

Burglars Strike Two Bovina Firms Again

For the sixth time since the first of the year, burglars have struck business firms in Bovina. Victims of the burglars Thursday night were Gee Cleaners and Gaines Hardware Co.

Gaines also lost some \$600 in a break-in in March. Three windows were smashed in the boiler room and the back door to the shop was pried off at the cleaning establishment,

according to John Gee. The burglars left their tools at the site. About a dozen .22 caliber bullets were missing, said Gee, and a typewriter was damaged in the incident. No clothes were

missing as far as he could determine. Pocket and hunting knives, watches and radios were taken at the hardware store, reported

Mrs. Neal Mager. Entrance to the building was made through a side window toward the front of the store. About \$200 worth of merchandise was missing, although Mrs. Mager stated they

were still discovering items taken in the first theft in March. She stated the burglars swept up the broken glass from the window in a neat pile before they departed.

In a move to halt the recent rash of burglaries, Bovina's city council recently moved City Marshal Ronald Mitchell to a night shift in an attempt to deter further incidents.

Texas' trailer law, which went into effect back at the first of the year and has been a source of considerable irritation and some expense to farmers and ranchers, is due to be changed at the next session of the legislature, promises Bill Clayton of Springlake, our favorite state representative.

Clayton explains that the new law in regard to trailers wasn't as great on paper as it turned out to be in actuality. He points out that the previous trailer laws hadn't been enforced. When the new one went into effect with threats of enforcing it, the overall change was great enough to create unhappiness among agriculturists who use trailers in their business.

Clayton didn't say how the law will be changed, but we're guessing the end result will be more pleasing to the aforementioned farmers and ranchers.

There was a time around here that a promise to get the trailer law changed would have been second only to a good rain in the "good news" category.

Clayton represented this district on a four-member panel of legislators at the Panhandle Press Association convention in Amarillo over the weekend. He did a fine job of explaining working of the state government to the press people.

We're proud to have him as our representative. And that sentence didn't include anything about the fact that we sometimes disagree with Clayton.

In a straw vote, the Panhandle Press people said they felt Dolph Briscoe would carry their areas and the Panhandle, individually and collectively, in the May 6 Democratic Primary Election for the governorship. We usually work at being out of step with the majority in such polls, but this particular time we were on the winning side, so to speak.

Still pretty well agreed, it seems to us, is the fact that the people of Texas are ready for a change of some kind in their state government.

Only two of the four front-runners in the gubernatorial race can provide the kind of change we're looking for, in our opinion. And Briscoe has the better chance of those two of getting elected.

We're for him, as we said here earlier.

The informality of country politics on the High Plains was demonstrated some years ago in a neighboring county.

Names will not be used here to protect the guilty, but the story goes like this:

The Democratic chairman (Republicans are more dignified) of this particular neighboring county was shooting pool when the Congressman, United States variety, came by to file for re-election. They tended to the matter right there in the pool hall, on the felt table, with the necessary papers, or whatever, being signed.

With that out of the way, the county chairman, as nicely as possible under the circumstances, told his important political friend, "If that's all you need with me now, I'm getting ready to shoot."

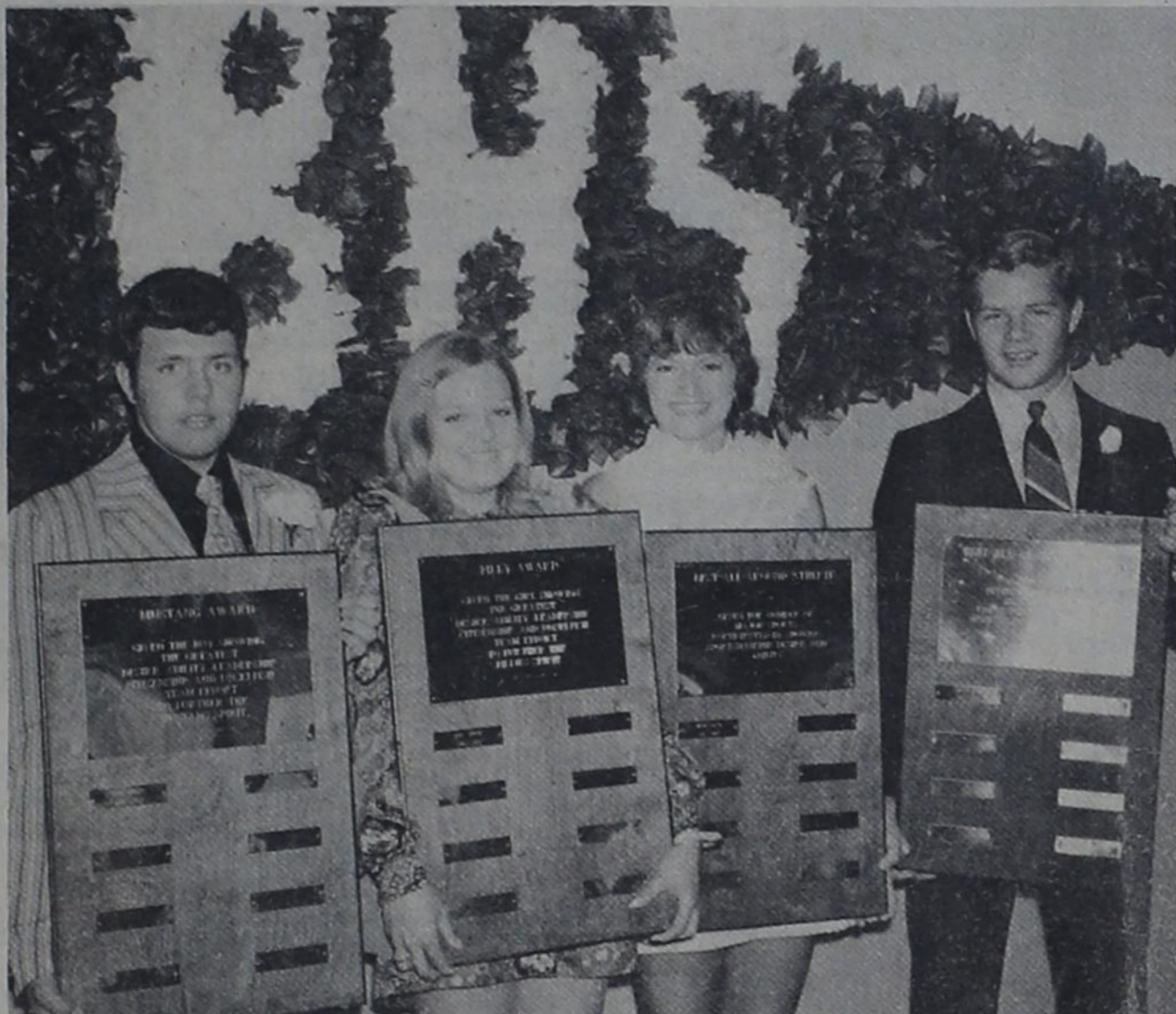
That was nicer, in our estimation, than saying, "I'm busy; get out of the way!"

Mention of county chairmen brings to mind that particular office in Parmer County doesn't have an announced candidate in next month's Demc primary.

Nelson Welch of Friona, who has handled the duties of the non-paying office for the past several years, announced prior to the filing deadline that he wouldn't be a candidate to succeed himself. No one filed for a position on the ballot. Therefore, there will be a space on the ballot to write-in your choice of individuals for the office.

As far as we know, there are no announced candidates for election by the now-necessary write-in method.

Plane Crash Claims G. E. Eakins' Life

Garold Eugene Eakins, 34, of Bovina died in the wreckage of his spray plane about 7 a.m. Saturday after it apparently stalled in a turn and crashed into a pasture about a quarter mile north of Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis.

Mr. Eakins was a pilot for Chuck's Aerial Spraying Service of Bovina.

New Mexico state highway patrolmen at the scene said it appeared that Eakins died instantly when the plane hit the ground. It gouged a hole in the earth, then skidded several feet before coming to a rest. The plane's propeller was embedded in the ground at the point of impact. One of the wheels of the aircraft was found an estimated 100 feet from the wreckage.

Two witnesses saw the crash, according to Alan Brockmeier, state patrolman, Mike F. Doshier of Farwell, who was flagging for Eakins, and an airman who

was just entering Cannon when he saw the plane crash. He reported it to the main gate at the base.

Eakins had made one pass across a field of sugar beets owned by J. L. Wall. He was flying south and was in the process of turning to make another pass when the crash occurred.

Both witnesses told investigators the plane climbed sharply at the end of the first pass, then appeared to stall at about 150 feet in altitude. From that point, the single-engine Piper

PA-25 Pawnee dived almost straight to the ground.

It was estimated that the aircraft contained approximately 1,000 pounds of liquid weed spray, according to a spokesman at the spraying service.

Eakins' body was taken by Cannon ambulance to the base hospital and later transferred to a Clovis mortuary where an autopsy was performed. The

body was later transported to Claborn Funeral Home in Friona.

Funeral services for Mr. Eakins were conducted Monday afternoon at St. Ann's Catholic Church in Bovina with Rev. Norman Boyde officiating. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery. A rosary service was held

Reminds ASCS --

Farm Program Deadlines Set

Farmers participating in one or more of the 1972 farm programs have a number of dates to remember and deadlines to meet, according to Prentice Mills, head of the ASCS office at Farwell.

The most important dates include the following:

- April 17-28 -- Signup period for cost-share assistance under REAP conservation program.
- April 30 -- 1971 crop wheat loans mature.
- May 1 -- Final date for reporting wheat, barley and set-aside.
- May 3 -- Final date for completing cotton transfers.
- June 10 -- Final date for sugarbeet producers to report 1972 planted acres.
- July 15 -- Final date for reporting all feed grain and cotton acreages.

A portion of these dates are important to all farmers in this area and some only to a few, said Mills. ASCS personnel suggest that farmers should set up a "Farm Program Calendar" for themselves as these dates are important and failure to observe one of them usually results in a financial loss to the farmer involved.

The big one to remember, points out Mills, is the May 1 date. "This date is very important to practically every farmer in this area. This is the one that most program payments hinge upon," concluded Mills.

In Farwell Speech --

Sen. Tower Optimistic About Farm Prices

U. S. Senator John Tower, Republican incumbent, discussed economics, the Vietnam war, stock scandal in Texas, agricultural community and weather at a barbecue sponsored by Parmer County friends of John Tower at Farwell School cafeteria Friday night.

About 200 persons attended, including Republican dignitaries and representatives from civic organizations throughout the area.

Don Spring, president of Bo-

vina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, was among those present.

Glenn Lust, Parmer County Republican chairman, introduced Sen. Tower.

Tower told the crowd he had recently testified at a hearing against imposing price controls. The agricultural community is one element of society that has never aspired to great collective power and never abused it, Tower commented.

"In the last 20 years, prices of the farmers product have gone up six per cent, while the price of retail foods have risen 43 per cent," he said. "The problem doesn't begin down on the farm, it lies in the tremendous increase of labor costs," Tower stated.

The senator expressed his belief that the economy in 1972 will be in better shape than several years ago. Tower's

Lose An Hour --

DST Rears Head Sunday

Come Sunday morning 48 states in the U. S., including this one, will arise an hour earlier. That's when Daylight Savings Time goes into effect this year.

Services at Bovina Churches will begin an hour earlier Sunday with, as usual, several arriving at church just as it is dismissed. Work days will also begin an hour earlier next week.

Daylight Savings Time will continue through the summer months with Standard Time scheduled to return in October.

The official time to move the clocks forward an hour is 2 a.m. Sunday.

The only states in the union to veto DST were Arizona and Hawaii.

In view of many rural areas in the U.S., including mothers of small school children, frowning on the six-months period of DST, legislation has been introduced in the U. S. House of Representatives to limit DST to the three summer months. Some action is expected to be taken on the measure this year. One Texas legislator suggests that those interested in the change write their representatives about their desires in the matter.

optimist stems from his belief that the U. S. has realized the value of the dollar in relationship with other countries. "We have also secured agreements with common market countries," he added.

Tower said he felt there would be good markets for feed grains and soybeans this year and said all indications point to a better market abroad.

During a question and answer period, Tower discussed his views on the Vietnam war. "I think if we go north again, we need to bomb oil supplies and other vital areas. Since when is trying to beat the enemy escalating the war," he commented.

Military strength, in his opinion, seems to be the answer to the problem of securing the release of prisoners of the war.

"It has been a pleasure for me to represent the people of this state," Tower said in reaffirming his intentions to seek another term in the Senate.

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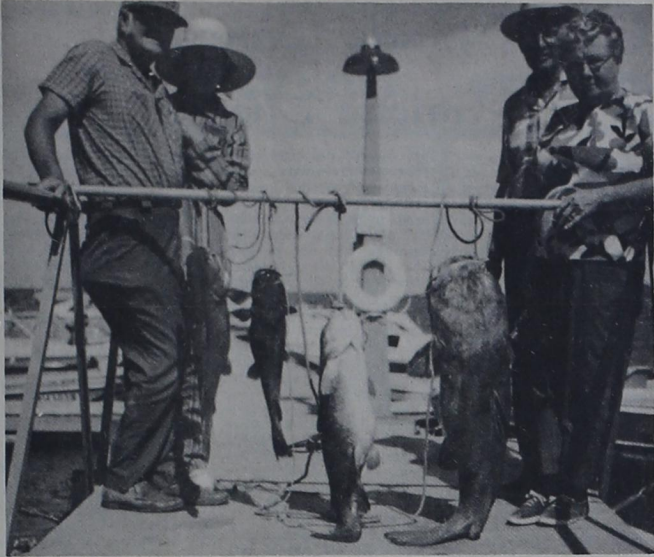

Following the luncheon, the directors of the SWCD held their regular business meeting.



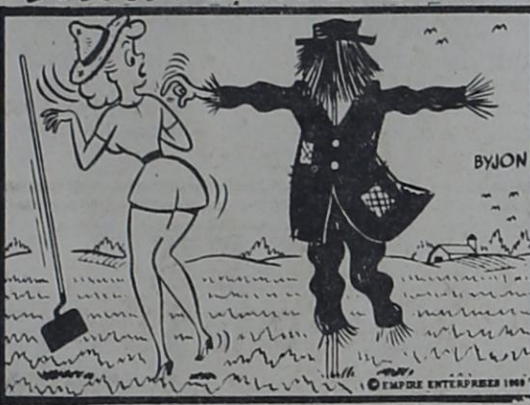
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Society Elects New Officers

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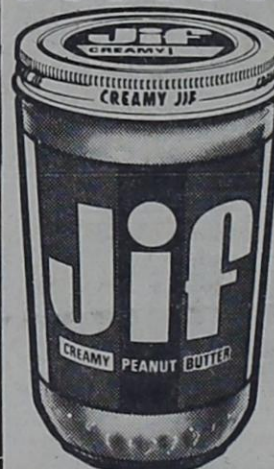
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6 Fillies Advance To Regional
