



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

Tax On Subscriptions

In accordance with the provisions of the new Texas sales tax the Informer will have to collect the sales tax on all subscriptions within the State of Texas. Subscriptions to points outside Texas are not taxed.

Since we did not learn the details of this tax in time to give our subscribers what we consider a fair warning, through the month of September only we will absorb the tax ourselves. In other words, during September only, the subscription price for the Informer will remain at \$2 00 in Donley County and \$2 50 outside Donley County. On Oct. 1st the price will go to \$2 04 in Donley County and \$2 55 elsewhere. So if you want to save the tax when you subscribe, do it this month.

Please do not misunderstand this offer. The tax on these subscriptions will be paid, but if you subscribe during September, we will pay it for you.

Your subscription does not have to be out for you to take advantage of this offer.





