## ASC News

Any farmer who fails to take steps to prevent his Conservation Reserve acreage from becoming a source of spreading noxious weeds violates his contract, Chairman Cooke of the Donley County ASC said this month.
"The Conservation Reserve contract specifically requires the farmer to keep noxious weeds under control," Mr. Cooke said, "Failure to do so may result in the forfeiture or refund of the total annual payments for the farm plus the amount of cost-sharing for carrying out the conservation use on the particular field."
Commenting on questions received about the Conservation Reserve as a source of weeds, the chairman said that false impressions may result at times from weeds growing on land not connected with the program. In any farming area, be points out, there are areas of idle land, fallow land, roadways, and similar tracts that provide places for the development of weed growth.
