A LOCAL FARMER (retired) brought us the following clipping, which is a tongue-in-cheek essay on the troubles associated with agriculture. We admitted to our friend that the problem is that many big city (and perhaps not so big) folks probably think about the way the satirical piece reads.

"DUMB FARMERS"

Why all this fuss about saving the family farm? We don't need farmers anymore. Just look! The stores are full of food!

And besides, won't food be a lot cheaper when the corporations take over agriculture? After all, they're so much bigger, and everybody knows that bigger is better and, of course, more efficient.

I've seen big, efficient farmers who own fields all over the country. They spend a lot of their time running up and down the roads with their huge eight-wheel tractors and 30-foot implements, going from field to field. And I know a 300-horsepower tractor can pull those big implements over the road much more efficiently than 50-horsepower can!

I can't figure out why farmers are complaining so much. Take the beefsteak farmer, for example, I paid \$3.98 a pound for steak yesterday. A cow weighs about a ton, I guess.

So there's 2,000 x \$3.98, equals \$7,960 the farmer got for the one cow, and he must have a hundred of those big rangy, black and white cows out there in his barns with their heads sticking through those trapper things.

Milk--dear me--I pay over \$2 a gallon for milk, and if he can't make it on that, he's just lazy.

And breakfast cereal--a 16-ounce box of flakes cost me \$2.20. There's 60 pounds in a bushel of wheat, so 60 x \$2.20 equals \$312 a bushel farmers get for wheat and one farmer raises about a million bushels, I think.

Another thing all those cow farmers are doing wrong--they under-utilize their land. You drive a hundred cows in there, but he could put a thousand on it, 4,000 if he really packed them in.

Take apples, 70 cents a pound, and the big apple weighs nearly half a pound, so these apples are like 50 cents each. If a farmer can't sell two apples for a dollar and get by, he'd better move to town.

Farmers make a lot of extra work for themselves. They cut corn down every year. They should let it grow and come back year after year, like apple trees.

And another thing: Farmers fail to keep up with consumers' tastes. For example, farmers still have their hogs produce lard whereas Mrs. Suzy Q. Public wants hydrogenated oils.

And they still raise both male and female chickens whereas people don't eat roosters anymore. Those farmers should hatch only hens, because all customers want today are chicken breasts.

I don't know anything about farming, but I bet I could do a lot better job of it than those farmers do.

Murder Suspect Is Nabbed In Florida

Rene Garcia was arrested Thursday morning, November 13 in Immokalee, Florida on a Parmer County warrant charge, capital murder, aggravated assault, aggravated kidnapping and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

He was also arrested on State of Texas warrant charged with violation of parole and a federal warrant, charged with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

Garcia was arrested following an anonymous tip to authorities. Ida Sotelo, the 17-year-old girl he abducted at gun point, was still with him and unharmed.

Garcia has signed a waiver and arrangements have been made to transport him back to Parmer County within a week or ten days.

Police officers have been

investigating the case since last August 3, when a 25-year-old Muleshoe woman was found dead of a gunshot wound six miles west of Bovina. Christy Sotelo, 25, was found dead at the scene and had been shot in the chest.

Tonya Parkinson, 22, also of Muleshoe, was taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital by Bovina Ambulance after sustaining a gunshot wound to the back.

Sheriff's officers had been searching for the 22-year-old Spanish male in connection with the shootings and murder of Christy Sotelo, as well as the kidnapping of her 17-year-old sister, Ida Sotelo, at gunpoint. Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan said he had talked to Ida Sotelo following the apprehension of Garcia and she appeared to be fine.

BHS Teams Begin '86 Cage Seasons

Bovina High School was beginning its 1986-87 basketball season with the Fillies visiting Friona Tuesday night.

Coach Marks Lanham had great seasons with his teams last season, guiding both the Fillies and the Mustangs into the playoffs.

Although the Fillies lost all-state Marie Pesch and four-year starter Terisa Shepherd, along with Donell Garner, they still have returning enough talent that has the team rated second in the South Plains area in pre-season.

Among the returnees is post-girl Mindy Neal, a senior, along with senior forward Robbie Stowers and senior forward Sharlet Johnson. Also back are junior guards Peggy Shepherd and Latrina Pearson, junior Ruby Renteria and senior Rosie Antillon.

For the Mustangs, senior Homer Renteria, Todd Ware, and junior Matt Fox and Steve Gauntt, along with sophomores Scott Scaff, Billy Scott Sudderrth, Denver Riddle, Bud Venable and Zed Stewart give the team a great nucleus to defend their district title.

The Fillies gained the regional finals last year before losing. The Mustangs fell in bi-district.

West World Cancels Lease With Clinic

West World Health Care, Inc., had cancelled its lease agreement with the Bovina Community Clinic prior to the recent announcement that West World was planning to close Muleshoe's West Plains Hospital and Clinic.

West World, which has been paying a lease of \$250 per month for about the last year, has kept their payments current, even including the current month.

Store Sets Opening

Wilhelm Satellite Rental opened its doors for business last week and the grand opening will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Owners are Joe and Bonnie Wilhelm. It is located at 218 North Main (the former Lone Star and Horn Insurance location).

Billy Whitecotton, spokesman for the Clinic board, said that as late as 60 days ago, West World had still been planning on putting a doctor in Bovina.

"When I called to find out what the delay was in getting a doctor here, they told me that our doctor was there in Muleshoe, and that he would be here by October 1," Whitecotton said. A few days after his conversation with the West World officials, they moved some equipment, including an X-Ray machine, to the clinic.

But then, on October 15, Whitecotton received a letter from Richard T. McClarney of West World Health Care, Inc., asking that the lease agreement between West World and Bovina Clinic be cancelled.

The original lease had been for a 30-year period, but could be cancelled on a 30-day notice. The Muleshoe hospital also had been leased for a 30-year period.

"When we first were contacted by these people, we checked out their credit and background, and were given assurance that their credit standing was top notch," Whitecotton said.

The local clinic board member said he personally felt that West World's pricing tactics ruined the corporation with the patients and prospective patients of West Plains Hospital.

In the lease agreement the

corporation held with the Bovina Clinic, West World has been furnishing insurance and upkeep on the building, paying the utilities, and keeping up the grounds.

"Bovina Medical Clinic was never out a cent. We never lost anything except possibly this time without a doctor," Whitecotton said. West World, Inc. had promised to provide a doctor for the local clinic. One physician had been hired by the corporation and was to locate in Bovina, but before he could move on site, the doctor passed away.

Whitecotton said that the movement to provide a local doctor is "back to square one--looking for a doctor."

It is generally felt that a full-time doctor, working at the local clinic, could make a nice living.

Members of the Bovina Clinic board are Eugene Scott, Ellen Estes, Pat Read, Tonya Gober, Sandy Ware, Larry Mitchell and Whitecotton. It was stated that as of November 17 the Clinic fund at First State Bank had a bank balance of \$3300.00.

There had been a lot of questions and rumors concerning the clinic, what with the West World Corp. being in the news, and Whitecotton said the board wanted to make this news release this week so residents of the community and area would know the facts.

Mustangs Finish '86 With Good Season

The Bovina High School Mustangs finished their football season at Anton last Friday, with the Bulldogs claiming a 22-6 win.

The Mustangs ended with a 3-4 district record, tied for fourth in the eight-team District 2-1A. They were 3-7 for the season.

"We saw a lot of improvement in the boys as the season went along. It was enjoyable seeing them progress and improve. I think that if this group hangs together that next year we could be bona-fide contenders for the district title," said Mustang Coach Bill Talley.

Talley pointed out that for one thing the team could have a good group of seniors next year, and this experience depth would be a big help. "The seniors we had this year did a great job, and I'm glad for their sake that we were able to turn things around in the win column. I feel that we've turned the corner at Bovina, and are ready for some good things to happen," Talley said.

The Mustangs' only score in the Anton game came on a 44-yard pass play from quarterback Albert Espinosa to Denver Riddle. Riddle ran a "fly" pattern and Espinosa threw a good pass, with Riddle catching it and going the distance. A try for points failed.

With about a minute to play in the game, Bovina had another scoring opportunity, having driven to the Anton 25-yard line. Riddle was wide open, but Espinosa was rushed and didn't have time to throw a good pass.

The Mustangs were forced to take to the air more than they had been, after the ankle injury suffered by fullback Todd Ware. Ware sprained an ankle in pre-game warmups. He still tried to play, and hurt the other ankle in the third quarter.

Talley said a difference in this game was the fact that Anton was able to control the ball. In Bovina's last four games or so, the Mustangs have been able to control the ball, but Anton turned the tables in the team's finale.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 20, 1956

Bovina, like the rest of Texas, is confused, undecided and split about which Thanksgiving to observe this year. The national holiday is November 22. The state holiday has been designated as November 29.

Possibly the smallest vote in modern history for the Bovina precinct turned out last Tuesday to vote on Amendment Nine. Eighteen poll taxpayers went to the polls. Seventeen voted for the amendment that will provide for disabled Texans, and one was against.

Bovina had a case each of burglary and bootlegging Sunday. The burglary remains unsolved while the bootleggers were apprehended by Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace and Bovina Deputy Frank Smith.

Charles Oil Co. was the burglary victim. Approximately \$70 in cash was taken from the office.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 22, 1961

Bovina will have a new Christmas lighting set-up this year. City's Christmas decorations have long been a subject of controversy. Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture directors decided at a special session Saturday to improve Christmas decoration situations with financial help from city and possibly Bovina Lions Club.

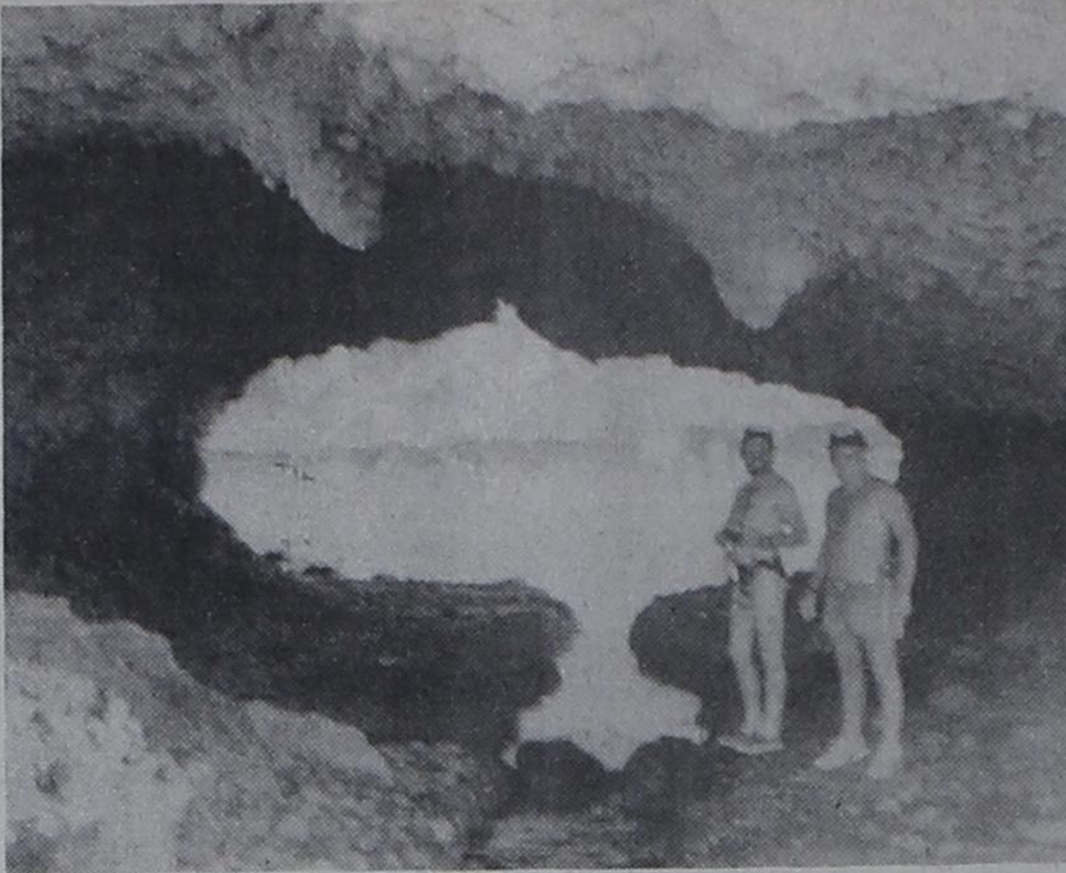
5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1981

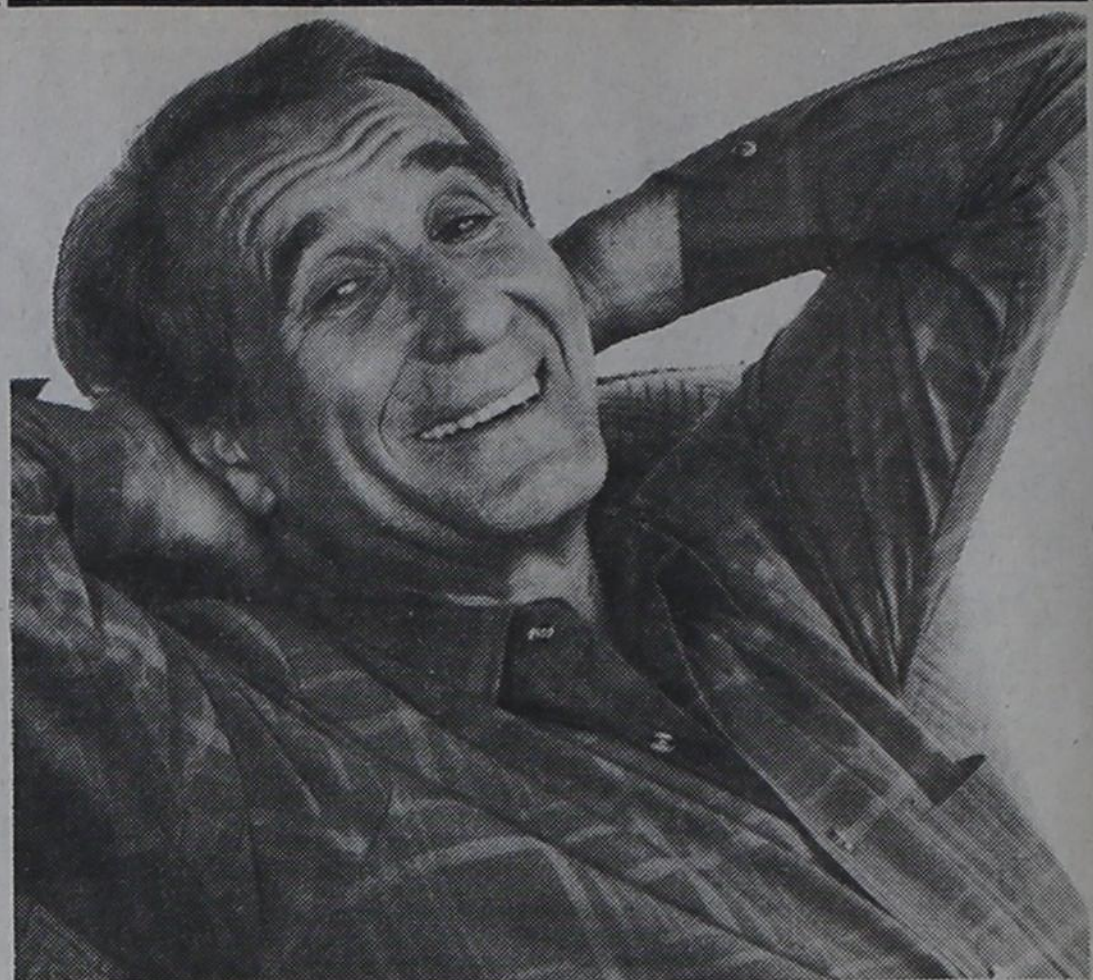
The deepest they traveled was about 100 feet and visibility was only about 80 feet. They carried 3,000 pounds of air on their backs.

Funeral services for Gabe David Anderson, 94, of Farwell, were held Tuesday at the First Baptist Church in Farwell.

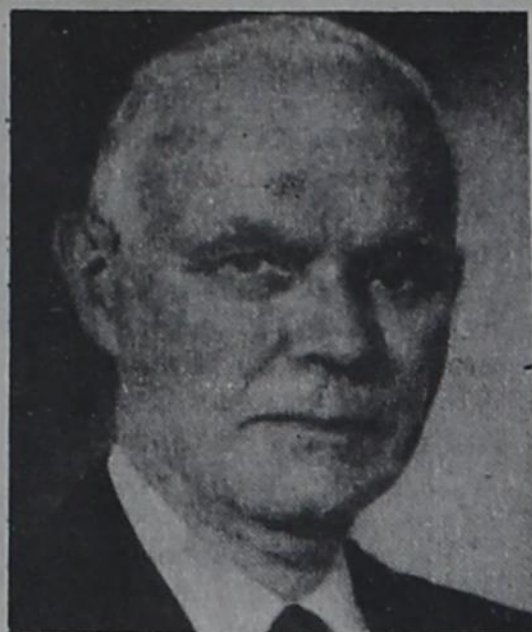
The Revs. J.L. Bass and Pat Riley officiated with burial at the Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery.

If taxpayers in Parmer County are dissatisfied with this year's taxes they should try to get a tax roll back. This can be done if the tax is eight per cent above the effective rate. If ten per cent of registered voters sign a petition in protest they can call for an election on a tax roll back. This was done in the county I live in a couple of years ago. The County Clerk or Tax Assessor should be able to give any needed information.
