## A. S. C. News

### Cotton and Feed Grain Performance

We are approximately 50% complete in measuring cotton, feed grain, and diverted acreages. The cooperation producers have given the reporters has been appreciated and has helped greatly to speed up measuring operations as well as insure accuracy. By all means watch your mail carefully for the notice that will advise you of the results of your farm measurement.

If for any reason the farm is not in compliance adjustment must be made within 15 days from the date of the notice.

### Cotton

If you failed to plant at least 75% of your farm cotton allotment because of excessive rain, flood, hail, drouth, lack of water on irrigated farms, or illness of the farm operator or other producer, you may request in writing that the County Committee adjust the base. The County Committee may determine that the acreage would have been planted if one of the above conditions had not existed and full history credit will be given. The written request must be received by September 15, 1963

1964 Wheat  
The wheat allotment notices which you received in April are still in effect for 1964 wheat. There will be no marketing quota penalty on wheat in excess of your allotment. However, over planting will result in reduction of his tory credit for future allotments. Those of you who have Conservation Reserve contracts are reminded that the contract calls for compliance with farm acreage allotments. Loss of annual payment would result from violations.

### ACP

Cost share payments on completed conservation practices have been scheduled by the County Office and producers should receive their checks in the near future. If you have completed a practice and have not reported performance on it, do so at your earliest convenience.

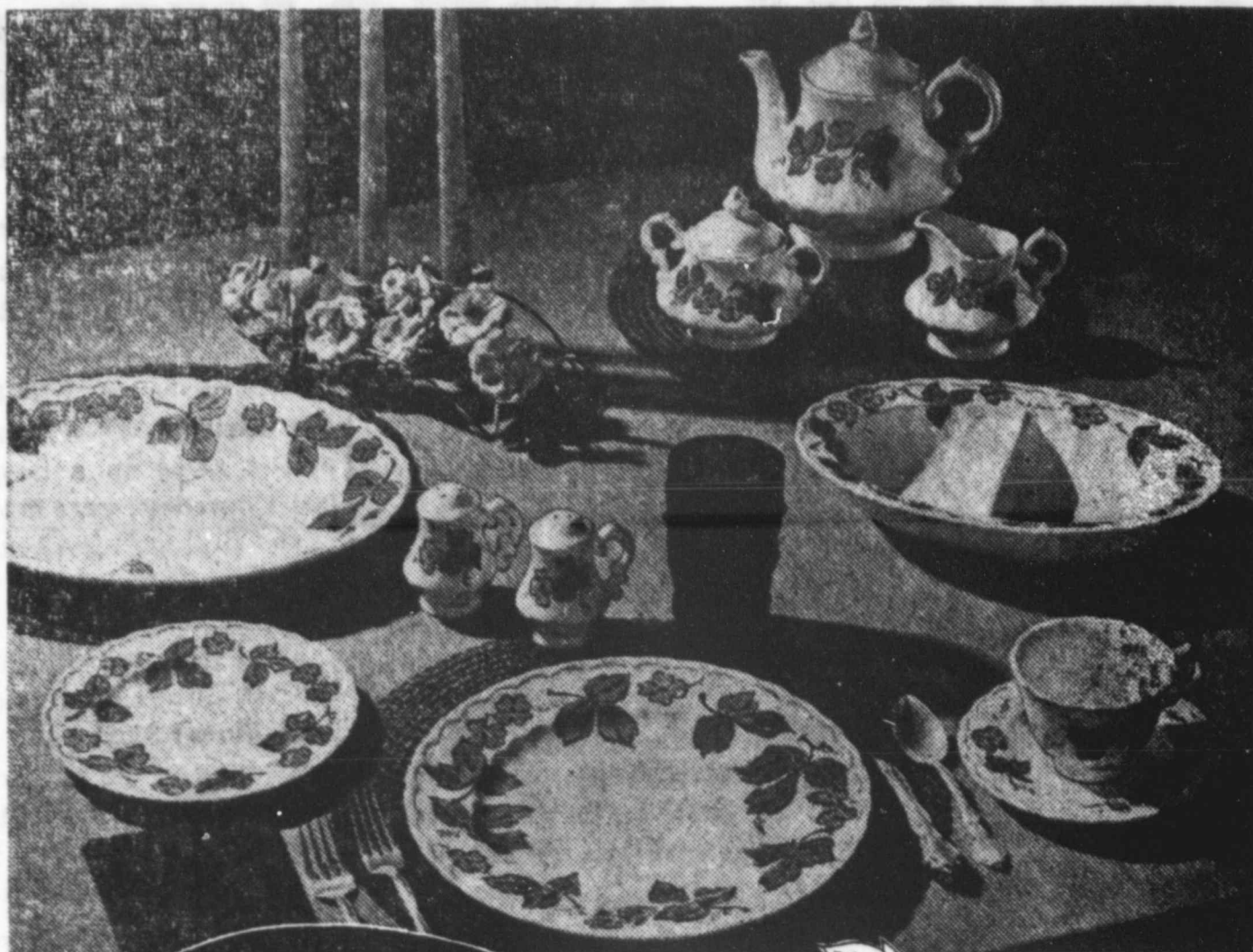

**Farm Facts**

According to the Economic Research Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the average American is eating more fruit than he did 50 years ago.

One person ate an average of about 172 pounds of fruit per year during 1910-14. Today the average person eats about 200 pounds of fresh fruit equivalent yearly.

Today 50% of the fruit we eat is processed, compared to only 13% back in 1910. The increase in use of processed fruit—particularly canned and frozen—has been about fivefold and has more than offset the per capita decrease in fresh fruit consumption since 1910.

Back in 1910 folks were eating a lot of dried fruit. It accounted for about 78% of the processed fruit in those days. Use of dried fruit has been declining since 1920.

In the 100 pounds of processed fruit we consume annually, 53% is canned fruit and fruit juice; 35% is frozen



fruit and fruit juice; and 12% is dried fruit. Citrus accounts for about half the processed fruit we eat.

Consumption of frozen fruits and juices has more than made up for a decline in use of canned fruits.

## Rogers Sponsors Letter Contest

Can you say YES! to America? Do you have faith in your country's future? Do you believe that the courage of our people and the strength of our institutions will carry our Nation to new glories?

I like to see patriotism expressed. Now that it's summer, with the youngsters home from school, I'd like to hear from Panhandle folks

—young and old—on this topic: "I Say Yes to America"

I'd like to see expressions of faith in America and its destiny from children and their parents—letters, not formal essays, stating their continuing faith in their country.

I'm opening a kind of contest—one in which everyone wins. First of all those who write letters on the topic "I Say Yes! to America" will have benefited by giving deep reflection to their feelings about their country and putting their feelings in words. Second, those

of us who read the letters—and I'll publish the most inspirational statements as part of a future newsletter—will benefit by seeing the convictions expressed by fellow citizens

In a more material way, everyone who sends a letter on the topic will win. To each letter writer I will send copies of two booklets "How Our Laws Are Made," a most interesting and accurate explanation of the Federal legislative process, and "Our American Government, What is it? How Does it Function?"

In addition, I will send other worthwhile books to the writers of the five letters adjudged to be most expressive in each of four age categories. These books are "Inaugural Addresses of Presidents of the United States" and the two volume, authoritative study prepared by the House Committee on Un American Activities, "Facts on Communism"

The letters will be judged in these age categories:

- 1 Grade School (grades 1-6)

- 2 Junior High School (grades 7-9)

- 3 Senior High School (grades 10-12)

- 4 Adult

To the writers of the best letters in each category, I'll send an American flag, a flag that has flown over the Capitol of the United States, as well as the books and booklets. One of my most distinguished colleagues in the House of Representatives will be given the five letters I've picked as best in each category. He in turn will pick the flag winners.

I hope the letters flood into the office. Be sure and give me your name and address and the category in which your letter should be placed. All letters postmarked by midnight Sunday, August 25th, will be considered in the competition. I'll announce the winners in a newsletter early in September.

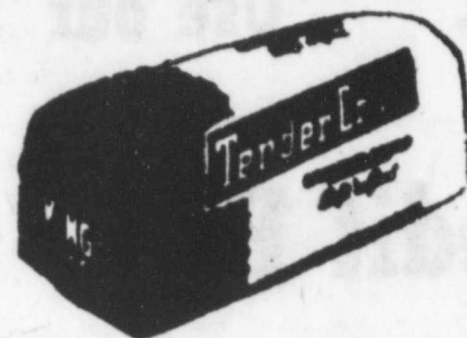
