Clarendon's annual 3 day celebration will begin this year with the first of four big rodeo performances at the Rodeo grounds a 8:00 o'clock on Tuesday night, July 2. The Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association will offer prizes in the amount of approximately \$3,500.00 for the four performances.

The high point of the big celebration will be a free barbecue beginning at 11:30 a. m. on July 4. Last year some 5,000 people were fed on beef barbequed by H. M. (Flip) Breedlove. Another high point of the program will be an Old Settlers Reunion which will begin at 9:00 a. m. on the 4th. All old settlers in the surrounding communities are invited to this reunion.

Immediately following the free barbeque there will be a big parade with floats sponsored by business men and various organizations of Clarendon and surrounding communities.

The four rodeo performances will be Tuesday night, Wednesday night, Thursday afternoon and Thursday night. Each night performance will begin at 8:00 and the one afternoon performance will begin at 2:00. After each night performance there will be a big dance at the American Legion Hut in downtown Clarendon.
