LAST SATURDAY'S presidential preference primary, the first ever conducted in Texas, drew a lot of comment from voters prior to the election.

A lot of people were upset with the fact that they could not vote a "split ticket." For instance, several wanted to vote in the Ford-Reagan GOP race, but still vote in the county's Democratic primary, which featured locally contested races.

We understand that in the Friona GOP precinct convention, a resolution was proposed that would allow the two primaries to be conducted as one, with such "ballot splitting" being permitted. The prospects, and the practicality of such an arrangement are probably minute.

We would hasten to point out that while the separate primaries cause voters to make a choice as to who and what they would rather be voting for, it also affords the grassroots voter much more of a say-so as to who gets the presidential nomination.

You may have forgotten, but in the past, we had no presidential candidates listed on the ballot. The favorite nominees were previously chosen at the precinct conventions. These were brought up at the county conventions, and if they succeeded there, they were brought up at the state conventions, where the final delegate count was taken.

While the precinct conventions are fine, and are prime examples of "grassroots" democracy, the sad facts of the matter are that in a precinct the size of Bovina, usually less than ten voters attend the precinct meetings. This year, the count was eight.

Under the old system, these eight voters would decide at the precinct conventions who the Bovina precinct favored for the presidential nomination.

And for the county as a whole, 40 voters or less would decide who Parmer County would support for the presidential delegate votes. The rest of the county's qualified electorate, if they could not attend the precinct or county meetings, had to hope that those few who did attend would vote like they wanted them to.

This year, for the first time, every voter had a say, and instead of 40 folks controlling the business, there were a total of 2,566 Parmer County residents who had their say in the matter.

When it all was tallied up, Jimmy Carter was the clear-cut leader in the Democratic camp, and Ronald Reagan was the winner for the Republican votes. There was no guesswork or speculation—it was down in black and white. And the folks in Austin knew immediately who the Texas electorate favored. They didn't have to wait months for the convention system to finally tell them.

The party convention system was set up when our nation was young, and when the means of communication were very crude compared to today's electronic equipment.

Another argument in favor of the presidential primaries is the extra attention that Texas voters received from the candidates, plus the national exposure the state received from the news media prior to and during the primary.

President Ford spent no less than six full days visiting every segment of the state. He came as close to local voters as Amarillo and Lubbock. This has never happened before. The national party candidates were more concerned over Texans and their vote than they would have been under the old system.

Through the primary system, we feel that the two parties are more likely to come up with Democratic candidates that are true Demos, and Republican candidates that are real Republicans. This will give the voters a true and solid choice in November of a given election year.

Yes, the separate primaries cause voters to make a choice. And thank goodness they get to make the choice themselves!

He was graduated from Texas Tech University in 1972.

Sarpalius told the crowd that we live in a country to be proud of. "The United States has more schools, churches, TVs, bathtubs, cars and more happy teachers, farmers, preachers, mechanics, housewives, etc., than any place in the world.

"But, I have seen and read some things that shocked me," he stated in recalling incidents of violence and apathy in the United States. He

recalled being inspired by the late President Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas in an address to several thousand young people in Washington, D.C. "He told us to 'dream dreams and then make them come true,'" Sarpalius said. He then cited a number of persons in the United States, including Jim Ryan, Harold Connally, Helen Keller and J.C. Penny, who had overcome severe handicaps to become world famous athletes, businessmen and leaders. "They made no excuses; they had a dream and they worked at that dream," concluded Sarpalius in challenging the youth of Bovina to be thankful for what they had and to work at their "dreams."

Kenneth Cary, president of the Booster Club, gave the welcome with DeLeon giving the invocation. Rev. Derrel Lewis, pastor of First Baptist Church, gave the benediction.

## RUNOFFS SET

# Primary Elections Draw Record Voter Turnout

A first-time-ever opportunity for Texans to express their preference in a presidential primary election resulted in a record 2,566 Parmer County residents going to the polls Saturday in the Democratic and Republican primaries.

However, in Bovina only 399 voters turned out, some 40 less than the 439 total in 1962 and 34 less than the 433 total in '66.

As a result of Saturday's vote, a June runoff will be necessary at the county level to determine the Democratic candidates for county commissioners in both Precincts One and Three.

In Precinct Three (Farwell and Oklahoma Lane), former County Judge Archie Tarter and Wendol Christian will meet in the runoff. Tarter polled 271 votes, Christian

173, Cecil Atchley (incumbent) 111 and A.N. Walls, 101.

In Precinct One (Friona), the race was almost a "photo finish" with Ernest Anthony and Raymond Euler to meet in the runoff. Anthony led the voting with 282 followed by Euler with 234, Lloyd Rector with 217 and Preach Edelman with 215. Incumbent Tom Lewellen did not seek re-election.

Sheriff Charlie Lovelace withstood his first challenge since taking office in 1948 by turning back Bill Denney, Friona's Chief of Police and former city marshal at Bovina.

Lovelace won six of the eight voting boxes in the county and also held the lead in the absentee balloting. Denney's only leads were at Friona, where he won 544-289, and at Black where the vote was 31-20. Voters in Farwell gave Lovelace the winning edge, 458-36. In Bovina, Lovelace led by a 202-118 margin. Lovelace also won at Lazbuddie by a 191-14 count and at Oklahoma Lane by a 116-13 count.

District Attorney Jack Young of Muleshoe turned back challenger Doyle Elliott of Friona for the three-county office, 4,127-2,873. In addition to Parmer County, Young serves Bailey and Lamb counties.

Johnny Actkinson won his first elective term as county attorney, defeating John Black of Friona, 1,255-849. Actkinson was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Hershel Harding.

The tabulation form for the primary elections may be found on Page 5.

In the voting for presidential delegates, Democrats and Republicans in Bovina and the remainder of Parmer County went, as predicted, heavily for Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan delegates.

In the Bovina box, Democrats favored Carter's delegate slate by a total of 499 votes to 185 for Senator Lloyd Bentsen and 107 for George Wallace. Republicans here favored

Reagan's delegate slate by a total of 272 votes to 26 for President Gerald Ford and five for Juandelle Lacy, an uncommitted delegate.

A total of 73 voters took part in the Bovina GOP Primary, with 323 voting in the county, both primary records.

Parmer County went along with the remainder of the state in the landslide victories for Carter and Reagan.

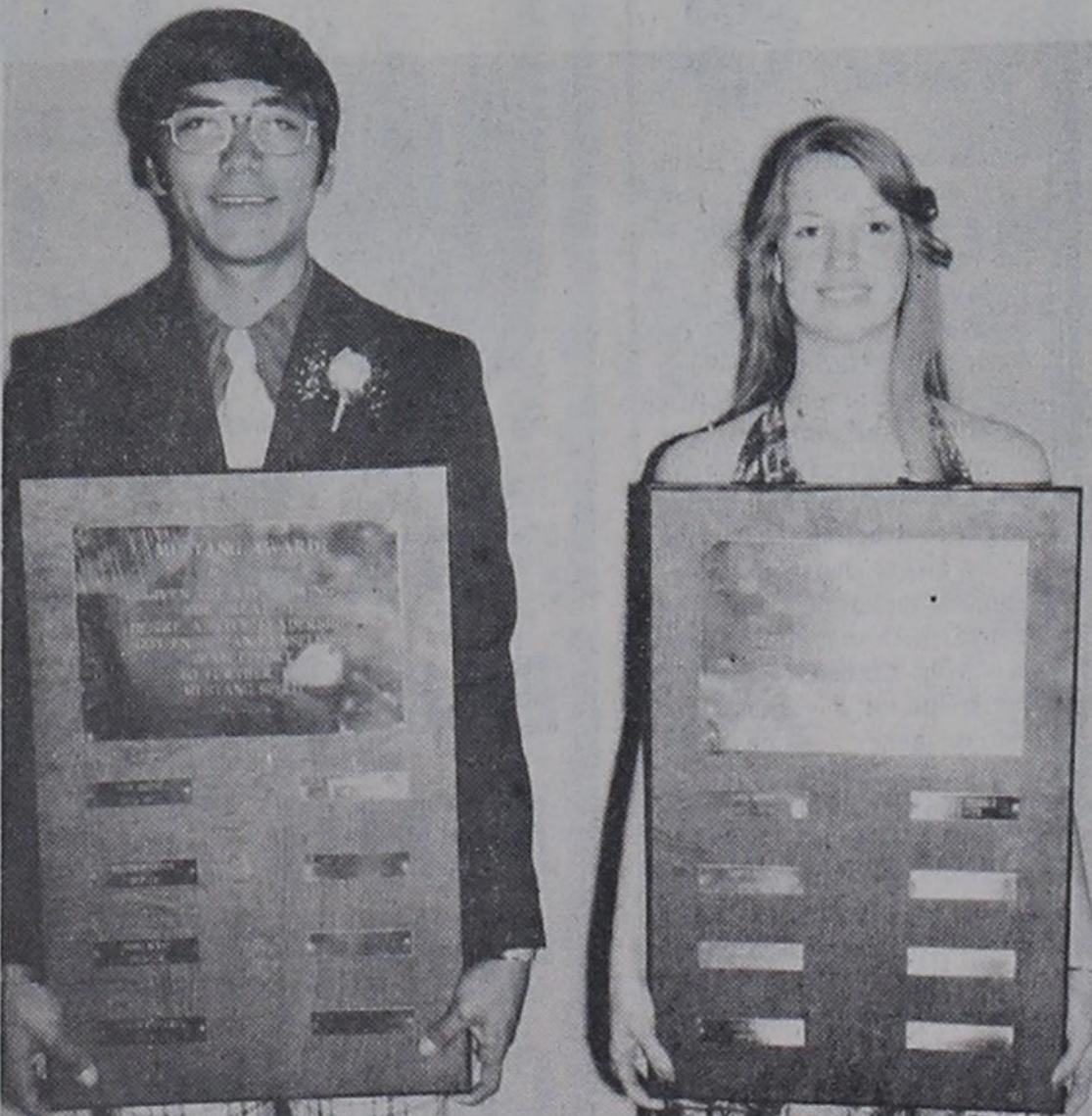

Cotton crop contracting is the total subject of a study now being distributed by one of the research organizations of Texas A&M. Dr. Robert Branson, director of the Texas Agricultural Market Research and Development Center, recently summarized the report by specifying three actions which could improve cotton contracting. Since one of the major shortcomings of crop contracting has been the refusal to honor some contracts, Dr. Branson suggested formation of a central reporting agency... one which would provide financial information on buyers and delivery information on producers. Other suggestions called for a crop disaster clause in every contract and development of low-cost Government crop contracting insurance. Complete information on the report is available from Texas A&M.

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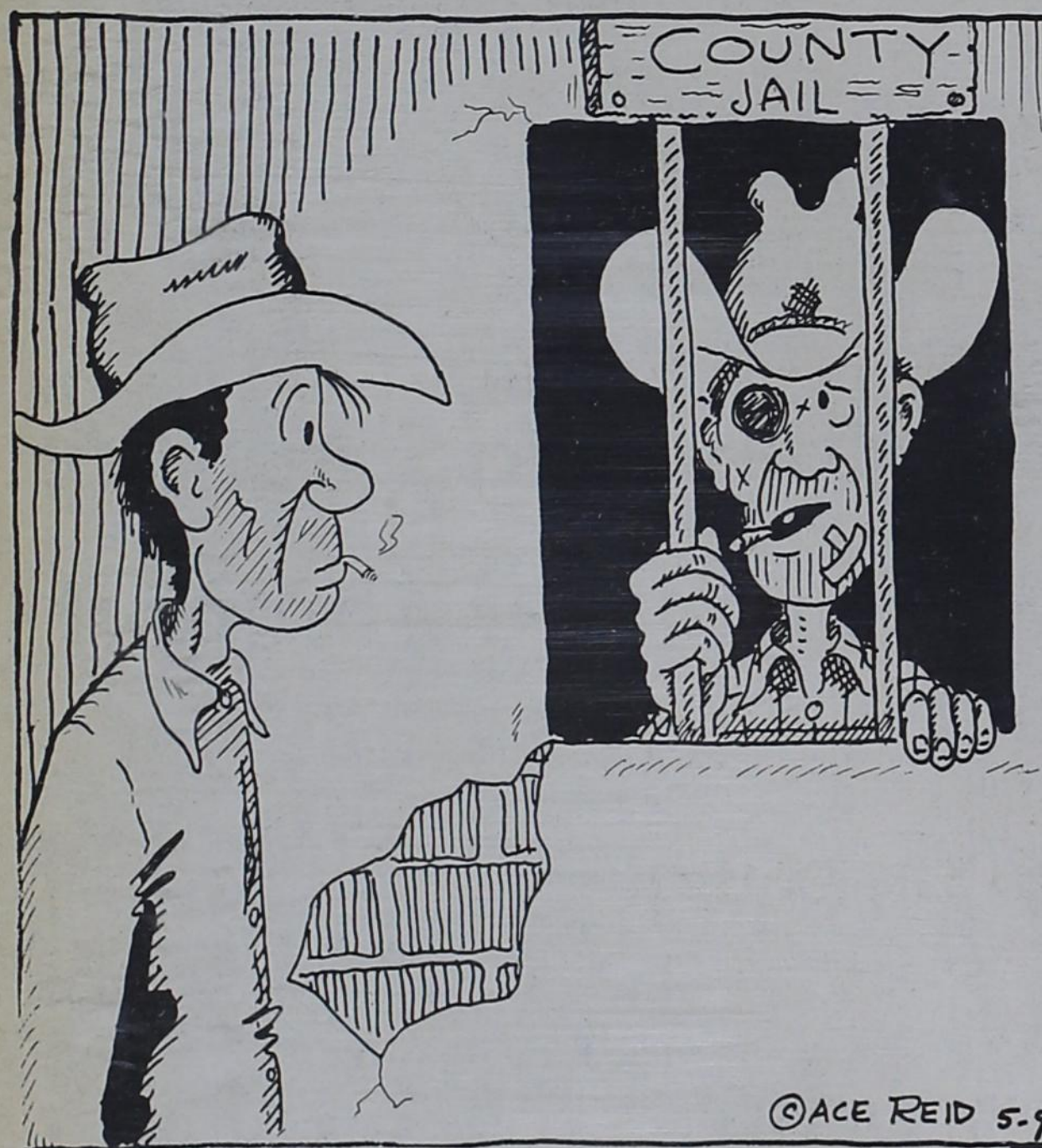

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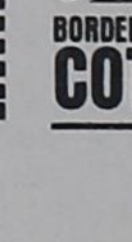

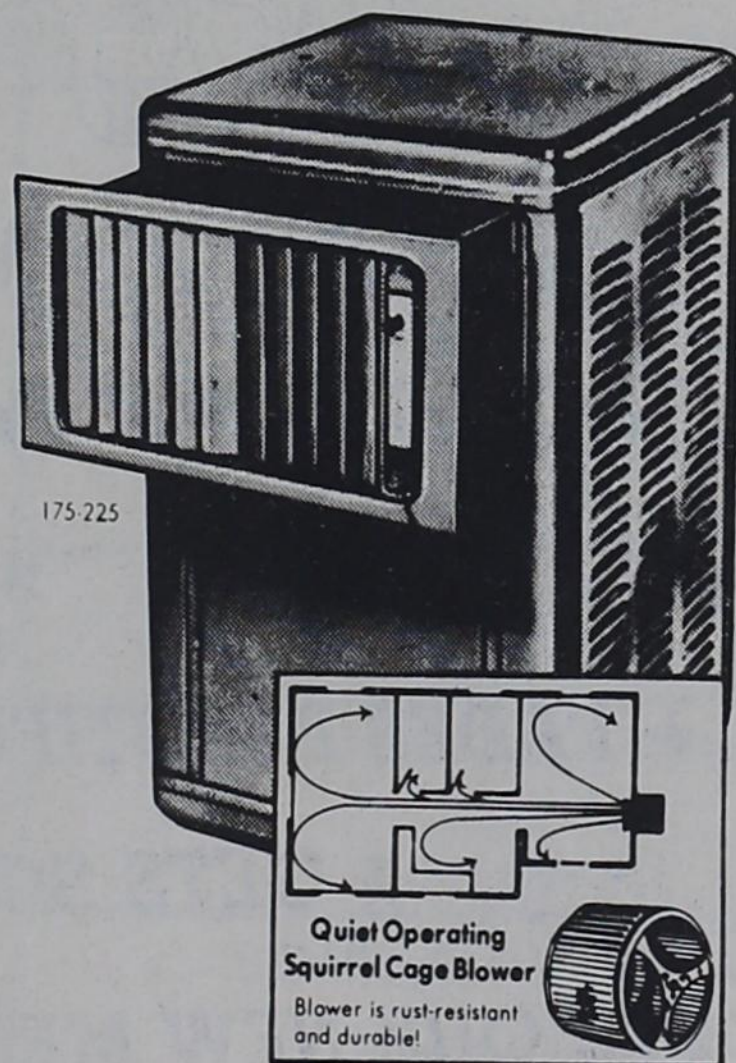

## In a shell

Guess by now Saturday's primary results have been hashed and re-hashed thousands of times over thousands of cups of coffee all over the state. Don't suppose hardly anyone was surprised by the landslide victories Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan racked up in the presidential balloting.

At least two straw polls in this area—one in Hereford and one in Amarillo—showed that Carter and Reagan would get at least 70 per cent of the vote in this area and they topped even that prediction.

Just as we had predicted, the new state voter registration rules resulted in several foulups in this county. Several people were turned away from the polling places because they had no voter registration form, or because they did not have the new blue form, or because for some reason their names were omitted from the voter registration list, or couldn't be found on the list, or other varied reasons.

We were more than a little surprised at the small turnout in Bovina. We had thought the county races would draw a record number of voters, but Bovina fell short of a record by 40 votes. However, a record number of people did vote in the Republican primary. Also, as a number of people had predicted, crossover votes were numerous. A number of Democrats voted Republican in order to vote for Reagan and a number of Republicans voted Democratic in order to vote in the county races. Although Bovina did fall short of the record primary vote, a new record was set county-wide.

In checking back over the files, the record vote in Bovina in a primary election was in 1962 when liquor-by-the-drink was an issue and 439 votes were cast here. In '66, 433 voters turned out in a local contested justice of the peace election.

We've been calling in election results to the Texas Election Bureau for the past several years and this year we also got to call the News Election Service in New York City. The NES has those fancy computers that keep ABC, NBC, CBS, AP and UP informed so they can declare the winners five minutes after the polls close.

Gosh, we even had to make two

rehearsal phone calls to New York the Saturday before the election. Dialed the long distance operator, read off our little speech to her, waited to be connected and then read off our little prepared list to the NES. All of that took about three minutes and then we spent the next five minutes trying to get New York to spell Nuttall correctly. Same deal Saturday night!

There we were in Farwell, Texas, participating in the national reporting deal with over 250 other correspondents, and it took New York so long to spell Nuttall that it was after midnight before we found out who won!

Allen Cumpton dismissed the group with a reminder that laymen of First United Methodist Church would host the June prayer breakfast.

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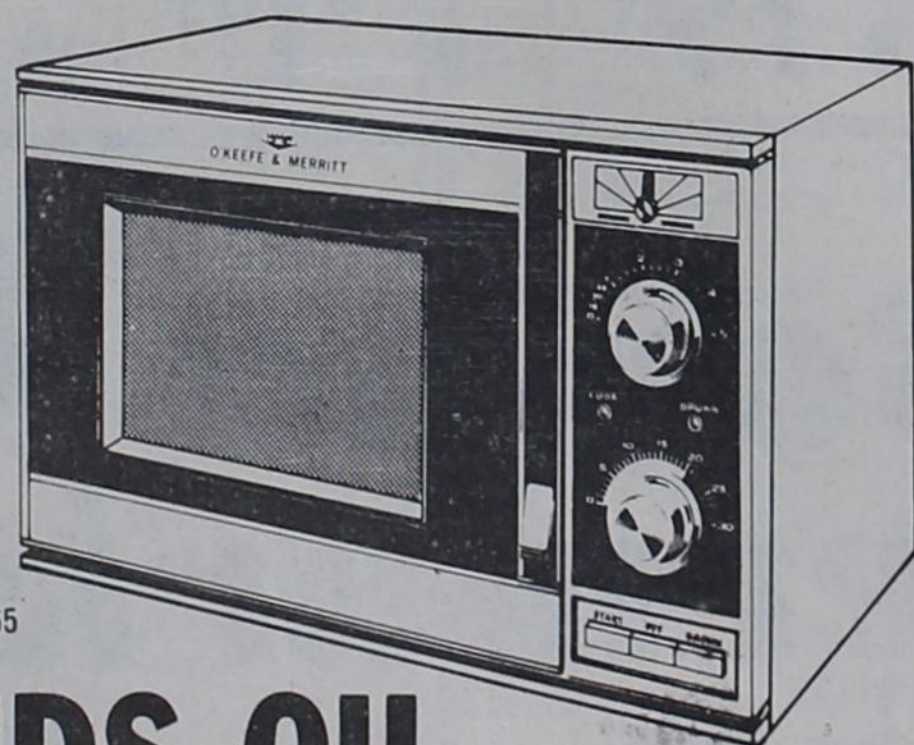
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
