THERE IS A LOT of debate on the subject of environment protection, and the work being done to protect certain endangered species.

But there is one program which has proven successful, and probably without expending too much in the way of tax funds.

This is the protection of the giant whooping cranes, which spend the winter at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Texas coast each year.

In a recent newspaper interview, Frank Johnson, manager of the wildlife refuge, gave some encouraging news concerning the whooping cranes.

At one point since the cranes have been placed on the endangered species list, their population dwindled to only 12 or 15 birds. Last spring, park officials counted 95 birds as they left to spend the summer at Wood Buffalo National Park in Canada.

Canadian officials report that 20 chicks large enough to fly were banded at the birds' nesting grounds in Canada, and at least one other chick was sighted. So, the 1986 population of the whoopers could be as high as 115, depending on how many of the birds survive the 2,500-mile trip from Canada to Texas.

In addition to the migratory flock, there are some 40 adult birds in captivity (in zoos, etc.), and there is a flock of 25 whooping cranes which live in a Rocky Mountain flock. So, from the low of only a dozen of the cranes spotted at one time, this year's population may possibly be around 180.

If you have ever seen the whooping cranes, either in person or in pictures, you can see why naturalists have worked and fought so hard to combat its threatened extinction.

They stand four feet tall as adults, with a seven-foot wingspan. The whooping cranes are snow-white, with black wingtips. They should not be confused with the sandhill crane, thousands of which overwinter at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge. The sandhill crane is not on the endangered list. In fact, there have been specified hunting seasons for this crane.

The Aransas refuge is located approximately 75 miles north of Corpus Christi. Each year, approximately 40,000 visitors visit the park, many in an attempt to spot the cranes.

There is a sightseeing tower with telescopes for viewing not only the tall whoopers, but also much other wildlife including deer, javelina, alligators, wild turkeys, ducks, geese and many other species of birds.

Park officials say that the best way of seeing the whooping cranes is to take a commercial sight-seeing boat from Rockport or Port Aransas.

Ye editor has followed with interest the effort so save the whooping cranes, and it was especially good news to learn about the continued success of the program.

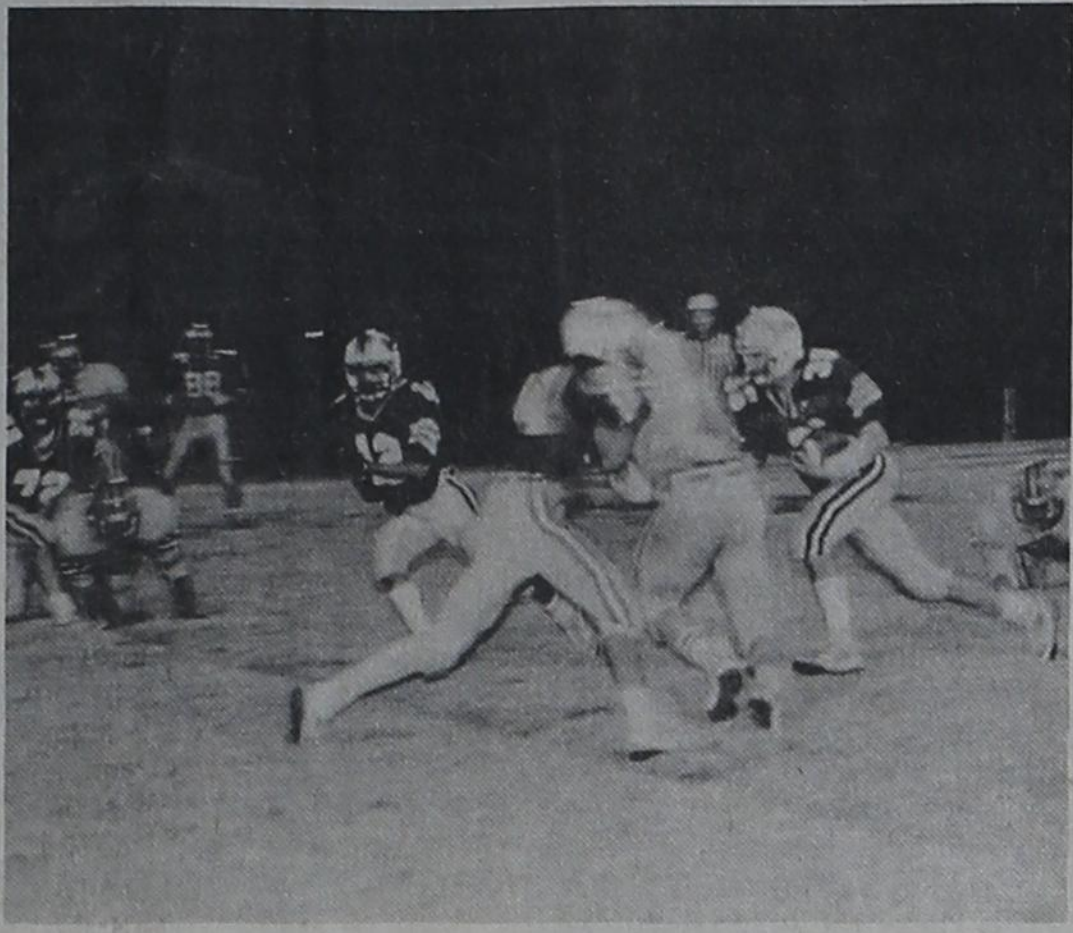
The whoopers have begun arriving at their winter home. We will be watching to see what the "count" is after their migration back from Canada is complete.

Mustangs Score 3rd District Win, 21-0

The Bovina Mustangs scored their third district win, 21-0, in an impressive performance against the Whiteface Antelopes here last Friday.

The Mustangs had a pair of touchdowns by Todd Ware and one by Bud Venable. Venable also kicked all three points after touchdown.

"I thought the kids played a good ball game. Whiteface had a good team," said Coach Bill Talley, whose Mustangs held Whiteface to just 26 total yards and two first downs.

Talley said he thought a key to the Bovina win came when Whiteface threatened to score early in the game. The Antelopes had a good return on the opening kickoff, and then drove down to the Bovina three-yard line.

But the Mustang defense dug in and held Whiteface out, and that may have taken some of the fire out of the visitors.

Bovina got on the scoreboard when Ware scored on a 25-yard

run, and Venable kicked the point after. The touchdown was set up by a pass interception by Homer Renteria at about midfield. That made the halftime score 7-0, Bovina.

In the third quarter, Bovina took over the ball, and Ware got his second touchdown on a 50-yard run. Venable added the PAT, for a 14-0 score.

In the fourth quarter, Venable capped a sustained Bovina drive with a seven-yard scoring run, and then kicked the point. The drive covered about 65 yards. Renteria's 25-yard run was the biggest gain in the drive. Venable's third PAT kick made the score 21-0.

Renteria was the team's leading rusher with 115 yards on 26 tries. Ware added 88 on eight carries, and Venable had 56 on nine attempts.

"We had some great blocking by Chad Clayton and Todd Schilling. They were really opening the holes. At one point, we ran the same play

seven or eight times in a row, and the hole just kept getting bigger," Coach Talley said.

The team made some good gainers on the quick-pitch to Ware.

On defense, Talley said Bovina's total defensive effort was good. The end play was described as good on Whiteface's option tries, and that was the key to the game. Their quarterback had been named "Player of the Week" a couple of weeks earlier, and Bovina did a good job of shutting him down.

The team will be without Homer Renteria, who suffered bruised ribs in the Whiteface game, and was to miss this week. Steve Gauntt also had a sprained wrist last Friday, but is expected to be able to play this week.

Petersburg, like Bovina, is in a position to challenge for a playoff spot. The Buffaloes are a good football team and are well-coached, according to Coach Bill Talley.

"They are a good defensive team. They don't score a lot of points, but just try to control the ball," Talley explained.

Senior quarterback Johnny Gonzales leads the Buffaloes' attack. Freddy Salas and Haskell Garrett are the running backs.

Petersburg has made a good comeback this year themselves, after being winless in district and having a 2-7-1 record a year ago.

Totals For Next Issue

Election day was a cold, rainy day, and this may adversely affect the turnout.

County Clerk Bonnie Warren says that about 75 people voted absentee, which was at least a "fair" turnout.

Voters seemed to be turning out pretty good here Tuesday morning.

Although the Bovina precinct had contests in the primary for both the commissioner and justice of the peace, these nominees were unopposed on the general election ballot, where the governor's race and that for the U.S. Congress were the main attractions.

However, things began to change on Saturday, when a drizzle began to fall. This continued throughout Sunday and most of the day on Monday.

Then on Monday night, the area experienced a spring-type thunderstorm, complete with electrical display. An additional 1.5 to two inches of rain were measured Monday evening, adding to the already wet condition of things.

Although the moisture should be good for the winter wheat, even wheat farmers are wondering if they might be getting too much of a good thing.

In the meantime, a considerable amount of crops remain to be harvested. The area's cotton crop, which was hit a blow by an early freeze on October 12, continues to suffer.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 7, 1956

Texas agreed with the nation in returning President Eisenhower to his second term of office in the general election Tuesday, but it was a different story in predominantly agricultural Parmer County. Here, Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver, the Democratic nominees for the nation's two highest offices, took a clear-cut victory. It was not, however, an overwhelming one, and pre-election guesses had predicted the margin would be wider.

Bovina's \$25,000 city bond election Thursday was defeated. Final totals for the two propositions--one for water tax bonds and the other for sewer tax bonds--was 88-60 and 90-58.

Members of the Bovina Cemetery Association met with the city commission Monday night in the city hall during a regular meeting of the commission. Purpose of the two groups getting their heads together was to discuss installing a two-inch city water line to the Bovina Cemetery, which is in southeast Bovina.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1961

Hotter than the near-freezing weather was cold, Bovina's Mustangs stormed to a tremendous 72-12 win over Vega Longhorns there Friday night.

Frank Hastings, pioneer Bovinan, has been paid a high tribute by fellow members of the Masonic Lodge here. In a program Friday night in the school cafeteria, he was honored for 50 years of continuous service in Masonry.

Plans for improvements of Highway 86 and FM Road 1731 in Bovina continue to progress slowly. Improvements include widening of pavements, curbs and gutters.

For the first time in seven years, Bovina Mustangs are holders of a district title. They earned the District 2-B banner in resounding fashion. They were never extended in blasting four district opponents.

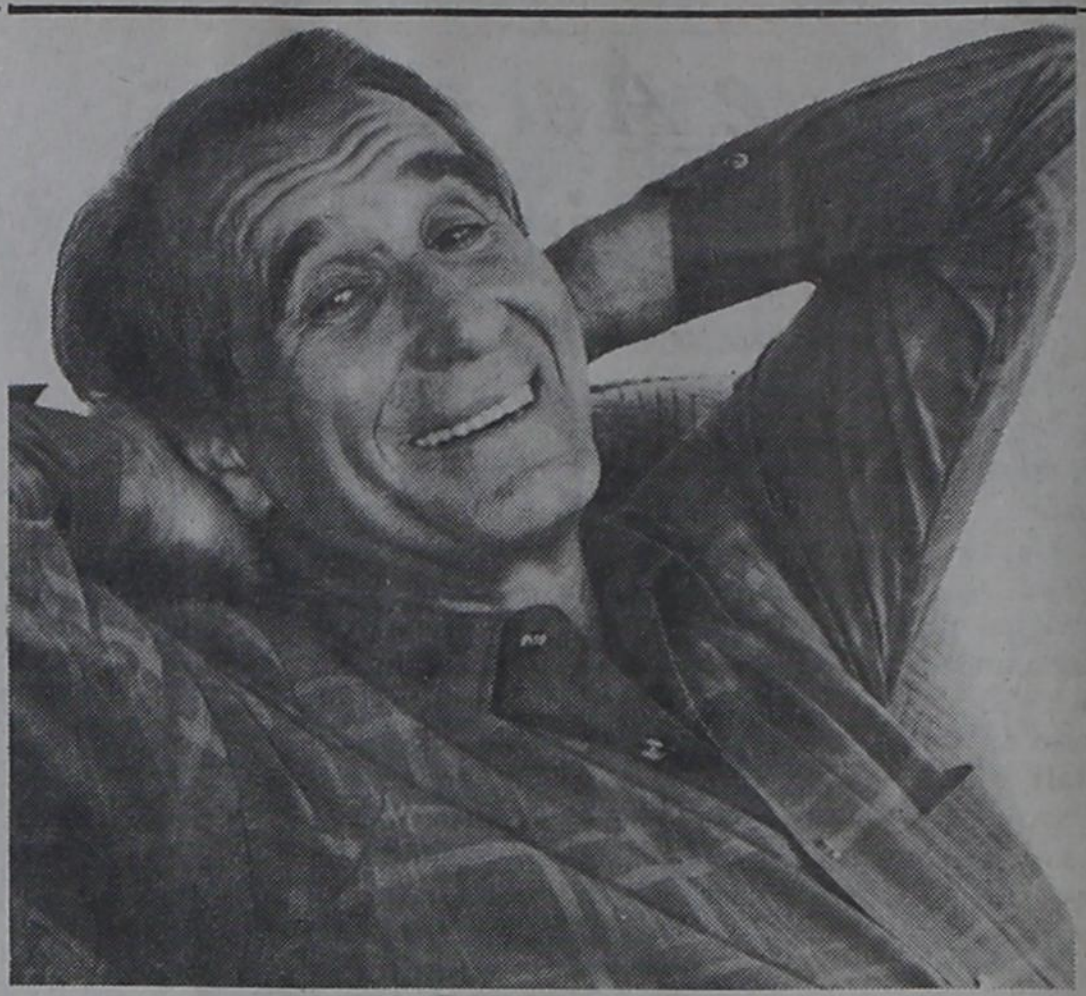

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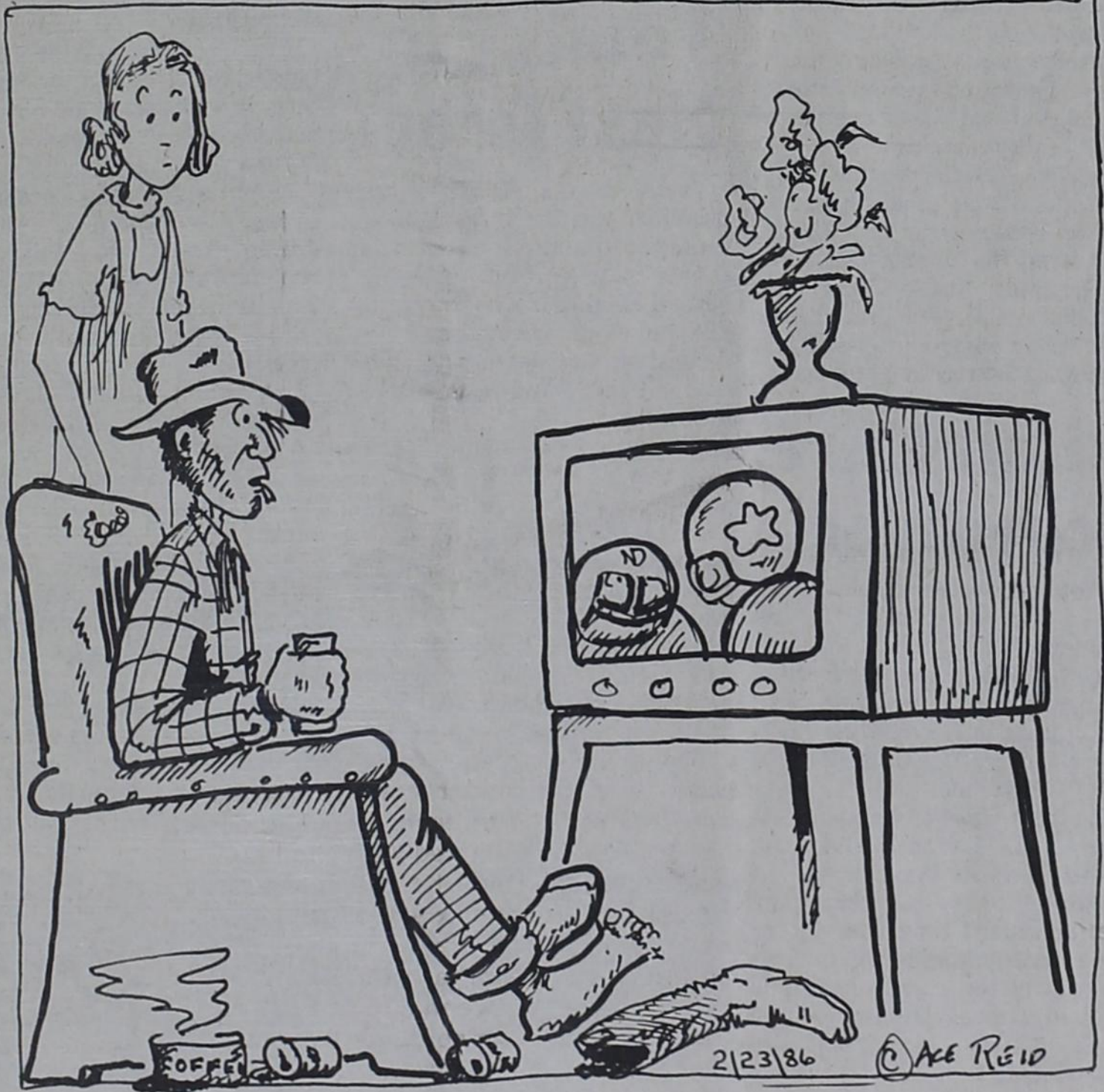

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday, October 28 for Fred Burch, 63, of Lazbuddie.

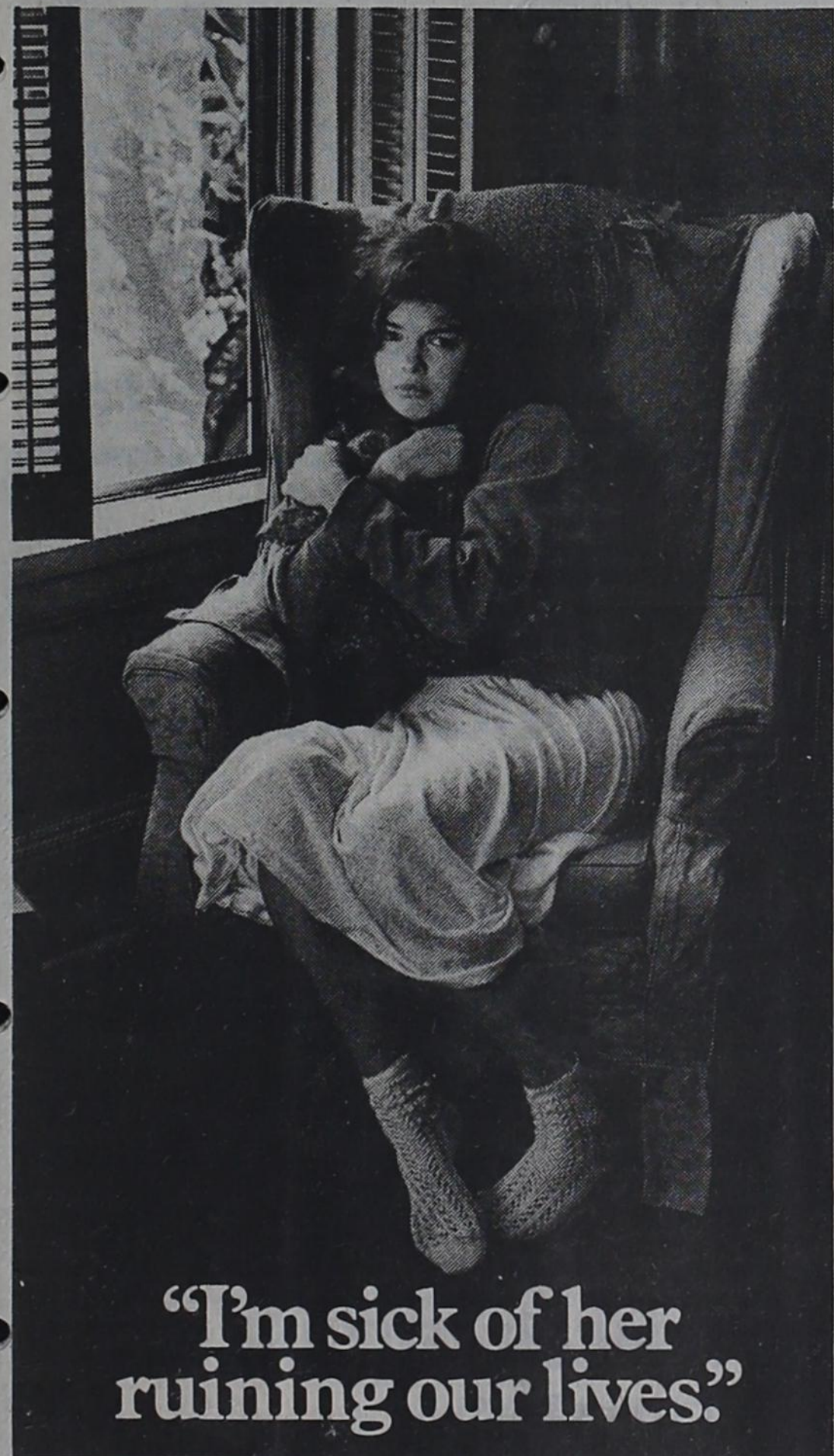

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Sign on with Route 66 'kicks'

How long has it been since you cruised with Tod and Buz, sharing their adventures along Route 66?

Just the name of the fabled route conjures an image of that familiar highway shield -- the ultimate symbol of modern wanderlust, winding "up through Missouri, down to St. Louis, Oklahoma City" . . . and Texas.

Twenty-odd years ago, Route 66 was also a ticket to video adventure. Between commercials, you could become George Maharis or . . . who was that other guy? The wind would slice your Brylcreemed hair as you soared in that cool, convertible Corvette, living for an hour each week the life of a blacktop nomad.

Like the old TV show, U.S. 66 is history now. But you can relive your Route 66 travels -- real or imagined -- with the help of your own, authentic highway marker.

The 277 signs that once marked Route 66 in Texas will go up for public auction Nov. 21 and 22 in Austin. Mail-in bids will be accepted if they are received by Nov. 14.

Last year, the last Route 66 sign in Texas came down, as the conversion of the old highway to Interstate 40 was completed. At one time, 177 miles of Route 66 ran through the Texas Panhandle, crossing seven counties.

The signs, which have been in storage, are being cleaned and readied for sale. Preparation includes placing a label on each sign, to certify it as a genuine artifact.

Included in the auction are 99 two-foot-square aluminum signs, 153 two-foot-square steel signs, 24 three-foot aluminum shields and one 30-inch aluminum shield.

The signs will be sold as part of the general auction of surplus state goods at Austin's City Coliseum. They are scheduled to be on the auction block on Nov. 22, the second day of the sale.

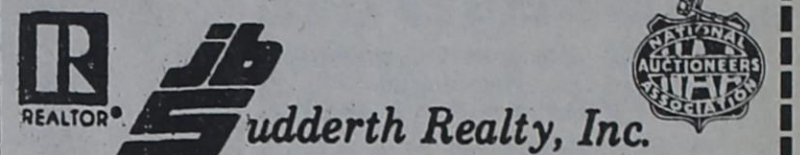

Those attending the dinner expressed appreciation for the good food and service and St. Ann's Society appreciated all the ladies who helped make the dinner a success.



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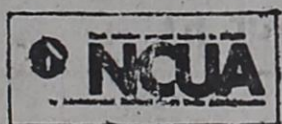

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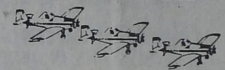
