TEXAS MONTHLY Magazine's February issue contains the magazine's annual "Bum Steer" awards, in which the publication zings everyone from politicians to private citizens on the "worst performances" of the year just past.

Heading the magazine's list of "worsts" is author James Michener's book, "Texas," which more than co-incidentally came out during the state's sesquicentennial year. Texas Monthly calls the book "the longest unbroken string of Texas clichés ever compiled."

Although Michener was given his own office at the University of Texas, plus all the research help he wanted, TM says "Michener's Texas makes J.R.'s Dallas look like an informed sophisticated portrayal of Texas today."

The law does some strange things, and Texas Monthly picked out a couple of instances to cite in its Bum Steer awards.

For instance, a tractor-trailer overturned on a Houston freeway, pinning the driver underneath the wreckage. A passing motorist used a crane that was in the back of his pickup to save the driver's life. Later, a highway patrolman issued the Good Samaritan a ticket because the crane was too heavy for his truck.

Impossible, you say? What about the woman who rescued a kitten which a man had tossed into the Guadalupe River after first holding it in front of two large barking dogs. When she cursed at the man after recovering the animal, she was arrested for disorderly conduct and fined \$200.00.

Among its other "zingers," the magazine cited the following: In a brochure designed by the Texas Education Agency to prepare students for upcoming competency tests, one question began, "Which, if any, of the following words are misspelled?" "Misspelled" was misspelled.

Also, Robert Downing of Houston took a bulldozer from a construction site and drove it through his subdivision looking for his lost dog, doing \$20,000 worth of damage. When he got home, the dog was there waiting for him.

The most unusual prize award should go to the Duncanville preschool PTA, which held a benefit auction in which one prize was a \$500 vasectomy.

Surely, none of our local hunters would mimic the Austin hunter who shot a deer in Mexico with antlers so large that he won the Mexican deer of the year award given by the Texas Trophy Hunters Association. He and the deer were pictured in a hunting magazine. Later, the hunter was indicted on federal charges that he had paid \$20,000 for a set of antlers stolen from a Canadian taxidermy shop, which he then had mounted on a small deer he had killed in Mexico.

Louis Welch, former Houston Mayor who has Parmer County relatives, trying to re-capture his office, made a slip-up during his campaign which TM quoted. Welch was giving an off-the-cuff remedy for the AIDS problem which started out with "shooting all the queers." His remark went over a live microphone which he thought was dead.

Texas prison inmate Ronald Danford was sentenced to serve five more years when prison guards, searching him after a five-day furlough, found an ounce of marijuana concealed inside his artificial leg.

Personally, we thought this should have been entitled "worst luck award"--Kay Osterman, general manager of the curio stand located next to the Battleship Texas, bought the entire contents of the battleship's closed souvenir shop with a sealed bid of \$20,000. The next highest bid was \$501.00.

Champions were named in five divisions at the 30th annual Bovina Junior Livestock Show Monday, January 27 at the local showbarn.

Only two goats were entered in the competition, with Joanna Clayton, owning both the grand champion and reserve champion. Denver Riddle helped by showing the champion animal.

In the lamb show, Donnell Garner had the grand champion, a Hampshire, and Terry Moore exhibited the reserve champion, a Suffolk.

Byron Neal had the champion gilt, and Mike Morris entered the reserve champion.

Sharlet Johnson's prospect barrow was named champion, and Denver Riddle's animal was named reserve champion.

In a change from previous years, market barrows were grouped into classes by weight, rather than classifying according to breeds.

Matt Howell's barrow, a Chester White, was named grand champion. Todd Ware had the reserve champion, a crossbred. Other class winners were Bud Venable, Mike Morris, Mendy Rhodes and Matt Howell, who had two class winners.

Showmanship awards were won by Terry Moore in the lamb division and Mendy Rhodes for barrows.

Ronnie Dennis, vocational agriculture instructor at Olton, served as judge for the show, which was co-sponsored by the Bovina Chamber of Commerce and the Bovina Lions Club.

# 39th Annual Show Slated

The 39th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 29-February 1 at the Community Center-Showbarn.

Some 600 animals are expected for the show, which draws entries from all over the county. A new category will be judged this year: turkeys. Otherwise competing will be steers, barrows, lambs, heifers and goats.

Weight-in will be on Wednesday from 1-7 p.m. Judging of the turkeys will begin at 7 p.m. Wednesday. Classification of lambs and steers will begin at 8 p.m. Wednesday.

Lambs and goats will be judged Thursday, January 30, starting with lambs at 5 p.m. The barrow show will be held on Friday starting at 8 a.m. Steers judge at 8 a.m. Saturday, followed by the heifer show.

The premium sale will be held on Saturday, February 1, starting at 2 p.m.

Bovina's Fillies scored an important win at Abernathy last Tuesday, over the defending regional champion Antelopes, 59-56.

The Mustangs made it a clean sweep, with a 72-56 win over Abernathy. They stand 4-2 in district, and if they can win three of their next four games, can gain the playoffs.

But the feature game was the girls' game, with the pre-season district favorites slugging it out.

Bovina used a press to gain a 13-9 lead after one quarter. But at halftime, the team found itself in foul trouble, with four of the starters having three fouls, and the Fillies had to abandon the press. Abernathy had a 24-23 halftime lead.

The Fillies had a short lapse in the third quarter, and fell behind. With 5:42 left in the game, Abernathy had a ten-point lead. That's when Coach Marks Lanham re-installed the press.

It paid off with several turnovers that Bovina turned into points.

They will continue to live in Bovina and will pursue their other interests.

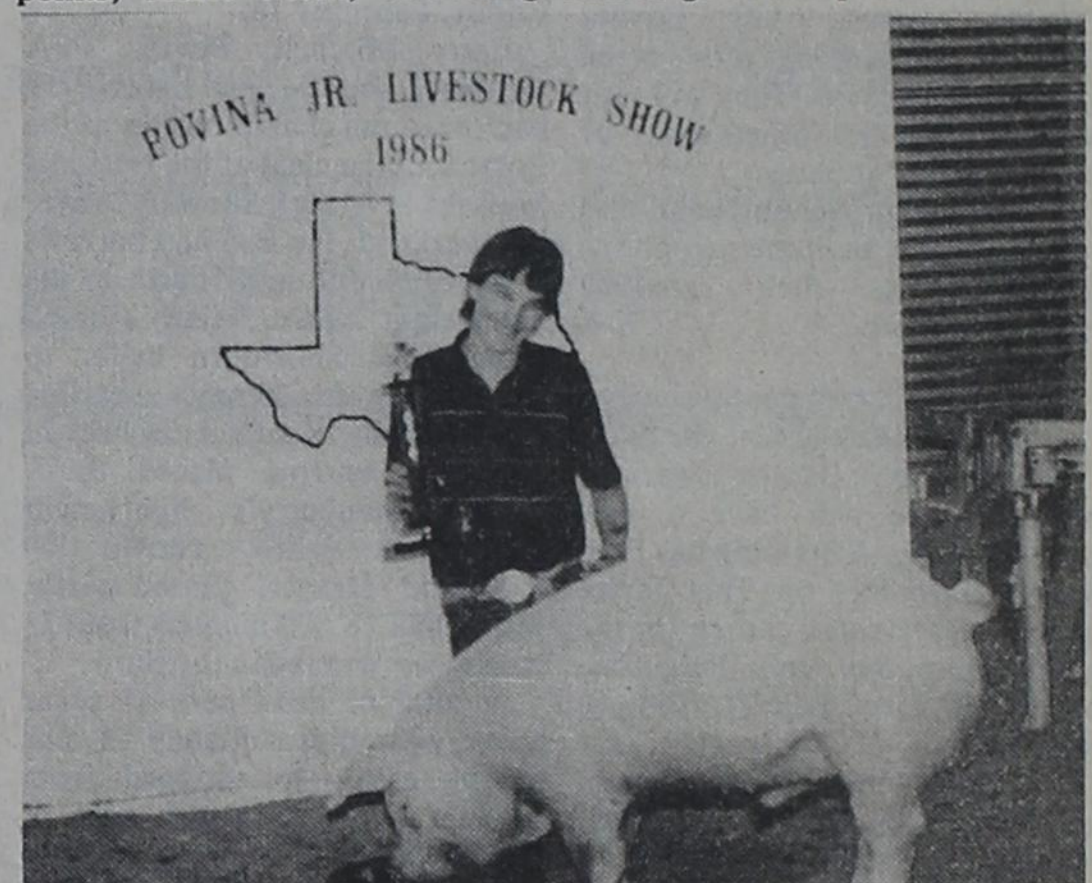
Donnell Garner came on in the second half to score a couple of big baskets.

"Terisa Shepherd was outstanding getting the ball fouls for a long time," said a jubilant Coach Lanham.

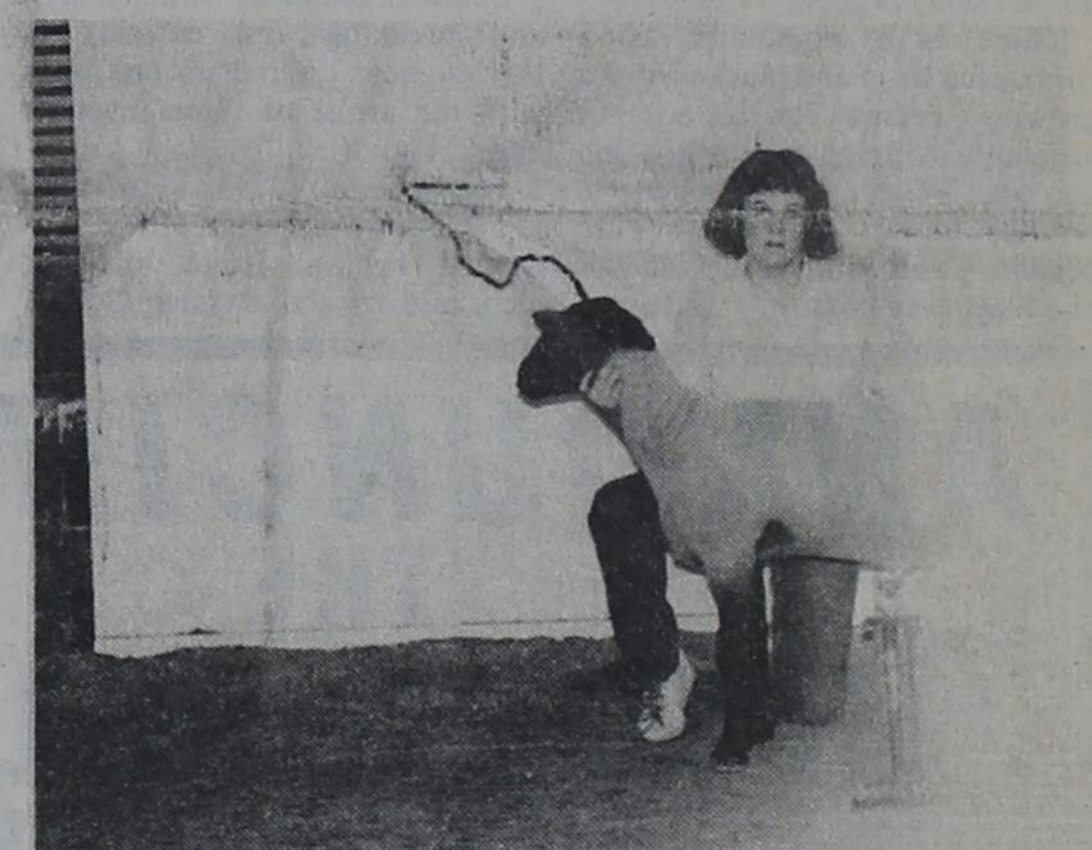
Although held to only nine points, Marie Pesch, recovering

DON MURPHY

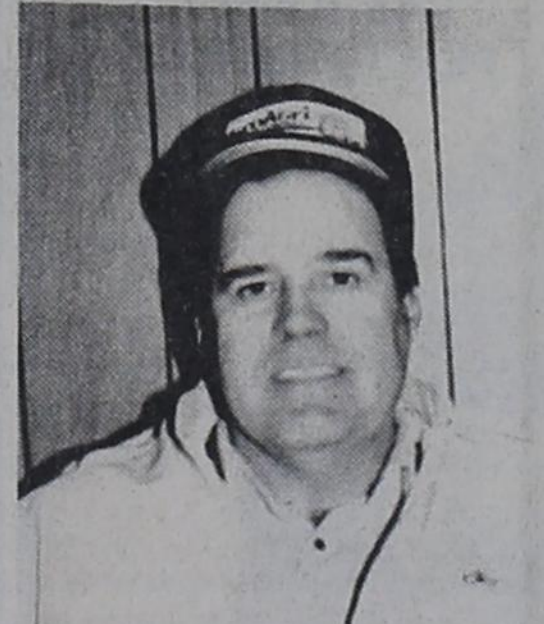
Don Murphy of Bovina has authorized this newspaper to announce his candidacy for the office of Parmer County Commissioner.

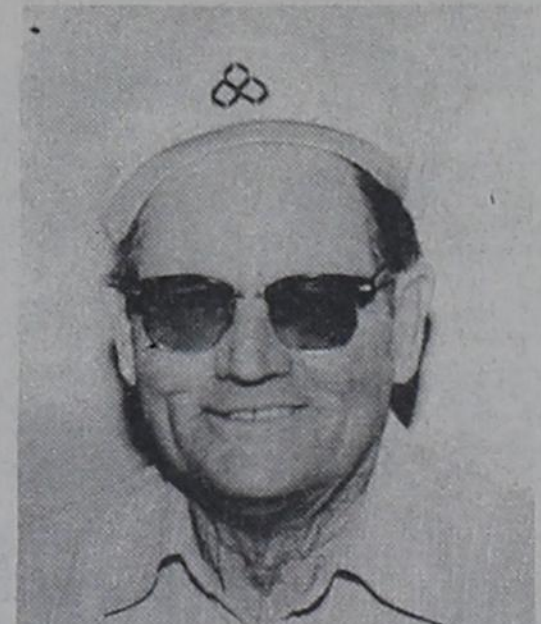
Tom has lived all of his life in Bovina and he and his wife Sandy have three children, Kim, Pat and Todd.

## 30 YEARS AGO--JAN. 21, 1976

## 25 YEARS AGO--JAN. 18, 1961

Indicating little interest, Bovina voters favored the city's \$100,000 bond election by a large majority in Saturday's balloting. Only 111 voters marked ballots in the election which will provide funds for increased city water storage and improvements for the present system, a paving program and for refinancing of major city facilities and equipment.

Donny Anderson, Texas Tech's two-time All-American halfback, will be the guest speaker at the annual Bovina Mustang football banquet. The social event, which will honor the 1965 District 1-B co-champion squad members, will be Friday, February 18.

Larry Mitchell, Bovina FFA member, showed his lightweight barrow to the championship of the Poland China class at the National Western Livestock Show in Denver last weekend. The Shepherd girls each scored 16 points, and Mindy Neal added eleven to pace Bovina's scoring.

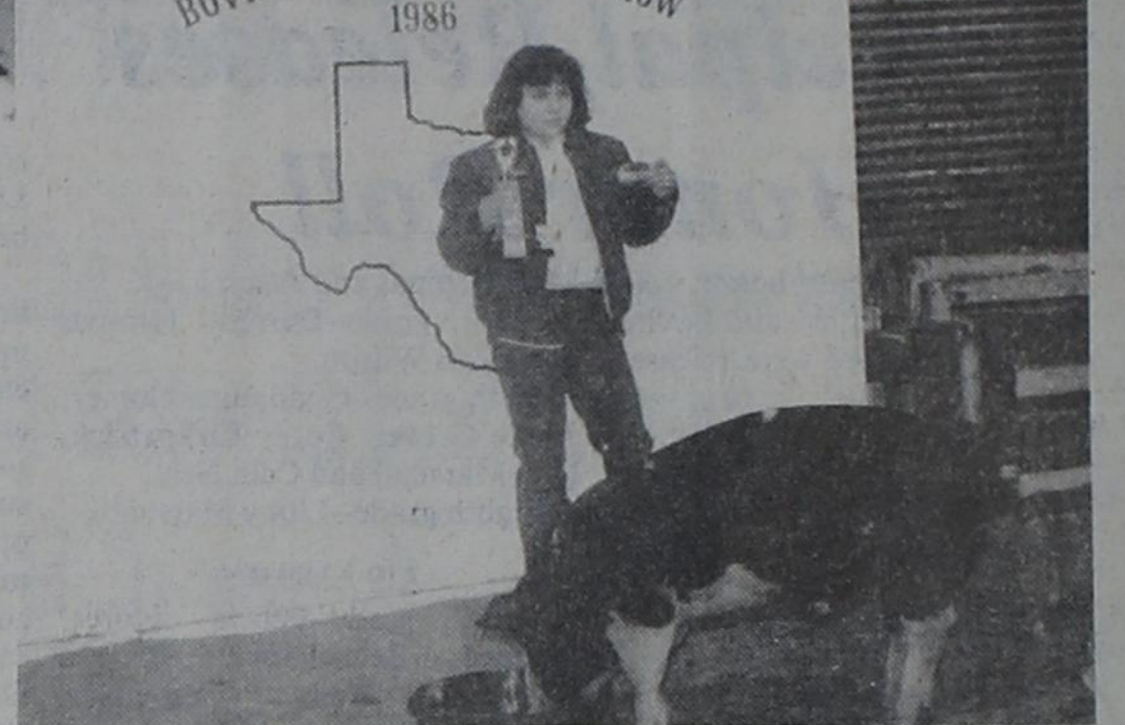

## Around The House

For many years, it seemed that where we lived influenced family lifestyle. But today the lines between rural, suburban and urban families may be blurring.

**The Rural Family**  
Rural families have tended to be among the most traditional. But like many other family forms, the farm family is changing. It is becoming more urban-oriented and egalitarian, with family members sharing decision-making. Yet, rural families still reflect a high degree of stability and strong ties with kin. Farm families show usually a deep sentimental attachment to the land that is not often found in other family units.

**The Suburban Family**  
Many Texas families prefer living in the suburban areas. They usually move to get away from some of the less desirable aspects of city life, to have a yard and a garden, to be close to open country and to have close relationships with neighbors. They often hope that the environment will result in healthier, well-adjusted and better-educated children.

Recent research studies indicate that suburban families are usually more mother-centered, even though household and parental responsibilities are being more equally shared in dual-earner households which dominate the suburbs.

**Urban Families**  
Families from similar educational, occupational and income groups, and who live together in urban neighborhoods also share similar family living patterns. High and low status families tend to have the greatest family differences, especially in their power structure. Women in lower status families often assume family leadership, while men tend to lead higher status families. The trend toward two-income and more equal roles for husbands and wives is influencing all families. As a result, contemporary rural and urban families more closely resemble each other in most essential features of daily life than they have in the past.

Take time this month to reflect on your heritage and grass roots as Texans join in celebration of National Family Week, November 24-30, 1985. No matter where you live in Texas, there's no place like home.

## Panhandle Quilters Salute Texas, 1986

An ancient art form which was an important part of pioneer life in West Texas will play a key role in the Panhandle's salute to the Texas Sesquicentennial in 1986.

Quilters in three Extension districts will match their craftsmanship and sewing skills as they design blocks for a commemorative quilt honoring the state's 150th anniversary. Contests will be held in 26 counties in the three districts, with the winning blocks being assembled into a quilt which will join the displays at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum on the West Texas State University campus in Canyon.

Each hand-applied block will feature a motif indicative of the county's historical, agricultural, geographical or other feature, and the county name.

When the winning blocks are assembled, a public quilting party will be held at the museum February 22-23 to fashion the commemorative quilt. Each quilting participant will be registered and this list will become part of the historical record kept with the quilt.

Those submitting the winning quilt blocks will be guests April 27 at a reception to open the "Lone Stars: A Texas Legacy Quilt Exhibit," featuring 30 of the state's finest quilts made prior to 1936.

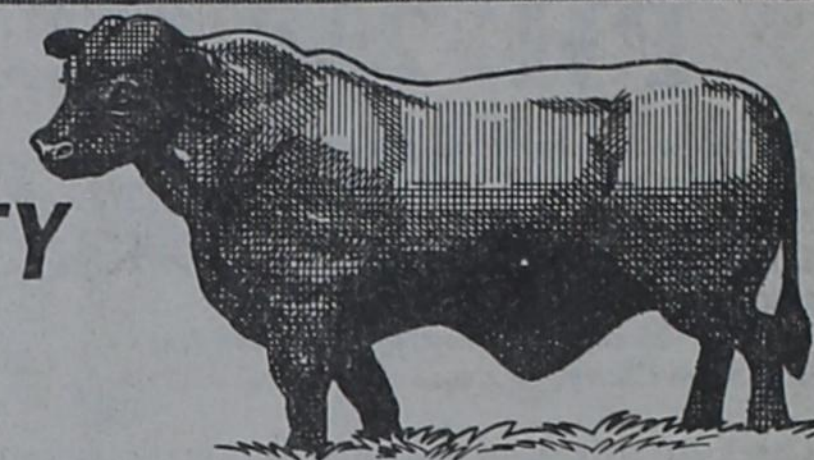

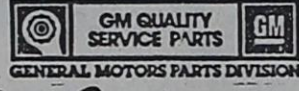

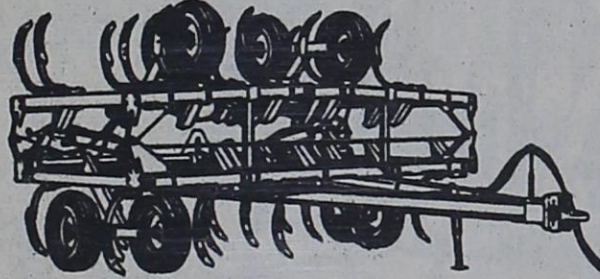

# 39th Annual Jr. Stock Show Set

The 39th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 29-February 1 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona.

For the third time in five years, the show will sport a new division, as a turkey show has been added for the 1986 show.

Judging of turkeys will be done on Wednesday at 7 p.m. The first order of business will be the weigh-in of animals set to begin at 1 p.m. Wednesday. The weigh-in period will be from 1-7 p.m. Lambs and steers will be classified starting at 8 p.m. Wednesday.

The lamb show will be held beginning at 5 p.m. Thursday, January 30, followed by the goat show. Judging the lambs and goats will be Bill Gardner.

Barrows will be judged beginning at 8 a.m. Friday. The entire day of judging is given over to the barrows, which consistently produces the biggest division in the show. Judging the barrows will be Stanley Young.

The steers will be shown starting at 8 a.m. on Saturday, followed by the heifer show. Judging the steers and heifers will be Tracy Haymes.

The auction sale for the premium animals will be held beginning at 2 p.m. on Saturday, February 1.

Also on Friday, Friona State Bank will once again sponsor a free breakfast for all exhibitors, buyers and workers, at the showbarn, from 6:30-8 a.m.

Exhibitors of grand champion animals at the 1985 show were: Dana Berend of Friona, steers and heifers; Chad Rhodes, Friona, barrows; Tracy Moore of Bovina, sheep; and Shannon Cochran, Friona, goats.

Miss Berend won the steer title with a 1254-pound Chianina crossbred animal. That gave her school the county's steer title for the 20th time since 1948. It was the

eight time for a crossbred steer to claim the county title. Hereford steers have won 18 banners in the show's previous 38 years. Angus or Angus crosses have won six titles.

Rhodes' win in the barrow division marked only the third time in 25 years for a Friona showman to exhibit the champion barrow, and just the eighth for Friona in 38 years.

The champion barrow in 1985 was a Hampshire, the breed which has won the most county banners—eleven. Duroc barrows have won eight times; crossbreds have been tapped on seven occasions; Polands have won six titles and Chester Whites four.

Stock show boosters and buyers are urged to attend the premium auction sale, beginning at 2 p.m. on Saturday, February 1.

The animals placing in the top portion of each class will be eligible for the sale.
