ACP Program

We have just completed a very successful Soil and Water Conservation Program here in Donley County and are looking forward to another year of service to our many farmers and ranchers. Nearly 400 farmers participated in the 1960 ACP.

Release and Reapportionment of 1961 Cotton Allotments

The release and reapportionment provisions of the cotton allotment procedure provides a means whereby allotments can be diverted from the farms where this allotment is unwanted to farms where the allotted acreage is wanted and needed. Cotton farmers, by availing themselves of the privileges provided in this procedure, can help maintain their own cotton allotments, can help maintain the county allotment, and can contribute to a strong agricultural economy for the country.

Cotton farmers can make this release and reapportionment provision work for their benefit and the benefit of the county in one of the following ways:

1. By releasing any unwanted cotton allotment for your farm;
2. By requesting an increase in your allotment from released acreage if you have land, labor, and equipment available for the production of additional acreage of cotton; and
3. By planting any acreage allotted to your farm which is not released.

Proper forms for release, or applications for increased acreage be obtained at the county ASC office.

Hedley-McLean Road To Be Built

Hedley citizens were delighted last week when D. C. Greer, State highway engineer, announced that the proposed road from Hedley to McLean had been approved by the Highway Commission. The definite location will be delayed until the location of the proposed Salt Fork dam is established, but this approval means that the road will be built.

Length of the road will be about 23 miles, some 19 of which will be in Donley County. District engineer Palmer Massey of Childress estimates the cost of the Donley County strip at \$973,500, and the portion in Gray County is estimated to cost \$90,000. Mr. Massey states that the highway department expects to have a definite location on the dam within the next three or four months, and that if they are able to start on the road at that time, it should be completed around the first of next year.

In addition to the efforts put forth by R. W. Scales and the local road committee, Commissioner Frank Murray and many other local citizens, this community also deeply appreciates the time, money and effort expended by E. L. Sitter, Boyd Meador and many other McLean citizens, who have joined Hedley men in making every effort to obtain this much needed road.

New Car Tags On Sale

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer reminds Texas motorists that the renewal period for motor vehicle license plates takes in the months of February and March. The 1961 plates have black letters and numbers on a white background.

Greer stressed the importance of registering all vehicles in the county of residence, since the penalty for operating a vehicle without home-county plates is the same as for no plates at all. Also, a portion of all fees remains in the home county to benefit the local community.

Motorists are also reminded that they must take their certificate of title and their 1960 licence receipt when they go to obtain 1961 plates.

Work Progressing On Dial System

Hedley came another step closer to dial telephone service last week, as the installation of central office equipment was begun in General Telephone's new local exchange building.

A two man crew from Leich Electrical Company began installation of the modern all relay dial equipment which will be put in use in May.

General Telephone district manager, Roy L. Brewer of Memphis, also reported that outside plant crews are busily preparing cable and open wire facilities for the "cutover"

Hedley is also scheduled for a new numbering plan which will be placed in effect at the time of the dial conversion. At that time all local telephone numbers will consist of seven digits.

Brewer stated that this system is being initiated by all companies to conform with the Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) plan already in use in some cities

"The direct distance dialing plan allows telephone users to place long distance calls without assistance from an operator," said Brewer

Brewer indicated that the DDD system would really "come into its own" during this decade, and direct long distance dialing for the majority of our nation in in the "not too distant future"

Vehicle Inspection

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety, has again urged motorists to get their 1961 vehicle inspection stickers before "the time gets short and the lines get long."

Deadline for the inspection is April 15, and Garrison warns that vehicles not displaying the new sticker after that date will be operating in violation of the law.

"The 4,800 authorized inspection stations over the state are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles without delay if owners do not wait until just a few days before the deadline," Garrison said.

Saunders Garage is the local inspection station for the Hedley area.

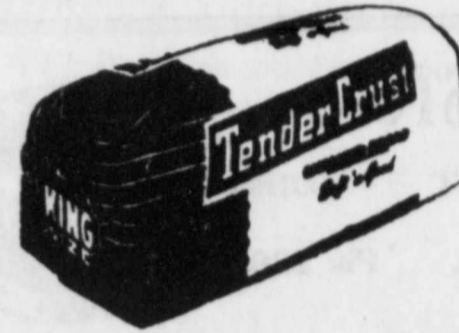
