Greenbelt Dam News Cotton Festival

State Representative Will Ehrle reported Saturday on the progress of the Greenbelt Water Authority.

In a letter report Ehrle said, "The engineers' complete report and estimate on the total cost of the project should be available around the last of November."

Ehrle stated that efforts to secure aid for the project on the state level had been "most successful."

"The State Board of Water Engineers and the Texas Water Development Board are ready to aid and help us in any way possible."

Ehrle reported that the aerial photographic mapping and the core drilling had all been accomplished "at a very minimum cost to the cities."

It was stated that the engineers' report would be of instrumental value in determining the feasibility of the Greenbelt Water project and also for further water planning by all the cities involved.

"Then the decision," said Ehrle, "as to what course each town shall take is, of course, for the citizens and their respective city officials to determine."
