Cotton and Feed Grain Performance

The performance will be much more difficult this year than in previous years. It is important that you take time out from your busy schedule and go with the reporter in order that he may more accurately measure your cotton, feed grains, and diverted acres. The reporter must be informed as to each producer who will have an interest in the feed grain crop and their percentage share as this will affect the price support payment.

Please keep in mind that the wheat shown on our records as wheat for grain can not be designated as diverted acres. If you have any questions concerning the eligibility of your diverted acres, please come to the county office.

Judging of three classes of female breeding herefords and three classes of hereford bulls was done by 35 4-H and FFA teams from over the Panhandle area.

Donley County 4-H club was second in the judging with a team total of 813 points of a possible 900 points. Team members with their individual scores were David Mooring of Lelia Lake with a 277 of a possible 300 points, Gene Floyd of Hedley with a 273 and Darrell Holland of Hedley with a 263. The team won a big bronze trophy of a hereford cow and calf.

Flip Breedlove and Jake Hess of McLean gave a 45 minute demonstration on selection, feeding and trimming of club calves and bulls for the show ring. Bill Mooring took the 4-H members to the field day and other members attending were Sandy and Richard Thornberry.

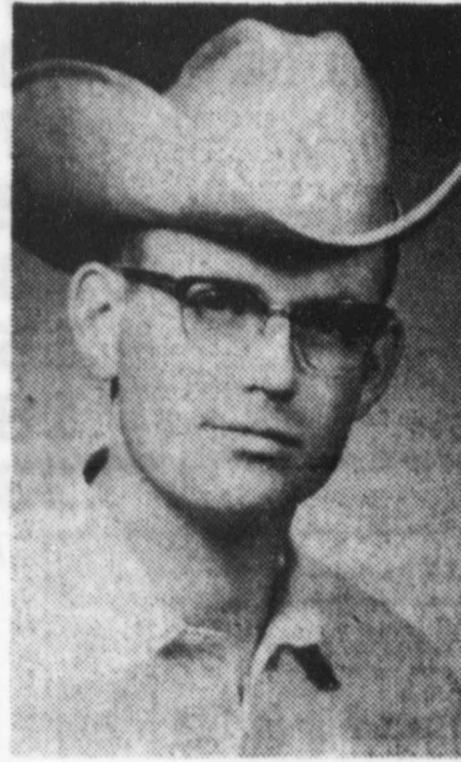
in Hereford.

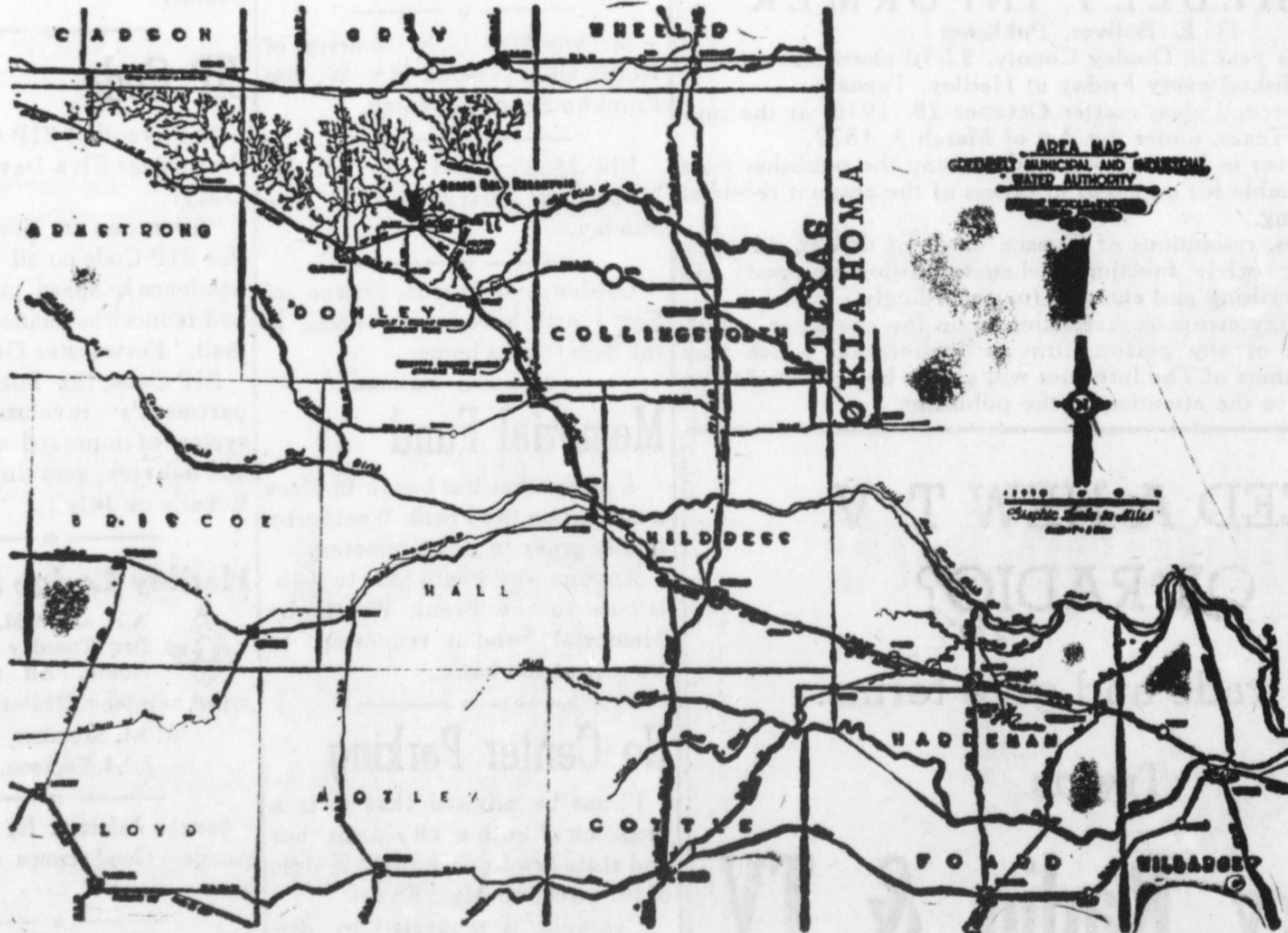
