Cotton Festival

The Seventh Annual Hedley Cotton Festival last Friday and Saturday has now passed into history, and perhaps we can set down a partial account of it. A large part of Hedley's population worked on it in one way or another, and we will not attempt to name them for fear of leaving out some person worthy of mention.

Friday's big event was the kiddie parade at 11:15. Ribbons were won by the Fire Dept. and Civil Defense unit as the best in parade, by Sgt. Highlight of the entire Festival, naturally, was the coronation of the 1958 Queen. This honor went to Patti Patton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. M. Patton of Quail, Miss Patton will reign over the Festival next year until a new queen is elected. Royal princesses were Brenda White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oeie White of Quail, and Joy Nan Wood, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wood. Sixteen other beautiful girls formed the procession of honorary princesses, and together with the three chosen girls, nobly upheld the reputation of this area for having pretty girls.

Church Commended

The following appeared in last Saturday's Amarillo News:

Dallas, Oct. 10—The District 10 Church Achievement Award, sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas, has been granted to the First Baptist Church of Hedley.

The district's 19 county area extends from Hall County to the north, east and west borders of the Texas Panhandle. It includes 105 churches and seven missions with more than 57,200 members, and is one of 17 areas in the state in which the achievement program is carried on.

The Hedley church will be one of 17 to be judged for statewide honors as Texas Baptists convene in San Antonio Nov. 3 to 5.

Dr. O. C. Curtis of Amarillo, district missions secretary, said the Hedley church during the past year conducted an improvement program to win the award. It built a new \$35,000 sanctuary, with men of the church donating cost of the labor to replace a building destroyed by fire.

Rev. J. S. Tipton, pastor, said members of his congregation re finished several educational areas and landscaped the church grounds in other improvement projects. The new sanctuary includes four Sunday School rooms, a baptistry, administrative offices and central heating and cooling equipment. Community improvement projects included youth recreational programs, vacation Bible schools, and spring and fall revivals, while world improvement projects were gifts to missions through the Texas Baptists' cooperative program and contributions to a Chinese scholarship student.

Mrs. C. E. Moore of Newlin, mother of Henry Moore of Hedley, who suffered a broken leg last Thursday, is reported doing as well as could be expected.

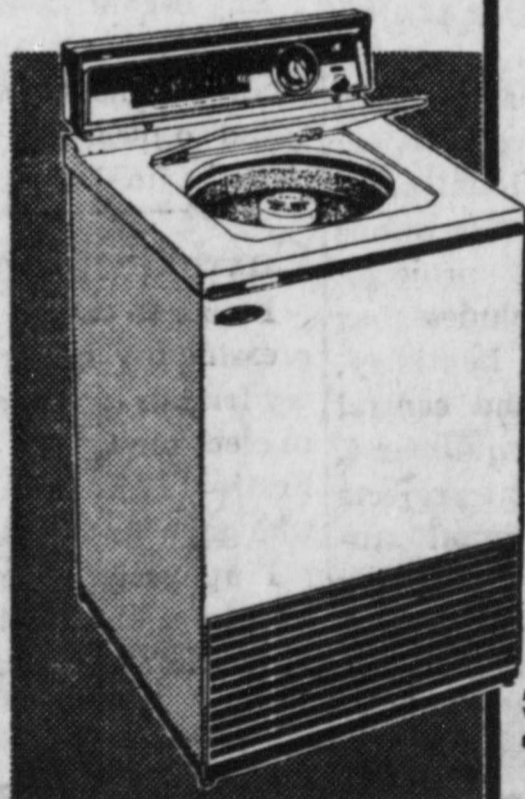

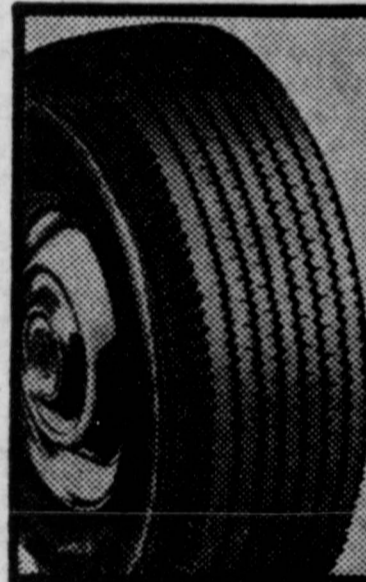
