Discussion Group

In many quarters there is concern over the proper understanding of current events. The Voice of America attempts to get through to people in certain areas who urgently need to know more of democracy. Thomas Jefferson relied on an educated people to carry out his democratic ideals. Time was when young men ardently aspired to emulate Richard Harding Davis, spectacular foreign correspondent. Public affairs had a tingle about them that seems to have become jaded with so many activities. Some will be disturbed at the reaction to affairs not directly affecting them, as shown by midwestern people in articles now running in the Saturday Evening Post, by the extremely competent reporter, John Whitlow Martin. Yet economically and otherwise the world is pretty much a unit today. In its Jan. 6 number, Weekly News Review, published for secondary school students, asks the question, "Did you, through reading, listening to radio-TV discussion programs, and in other ways, increase your knowledge of public problems so that you can help keep our democratic nation safe, strong, and just? Informed citizens are vitally needed." Take a look, adults, at that last sentence which is the gist of the quotation. The recently-begun Roundtable programs on K 7 are designed to increase public understanding, and are sponsored by West Texas State College. Cognizance of public affairs was taken at the recent triennial convention of the National Council of Churches, one prominent spokesman being quoted in Time as saying that their magazine Memo, which is increasing its circulation, is designed to add an ethical dimension to public affairs. Of course the undergirding of this whole business is religious. The Public Affairs Discussion Group is designed to give earnest men agreeable ways in which to strive for a true understanding of public affairs; not a debate on preconceived positions. One need not feel he is not a vital part of a panel discussion when he can only ask questions. With the right spirit of all present, even the making of a mistake in facts can lead to understanding when corrected. As Gerald W. 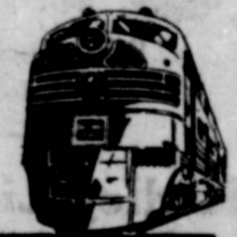
