Of course in the United States, in spite of our complaints about food prices, most foods are not too unreasonable. In many foreign countries, the foods which are produced there are cheap enough, but imported items are tremendously high by our standards. For instance, a picture in the current National Geographic Magazine shows a market in Poland where items from the United States are sold. A well known candy bar, priced at 5¢ here, sells for \$2.00 in this market. Most of the Polish people must be satisfied with merely looking, at this market.

Americans are slow to change their eating habits, and most of their likes and dislikes come from their childhood. A boy who grew up in the timber country likes squirrel, yet often turns up his nose at rabbit. A boy raised in the bayou country loves frog legs, but an adult who does not know their delicious flavor will usually not eat them. Probably more of the old staples, Potatoes, Pinto Beans and Blackeyed Peas, are eaten in this area than all other foods combined.

Notice is hereby given to whom concerned that Greenbelt Municipal And Industrial Water Authority, the postoffice address of which is Hedley, Texas, on the 11th day of August, 1958, filed its application in the office of the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, in which it applies for a permit to appropriate of the unappropriated waters of the State of Texas, from the Salt Fork of the Red River in Donley County, Texas, not to exceed 30,000 acre feet of water per annum, 18,000 acre feet for municipal use and 12,000 acre feet for industrial use; capacity of proposed reservoir 100,500 acre feet, being more fully set out in said application.

Station 40-00 of the proposed dam is located at a point which bears south 1200 feet from the northwest corner of H. & G. N. R. R. Company, Block 21, Section No. 117, on the north bank of Salt Fork of Red River in Donley County, Texas, and is distant approximately 10.0 miles in a northerly direction from Hedley, Texas.

A hearing on the application of the said Greenbelt Municipal And Industrial Water Authority will be held by the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, in the office of the Board at Austin, Texas, on Monday, October 6, 1958, beginning at two o'clock p. m., at which time and place all parties interested may appear and be heard. Those opposing the granting of said application should file written protests with the Board and the applicant at least five days prior to hearing date, giving their reasons therefor and such other information as is required by Board Rule 305.2. Such hearing will be continued from time to time, and from place to place if necessary, until such determination has been made relative to said application as the said Board of Water Engineers may deem right, equitable and proper.
