Bovina, 25-22 during the stanza.

Scaff and Porras returned from intermission with their scoring touch. Each scored five baskets, and Scaff added two from the line as the Mustangs poured in 30 points in the quarter and regained the momentum to take a 79-62 lead.

Porras continued with three more baskets, and Shaun Pinkston came in to score three baskets in the fourth quarter as the Mustangs rolled to their 25th season win against only five defeats.

Porras had his best scoring night of the season with 25 points, matched by Scaff. Riddle scored 15 and Pinkston 13 to pace the scoring.

The Mustangs were somewhat hampered by fouls. Porras fouled out, and Scaff, Woot Sudderth and Pinkston all finished with four fouls each.

Bovina connected on 18 of 25 from the free throw line. Whitharral hit 23 of 34 from the free throw line. Their Myatt took game scoring honors with 34 points, including five three-point goals and nine of 13 from the line.

It was only the sixth loss of the season for Whitharral, which had won 22 games prior to Friday.

"Whitharral had a great outside shooter, but I thought we handled them well. Our kids were working their fast break almost to perfection," said Coach Marks Lanham.

The BHS Mustangs downed Klondike, another playoff-bound team, 79-51, in a practice game at Smyer Monday night.

Last Tuesday, the team lost a 79-65 decision in a warm-up game against Lubbock Christian High School in a game at Lubbock.

In the game at Smyer, the team had good scoring balance, as five different players scored in double figures.

"Our fast break was working well," said Coach Marks Lanham. "We were running it well against Whitharral, and continued to do so Monday," the Mustang coach said.

Scott Scaff led the scoring with 16 points; Woot Sudderth had 15; Manuel Porras 14, Denver Riddle 12 and Shaun Pinkston ten.

In the LCHS game, the Eagles soared to 33 first-quarter points and took a 33-23 lead.

Bovina played on even terms with the Lubbock team the rest of the way, but never could make up the early deficit.

Porras scored 16 for game scoring honors; Scaff had 14 and Riddle 13.

Commissioners Will Divide School Funds

A four or five-year battle between the county's schools and the County Commissioners Court over the disposition of the Permanent School fund culminated this past Monday when the court voted in favor of dividing up the nearly \$1 million between the four Parmer County School districts.

Parmer County is one of a handful of counties in the state which still had a Permanent School fund, and the money has been a political football for about as long as it has existed.

For many years, the four school districts have received the interest from the money each year. However, one of the arguments by the Friona School officials in favor of disbursing the funds is the fact that the state might begin to deduct the amounts received in interest from the state funds that the schools receive.

The money must be used either for permanent improvements or to pay off bonded indebtedness, and cannot be used for operating expenses.

In the vote to disburse the funds,

three commissioners voted in favor: Ernest Anthony, Tom Ware and Robert White. Raymond McGehee of the Lazbuddie precinct voted against.

In previous recent votes, McGehee and Anthony had been opposed, and County Judge Porter Roberts has broken the tie by voting against. Anthony indicated that he had changed his attitude on the matter after spending several weeks polling his constituents, who indicated they favored dividing up the fund.

Friona Schools had led the drive to divide up the fund. School board president Jerry Hinkle listed capital needs of the district as: an overpass over the highway for junior high students crossing Highway 60; repairs at the athletic stadium, and bigger administrative offices.

Superintendent Hal Ratcliff was the main spokesman for the county schools. He pointed out that the state could pass a law to get the money from the county, and that the state has mandated more programs and more construction, for the 1-22 teacher-pupil ratio, and for the gifted-talented program.

The fund will be divided up according to a "scholastic count." The exact figures aren't available, but Friona should receive roughly 51 per cent; Farwell 19 per cent; Bovina 19 per cent and Lazbuddie 11 per cent.

Mustangs, Lakeview Meet In Playoffs

The Bovina High School Mustangs will be competing in bi-district Friday, February 24 at the Amarillo High School Activity Center, at 34th and Bell, beginning at 7 p.m. The team will be playing Lakeview.

Admission prices will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. District passes will be accepted.

A pep rally will be held about 3:15 p.m. Friday afternoon at the high school gym, and everyone is urged to attend.

Coach Marks Lanham says the Mustangs are excited about playing. "It seems like it's been forever, since the end of district. I think we'll be ready," Lanham said.

The Mustang mentor said that he has been pleased with the way the team has been running its fast-break in their practice games during the past week.

Bovina takes a 26-5 record into the bi-district match, and

Lakeview has compiled a 17-10 record.

Lanham was able to watch the Hall County team play one game. He says they have one player who hit five three-point baskets the night he saw them play, plus a 6-4 and a 6-3 player. "They like to run. We're hoping they'll run with us," Lanham said.

Coach Lanham supplied statistics Tuesday which showed that senior Scott Scaff has scored 22.8 points per game. Scaff has hit 56.7 per cent of his field goals, 69.1 per cent of his free throws and pulled down 16.5 rebounds per game with 3.2 assists.

Denver Riddle has scored 15.2 points per game. He has converted 43.8 per cent of his field goals, 70.3 per cent from the free throw line, added 6.8 rebounds and 2.3 assists per game.

Woot Sudderth has scored 11.6 points per game. He has hit 35.9 per cent from the floor, 77.2 per cent from the line, 3.7 rebounds and 6.4 assists per game.

Freshman Corey Kirkpatrick has scored 8.9 points per game. He has hit on 32.5 per cent from the field,

53.4 per cent from the line, hauled in 6.3 rebounds and 2.0 assists.

Manuel Porras has scored 8.1 points per game. Porras has hit 34.7 per cent of his field goals, 55.3 per cent of his free shots; has 1.5 rebounds and three assists.

Kenny McLaughlin has scored 4.3 points per game. His figures are 37.6, field; 31.8, line; 2.5 rebounds and 2.4 assists.

Shaun Pinkston has added 3.6 points per game, hitting 38.7 and 60.7 per cent, with 4.2 rebounds and 2 assists.

Bud Venable has scored 2.5 points per game, with 35.2 and 39.3 in the shooting department, with 2.8 rebounds and .2 assists.

Randy Stone is averaging 1.7 points, 33.3 and 31.5 in shooting, with 2.9 rebounds and .04 assists.

Pete Quiroga is averaging just under a point per game, with 16.2 and 0.0 in shooting, with .75 rebounds and .55 assists.

As a team, the Mustangs are averaging 79.6 points per game. They are hitting 40.4 per cent from the field and 62.6 from the line, with 33.6 rebounds and 19.5 assists.

Area Gets Good Rain

The Bovina area received the most beneficial moisture of the calendar year last Thursday night into Friday morning, when almost an inch of rain was measured locally.

The best part about the rain was that it fell very slowly, and every drop should have counted. The temperature at the time the rain was falling was just a degree or so above freezing; otherwise the moisture would have fallen in the form of snowfall, and could have approached ten inches.

The amount of moisture received varied throughout the area, and seemed to have been heavier as you travelled south, and somewhat lighter to the north.

A farmer in the Rhea area indicated that he received .6 inch while those to the south received a little more. The measurement at Friona's weather station was .66 inches, with another .09 inches measured Monday night of this week with a rain-snow mix.

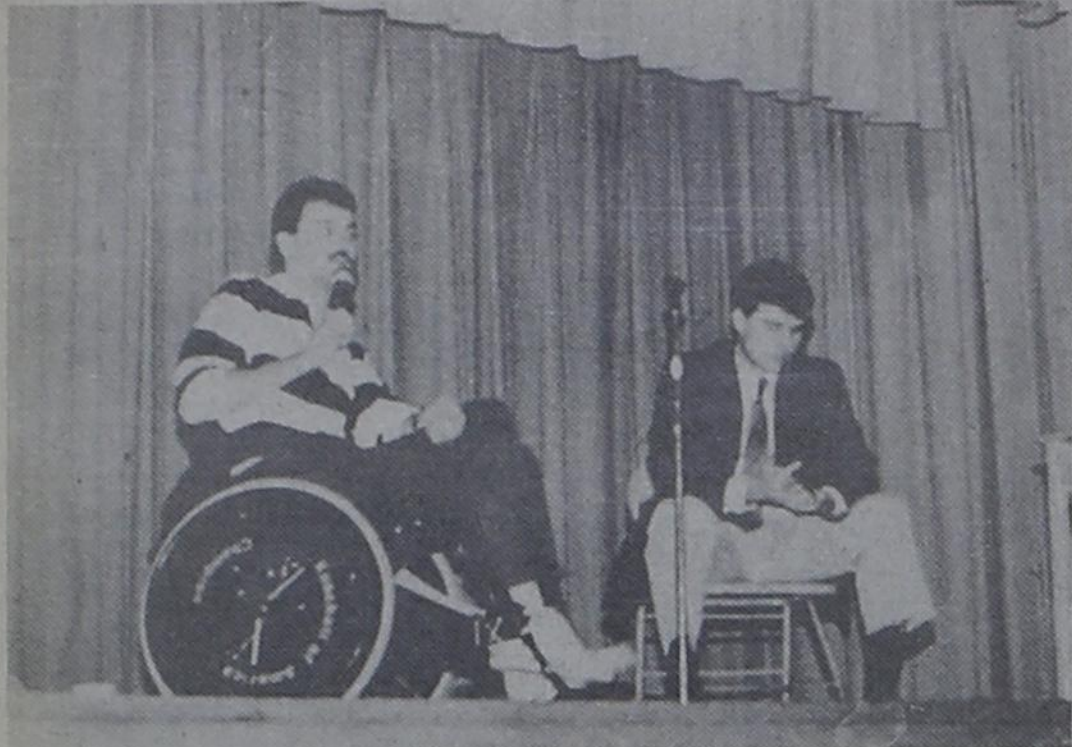

"Wheels" Group Has Advance Meeting

Rick Orluk and Jeff Worthington talked to students in an assembly on Monday of this week.

These men are enroute two weeks ahead of the tour entourage. Bill Duff is crossing the United States in one continuous route through thirteen states, averaging 50 miles per day over a six month period in a wheelchair.

The tour began Tuesday, January 17, in Los Angeles and will conclude in early July, 1989 in New York City.

The goals of Wheels Across America tour are: to create greater understanding and awareness of the potential of disabled persons and to raise funds for spinal cord injury research at the Miami Project to Cure Paralysis.

Bill Duff, nationally-ranked wheelchair athlete, in conjunction with the Miami Project, is from Houston and has been a paraplegic since 1982.

Sponsors for the trip across America include the Burger King Corporation, Eastern Airlines, Hilton Hotel Corp., National Car Rentals, Nestle Crunch and Pepsi Cola.

These men are taking part in the Miami Project to Cure Paralysis, the world's largest, most comprehensive commitment to finding a cure for paralysis. The project is a scientific campaign based at the University of Miami's Jackson Memorial Medical Center, historically unprecedented in dimension. Its goal is to find a cure for paralysis.

Worthington talked to the students about his own accident that caused him to be paralyzed and is now in a wheelchair. He was involved in an accident where the driver and himself had been drinking and the vehicle ran into a utility pole.

He spent three months in the hospital and many months in rehabilitation. He was a sophomore at college at the time of the accident, but did finish college.

On March 1, Bill Duff will be coming through Bovina and will be stopping on the parking lot at Bovina Supermarket. Hopefully there will be a good crowd to visit with him. He will be stopping in Farwell before getting to Bovina.

The TV Show, *Good Morning America*, and the *Today Show* will be catching up with Bill at approximately the mid-way point of his journey and some will be in Farwell on March 1.

Boys Place In State Contest

Three local boys placed in the State Computer Literacy Contest for the fall of 1988. They were Darren Hromas, Donnie Grissom and Kody Wilson.

Darren Hromas, an eighth grade student, placed first in the area and seventh in state. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Galen Hromas. There were 815 students tested

statewide and 163 in the area.

Donnie Grissom was the seventh grade student who placed second in the area and fourteenth in state. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Grissom. There were 267 tested statewide and 27 in the area.

Kody Wilson was the sixth grade student to enter the contest and placed first in the area and eighth in the state. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gregg Wilson. There were 136 students who took the test statewide.

Gladys Spring teaches the class and said the boys took the test last November and there were students of large schools as well as smaller schools who entered the contest, sponsored by the Texas Computer Education Association.

Training Is Offered For Child Care

New Test Slated For Students

High school students who plan on entering college this fall are now required to pass a new test before they can enter college.

The Texas Academic Skills Program (TASP) test will be given to all students attending a public college or university in Texas and is designed to ensure that all students have the reading, mathematics and writing skills necessary to perform effectively in college-level course-work.

A student who does not pass all sections of the test (reading, math and writing) must participate continuously in a remediation program in the subject area not passed.

A student cannot graduate from a certificate program, an associate degree program or a baccalaureate degree program if they have not passed the test.

Students who have earned three semester hours prior to the fall of 1989 will not be required to take the test. The TASP takes the place of the Pre-Professional Skills Test (P-PST) for students planning to major in education.

Forms and information for registering for the test are available in the high school counselor's office. Registration fee for the test is \$24 and registration forms must be postmarked by May 13 for students planning to take the test on June 10.

The test will be given at college campuses around the area.

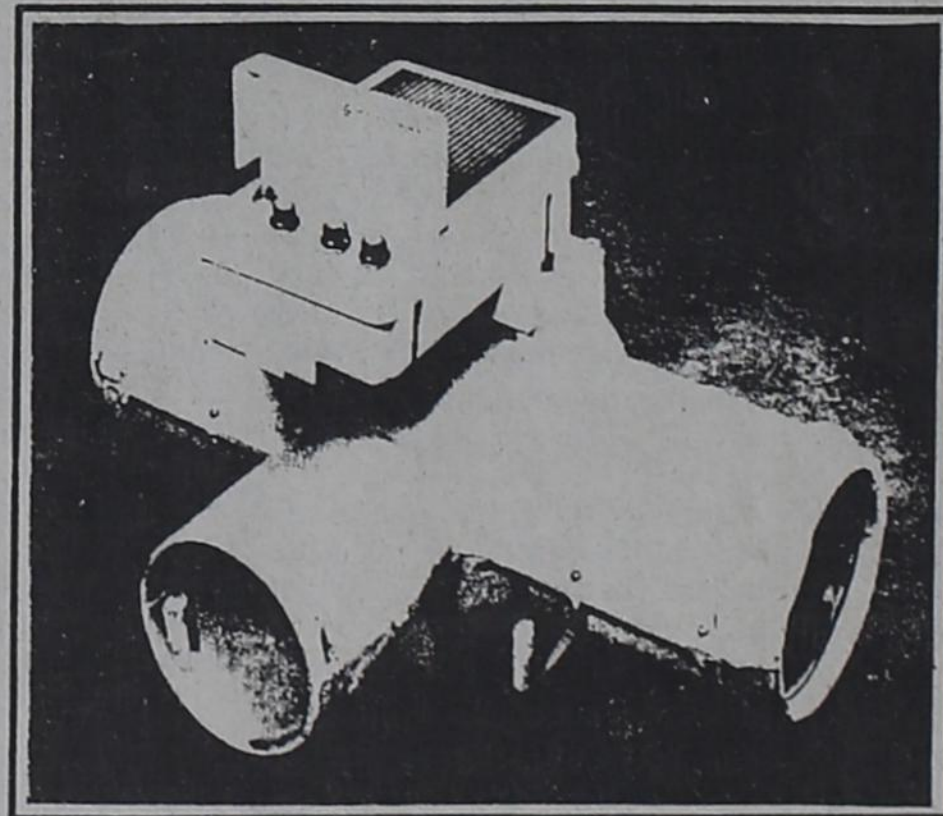

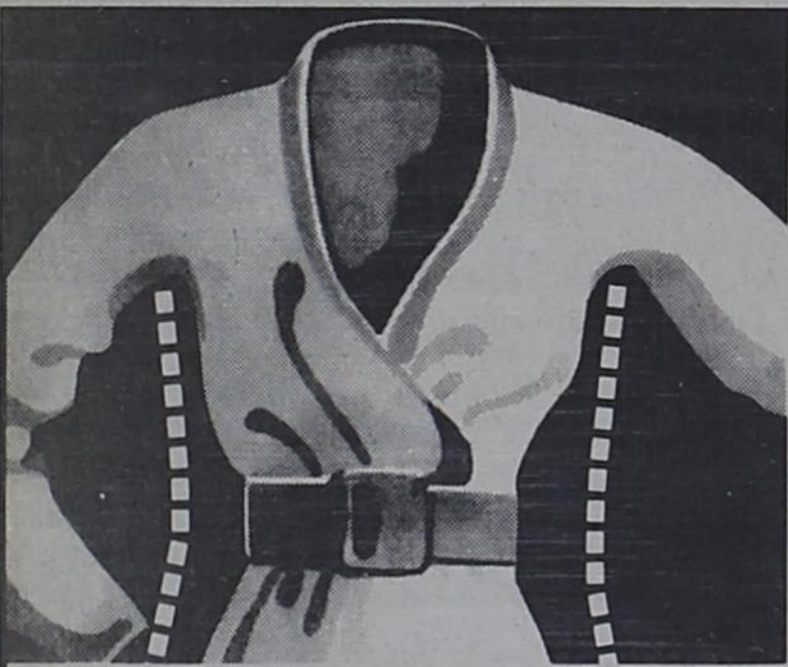

From The Chief's Desk

This week's topic is dogs running loose or not confined within a fence or on a leash. Bovina City Ordinance Number 78-15 states as follows:

An animal control ordinance prohibiting any dog from running at large within the city of Bovina, Texas, without being under control of the owner of said dog and without the same having been vaccinated for rabies, and without the owner having paid a tax to the city of Bovina as provided hereby; providing for the time and in the manner for the disposition of dogs.

Section I states that all dogs will be vaccinated for rabies and will have said rabies tag and identification tag attached to the dog collar. The identification tag will reflect payment of taxes for the current year.

Section II states that all dogs known to be inflicted with rabies shall be destroyed on site by any peace officer or other employee of this city. Every dog suspected of

having rabies, shall be taken into custody and retained until it is established whether or not the dog has rabies.

Section III states that there will be a tax levied of \$1.00, plus actual cost of the tag issued by the city. This tax is to be paid every year the number on the tag shall be kept on record with the owner's name and address.

This tax will be paid and the dog registered with the city of Bovina, during the month of January every year. Persons moving into Bovina with dogs have thirty days to register their dogs. A proof or certificate of rabies vaccination must be shown at such time of registration.

Section IV states that any dog found running loose without the identification tag and rabies tag will be impounded. The charge for release will be \$5.00 the first day or any part thereof, and \$2.00 per day or any part thereof.

Section V states that if the dog is not claimed and the fees paid, the city tax is not paid, and the dog is not vaccinated at the time of release, the dog may be sold at a private sale for the best price and the proceeds from the sale shall be applied to payment of the pound charges and the taxes levied. If the owner of said dog does not claim

the same within a period of 48 hours of the same dog being taken into custody, and in event the dog cannot be sold, the same shall be at that time euthanized.

Section VI states the owner of any dog, that permits the same to run loose or at large upon any public street, alley, or public park in this city, without being vaccinated for rabies, and displaying a current identification tag, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction in corporation court of the city of Bovina, shall be fined in any amount not to exceed two hundred dollars, and each day violation shall constitute a separate offense.

This ordinance along with any other ordinance that you might be interested in are kept on file at City Hall. I will be issuing warnings for dogs running loose for the next week and then citations will be issued. Dogs that can't be identified as for the owners will be placed in the city pound.

Public Hit By "Free" Prize Scams

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service today warned the public about the increasing number of "boiler room" scams that use the telephone to pitch a variety of products, usually attached to a "free gift" gimmick.

Chief Postal Inspector Charles R. Clauson says the bogus companies flood post offices with computerized mailings notifying people "they've won a prize," usually after offering for sale everything from vitamins to office supplies. "The operators then follow up with high-pressure telemarketing," Clauson says, "usually asking for money or a credit card number to cover shipping charges." Clauson says the best way to defend against the scams is to "check out the company and call them back--without giving out your credit card number or any money--and if still suspicious get in touch with a postal inspector through the nearest post office."

Just last week, a promoter and twelve telephone pitchmen were arrested in the New York City area for misrepresenting the sale of cleaning supplies.

Several weeks ago four operators from Seattle, Washington and Las Vegas, Nevada, were arrested for mail and wire fraud for offering prizes as part of a nationwide promotion.

And in Houston, William E. Gardner, 35, operator of International Direct Mail Marketing, Ins., is awaiting sentencing after pleading guilty to mail fraud charges. He told those who responded to his mailings to call a Houston area phone number to claim a motorboat and outboard motor, he said was worth as much as \$500, as part of a marketing survey. The thousands who responded--by each paying more than \$120 for shipping--received an inflatable raft and motor worth \$40.

Chief Inspector Clauson says, "the telephone boiler rooms have been concentrated in certain areas of the country, but the victims come from all over."

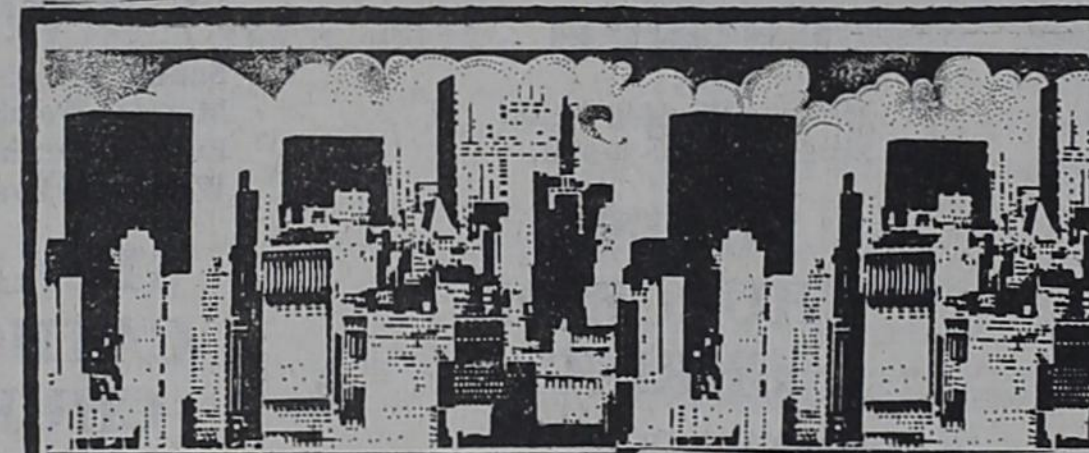

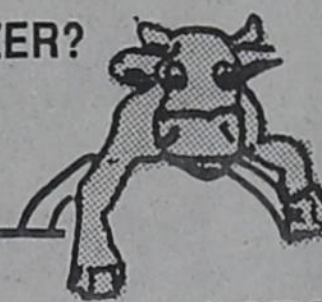

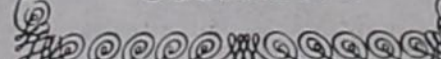
