

For School --

Plans are underway, according to a newsstory in this week's paper, to get a new track for Bovina Schools.

The idea originated this time through the athletic department and then to the Mustang Booster Club.

A new track we need along with some other things. The school district here has

gone through a period of a few years of not thinking progressively enough from a school --and athletic --- standpoint.

A few years ago, we turned down a couple of bond elections which would have provided for a new football field, fieldhouse and other school improvements.

The elections weren't onesided, as we remember without looking back at the records, but a majority of the voters just weren't in favor of the improvements. Probably, we didn't do a good enough job of selling the Ideas of the leaders of the projects. If we had, the elections probably would have carried.

By making mention of these bygones, we're not attempting to encourage controversy or re-open old wounds; we're simply saying that we do need more and better athletic facilities. And besides that, we've needed them for the past few years.

In other words, the need is not necessarily a new one.

Everything But Moisture --



Strangely enough, it seems from here that often the school's best supporters turn out to be its biggest enemies when the wordathletics is mentioned.

These folks, and fine people they are, say that we need things to learn with more than we need better things to play with. That's the way they start a conversation about athletic facility improvements.

We have no quarrel with them. We wish our school was the best in the United States academically. And our wishes don't stop there. We wish we could say the same thing for it athletically!

The people who push for higher academic standards have a tendency to do so only when there is an athletic improvement project in the mill. When it's dropped, they worry no more about the academic improvements.

These people, if we read them correctly and we probably don't, want to improve the school system academically ... at the expense of athletics.

That's not right.

The two, academics and athletics, go hand in hand. At least that's what we've been led to believe down through the years. Improve one and the other also benefits.

Abraham Lincoln, the greatest Republican president this country ever had, said something about "you can't help the poor by tearing down the rich."

The same theory holds true, in our opinion, when you consider helping the school academically and not improving it athletically.

As a school district, we have no reason, other than shortsightedness, not to have facilities for all school activities as good as the best.

Take away school districts which have the advantage of oil incomes and we're as well off as any of them and a heap better than most. Compare our area with the other school districts from a natural resources standpoint and we daresay you'll find us at the top of the group.

By natural resources, we mean the ability to pay school taxes. And we don't mean to say in this space at this time that we're in favor of additional school taxes. On the contrary.


Tuesday morning's temperature was in the mid-40's which meant there was an overnight temperature drop of some 50 degrees.







PECAN PIE SURPRISE BARS 1 pkg. yellow cake mix 1/2 c. butter or margarine, melted FILLING: 2/3 c. of reserved cake mix 1/2 c. firmly packed brown

sugar 1 1/2 c. dark corn syrup 1 t. vanilla 3 eggs

1 c. chopped pecans Generously grease 13x9 inch baking pan. Reserve 2/3 c. dry cake mix for filling. In large mixing bowl, combine remaining dry cake mix, butter and one egg; mix until crumbly. Press in prepared pan and bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees until light golden brown.






