## Notice of Election

The State of Texas  
County of Travis  
Board of Water Engineers

To the Qualified voters of the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority comprising the cities of Childress, Clarendon, Wellington, Hedley, Memphis, Paducah and Quanah:

Take Notice that an election will be held in each of the cities above named on August 31, 1957, on the question and at the places more particularly set forth in the order of the Board of Water Engineers of the State of Texas, which order is as follows:

### An Order

Calling Confirmation Election In The Green Belt Municipal And Industrial Water Authority  
Be it ordered by The Board of Water Engineers of The State of Texas:

1 An election shall be held in the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority on the 31st day of August, 1957, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Whether or not the establishment of the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority shall be confirmed to include each of the following cities in which the majority vote favors confirmation: Childress, Clarendon, Wellington, Hedley, Memphis, Paducah, and Quanah."

2. (a) The election held in the City of Childress shall be at the City Hall in said City and Mr. Bill King is hereby appointed Presiding Judge of said election.

(b) The election held in the City of Clarendon shall be at the City Hall in said City and E. J. Chenuault is hereby appointed Presiding Judge of said election.

(c) The election held in the City of Wellington shall be at the City Hall in said City and F. A. Hatch is hereby appointed Presiding Judge of said election.

(d) The election held in the City of Hedley shall be at the City Hall in said City and Ross Springer is hereby appointed Presiding Judge of said election.

(e) The election held in the City of Memphis shall be at the City Hall in said City and Mr. E. McMurray is hereby appointed Presiding Judge of said election

(f) The election held in the City of Paducah shall be at the City Hall in said City and Kenneth

Tooley is hereby appointed Presiding Judge of said election

(g) The election held in the City of Quanah shall be at the City Hall in said City and E. G. Givens is hereby appointed Presiding Judge of said election.

3 Each of the presiding judges above named shall appoint two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the election in his voting place.

4. Said election shall be held under the provisions of House Bill 88 enacted by the 53rd Legislature, first called session, and the General Election Laws of the State. Only qualified voters who reside in each of the Cities above named shall be qualified to vote in said election held in such Cities.

5. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"For Confirmation"

"Against Confirmation"

6. A substantial copy of this order shall constitute proper and sufficient notice of said election. Such notice shall be published in a newspaper published in each of the Cities above named once each week for two weeks, the first notice shall be at least fourteen days prior to the date set for the election.

## Greenbelt Dam

The Hedley City Council has requested that an election be held on August 31st for the purpose of deciding whether this city shall be a member of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority named Hedley as one of the cities which could belong with Childress, Wellington, Memphis, Clarendon, Paducah, and Quanah. The Authority will come into existence only after the election and will then consist of the appointed representatives of the towns in which the election carried a favorable vote. This election does not carry any liability, neither requires nor authorizes any taxes, bonds or expenditures. This election only creates the legal body which then can proceed to determine thoroughly and accurately the size, storage capacity, and location of a water reservoir and the quantity and quality of water that could be obtained from such a reservoir as well as its cost to the various cities.

None of these issues face the voters on August 31st. The only one that does is whether Hedley shall be represented on the board of directors of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority which shall determine the future progress of this water project.

The election is called by authority of the State Board of Water Engineers. Formation of the Authority through this confirmation election will go a long ways towards holding this area's water rights to the Salt Fork of the Red River.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL  
 AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED  
 ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE  
 HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform the duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows:

"Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds.' shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for this one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1982 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1982, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds; except that such amount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside; and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

They sat in on congress for a few minutes, talked with Congressman Rogers, and had some pictures made on the capitol steps with him.

Train No 903 took the Scouts on to Port Kennedy, Pa. that evening and they marched about 1½ miles to Valley Forge Park. Tents and equipment arrived about 11:30 P. M. and the Scouts finally got to bed about 2:30 A. M.

Wednesday, July 10, the Scouts were up at 5:30 A. M. and loaded on the busses for New York. Their busses traveled the Pennsylvania Turnpike then joined the New Jersey Turnpike, then on to Manhattan by way of the Lincoln Tunnel. The first place for the Scouts to stop was the RCA Music Hall, where they attended the premiere of Marilyn Monroe's new movie, "The Prince and The Show Girl" followed by a one hour stage presentation by Radio City.

The Scouts ate lunch at Childs Restaurant, then toured Rockefeller Center. At 4 P. M. they boarded a Day Line sightseeing yacht and made a 35 mile cruise around Manhattan Island. On the cruise Scouts saw the luxury liners, The Queen Elizabeth and The United States, the Mayflower the Second, Statue of Liberty, barges moving freight cars down the Hudson River, The Lincoln Tunnel Ventilators The Empire State Bldg., Ellis Island, Brooklyn Bridge, Manhattan Bridge, Hellgate Bridge, Columbian Presbyterian Medical Center, Grant's Tomb, U S Naval Ship Yard, Riverside Church, Hall of Fame and many other points of interest.

Chief Scout Executive Arthur A Schuck officially opened the Jamboree and set the stage for the story of Washington's stay at Valley Forge. The pages of history rolled back as more than 500 Scouts recreated the real story of Valley Forge. They depicted happy days, hard times, the coming of the Continental Army, the building of forts and redoubts, the arrival of supplies and other scenes took place on the great stage.

The night was ended with a gigantic fireworks display composed of more than 300 aerial bombs and parachute bombs.

Saturday, July 13, was spent swapping patches and horned toads. Some Scouts were swapping alligators, white mice, javalinas, neckerchief slides, etc.

The boys visited with Scouts from other states and countries, and made many friends. They cooked their own food and cleaned up their campsite daily in the form of patrols.


