Diverted Acreage-Wheat and Feed Grain Programs

In order that normal reduction in wheat and feed grain production on diverted acreage may be secured and eligibility nequire ments and performance regulation provisions be met, the areas designated by the farm operator as disions:

1. Orchards: Cropland land with in orchards may qualify as divertto intensively cultivated crops during at least one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961 and meets the diverted acreage use requirements of the program.

2 Turn Rows: Turn rows and end rows used as turn rows in the operation of mechanical harvesting equipment may not be designated as diverted acreage.

3. Fallow: Summer fallow diverted acreage and plant to small grain winter crop (such as rye or wheat) with the permission of the County Committee

Wheat Marketing Cards:

Wheat Marketing cards will be mailed to all eligible producers when wheat compliance has been determined A producer may man ket the wheat from all his farms on the same marketing card. The 1962 National Average Price Support rate is \$200 per bushel. We have not yet received the Donley County support rate Final Payments: Final payments for Wheat and Feed Grain diverted acres will not be made until early fall. The 42 Club ASCS office will notify each eligible farmer so he can come in for his payment.




