Clyde Bulldogs Down Comanche Indians 14-8

CLYDE — Clyde Bulldogs whipped Comanche 14-8 here last Friday night. The Bulldog defense stopped Comanche's high scoring Harry Dudley who had scored at least one touchdown in every game this season. Indian quarterback Larry McDougall scored in the fourth quarter. The Indians had been ranked as high as 11th in the state and brought a 5-3 record into Clyde.

After a scoreless first half, linebacker Robbie Tucker intercepted an Indian aerial at mid-field to set up Clyde's first touchdown. Gary Barr blasted in from the two to give the Bulldogs a 6-0 third quarter lead. Later in the quarter, Tommy Ross recovered his second fumble of the night to set up Clyde's second touchdown drive at mid-field. On third down at the Comanche 11, Clyde quarterback, Jackie Fleming passed to Terry Rosinbaum for the touchdown. Barr swept right and for two and the Bulldogs led 14-0 in the fourth. The Indians stormed back for their touchdown, but the Bulldogs drove 63 yards consuming the

last six minutes to run out the clock on the Comanche 9 yard line for their fourth victory of the year.

Craig Loper rushed for 141 yards, Jarrell Hurst carried for 68. Jerry Anderson completed 6 of 7 passes for 63 yards. Outstanding blocking was turned in by Terry Blanks, Iky Akers, Barr and Tucker. Defensive stand-outs were Johnny York, Tucker, Barr, Timmy Payne, and Endgate Hawk.

This week the Bulldogs travel to Hamilton to battle their bulldogs who defeated Cisco 29-22 last week. A win in Hamilton can insure the Bulldogs of a 5-5 season and 5th place finish in the 8 team 8AA district.

UNDERSTANDING THE SCRIPTURES

(continued from last week)

Jesus said some people in his time did not want to understand (Matt. 13:14,15). We trust that you are not like them. We believe you are reading these articles because you are interested in understanding God's message to man.

Misunderstanding of the scriptures often results from misapplying the scriptures. One of the most abused passages in the Bible is John 15:1-6. Reading into this passage a justification for having many denominations as the "branches of the true vine" is a misapplication never intended by Jesus Christ. Such misapplication adds to the confusion that exists about understanding the scriptures. Jesus said, "I am the vine, ye are the branches." Some have been taught to believe that Jesus is referring to the different churches and that they are all branches of the true vine—Christ, and that all of them are alright and pleasing to God.

One very obvious consideration will reveal that this cannot possibly be its meaning, and that is; None of the denominations which we know today existed when Jesus said this. His statement is in the present tense, not the future tense. He states a truth that existed at that time. He says, "Ye are the branches." Not, "Ye will be the branches." The word "ye" is second person plural to agree in number with its object—"branches." This can mean only one thing; that each of them to whom Jesus spoke was a branch of the true vine (himself). It is evident from the continuation of the verse which the third person singular is used saying, "He that abideth in me." An individual may be a member of the true vine—Christ, but not by any means the imagination can it be made to mean that denominations are the branches of the true vine which is Christ. Such is misapplying the scriptures in an effort to justify what one believes to be the truth, what he hopes is the truth. This contributes to misunderstanding, not understanding them.

TO CLAIM SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS PROOF OF AGE NEEDED

BAIRD — You're only as old as you feel. We have all heard this old familiar cliché. How is it with you? Are you feeling old enough to start drawing your social security benefits?

If you are getting ready to claim your social security benefits you will need proof of your age or date of birth because just feeling old enough is not sufficient. According to James Smith social security field representative who is at Baird Courthouse on November 16, you can speed up the claims process by getting your proof of age documents together early. Your first thought may be that you have no proof of your age. Types of age proof so numerous you may have just the thing you need without being aware of it.

First of all, do you have a birth certificate? A birth certificate which has been recorded as long as eight years ago may be all that you need to establish your date of birth. You will need to know whether or not there is a birth certificate recorded for you. If there is a birth certificate on record, we will want to see a copy of it. If you have never checked with the county clerk or custodian of public records in the city or county where you were born, you should do this as soon as possible. Your social security office can furnish you a form letter to use in writing to the custodian of the records.

If you have the records where you were born and there is no birth certificate recorded for you, what do you do now? Don't panic — remember there are

many other records that can be used.

Some possible proofs are: early baptismal certificates, family Bible records, school records, children's birth certificates, insurance policies, driver's license, lodge records, etc.

If you are not sure what you'll need, if you need assistance, or if you need advice about getting possible records, call the social security office now for full information and assistance.

Your social security office is as near as your telephone. In Baird and the surrounding area, the nearest office is in Abilene and the number to call is (915) 677-5282 unless you can meet the field representative here.
