





News From Our County Agent

County Agent H M. Breedlove is warning all farmers to keep a sharp watch on their cotton and feed for insects. The recent rains have set up perfect conditions for the hatching of insects. The best poisons to start using at this time on cotton are toxaphene and DDT in a two-one mix, or if you are dusting to use the same poisons in a dust. Breedlove added that cotton is now reaching the stage that leaf worms have begun to ap pear and some boll worm eggs have been found. These poisons will get best results on these insects and also give pretty good control of grasshoppers. A close check on the fields and starting poisoning before the insects get the jump on us will save heavier poisoning at a

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HJR #30-Number Three on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30 proposing an amendment to the Con-stitution of Texas to require that va-cancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as here-after to read as follows: "Section 28. Vacancies In Offices Of Judges Of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor. "Vacancies in the office of judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Crim-inal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next suc-ceeding General Election; and vacan-cies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commis-sioners Court only until the next Gen-eral Election." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amend-ment providing that vacancies in the

ment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Com-missioners Court only until the next General Election."

General Election." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amend-ment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas. Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner re-quired by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the ereation of a Hospital District coex-tensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas; au-thorizing the County of Potter to ren-der financial aid to and participate in the operation of such Hospital District; authorizing the Commissioners Court of said county to assess and levy taxes on property outside the incorporated limits of such city; further authorizing a countywide Hospital District for Wichita County, Texas, and authorizing the creation of two districts in Jef-ferson County; and further providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character. X of the Constitutio n of t

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the onstitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows: "Section 5 (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coexten-ive with and have the same boun-daries as the incorporated City of Ama-ries as the other to be coexten-sive with Wichita County. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by reso-lution assume the responsibilities, obli-gations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent herein-above provided for political subdivi-sions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.
