Greenbelt Dam

Unless something unforeseen happens the cities of Quanah, Childress, Paducah, Clarendon and Hedley will vote on the water contracts with the Greenbelt Authority Saturday, Sept. 28. The election will be at the City Hall and the election judges and clerks have already been appointed.

The City of Crowell will not vote at this time as their application to join the Authority will not be acted upon by the state until Sept. 18.

Memphis can not vote at this time either as they do not own their water works system. Wellington is still a question mark, they may or may not vote on this date.

A representative of the financial counselors met with the City Council last Thursday afternoon. They recommended the minimum water rate remain at \$3.00 and no increase in rate to those using 2,000 gallons or less a month.

They did recommend an increase in rate to larger users. They also recommended strongly that all water outlets be metered and all changed the same rate. In other words, there would be no pets.

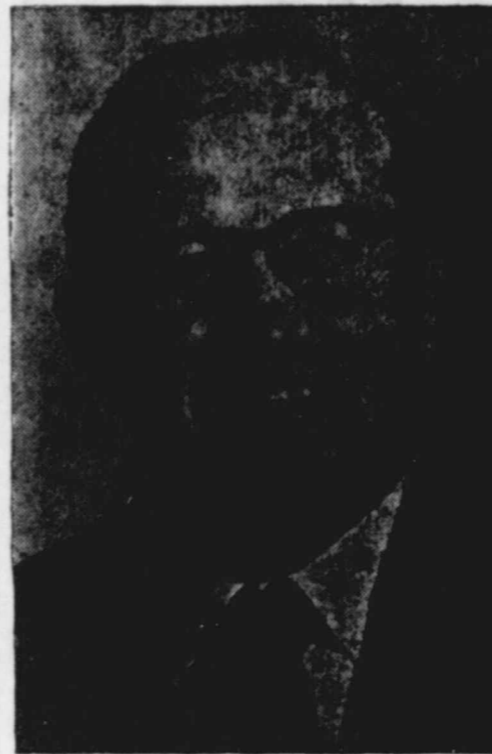

Slow Drivers Warned

Austin—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the new speed law effective Aug. 23 specifically makes it a violation to drive a vehicle so slow as to impede traffic.

He said that before enactment of the new law it was necessary for a police officer to warn a driver impeding traffic to speed up or get off the road before filing a charge.

"Under the new statute, as we interpret it, whenever a driver is driving slower than the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and thereby impeding that traffic, he will be committing a violation for which he may be charged in court," Garrison said.

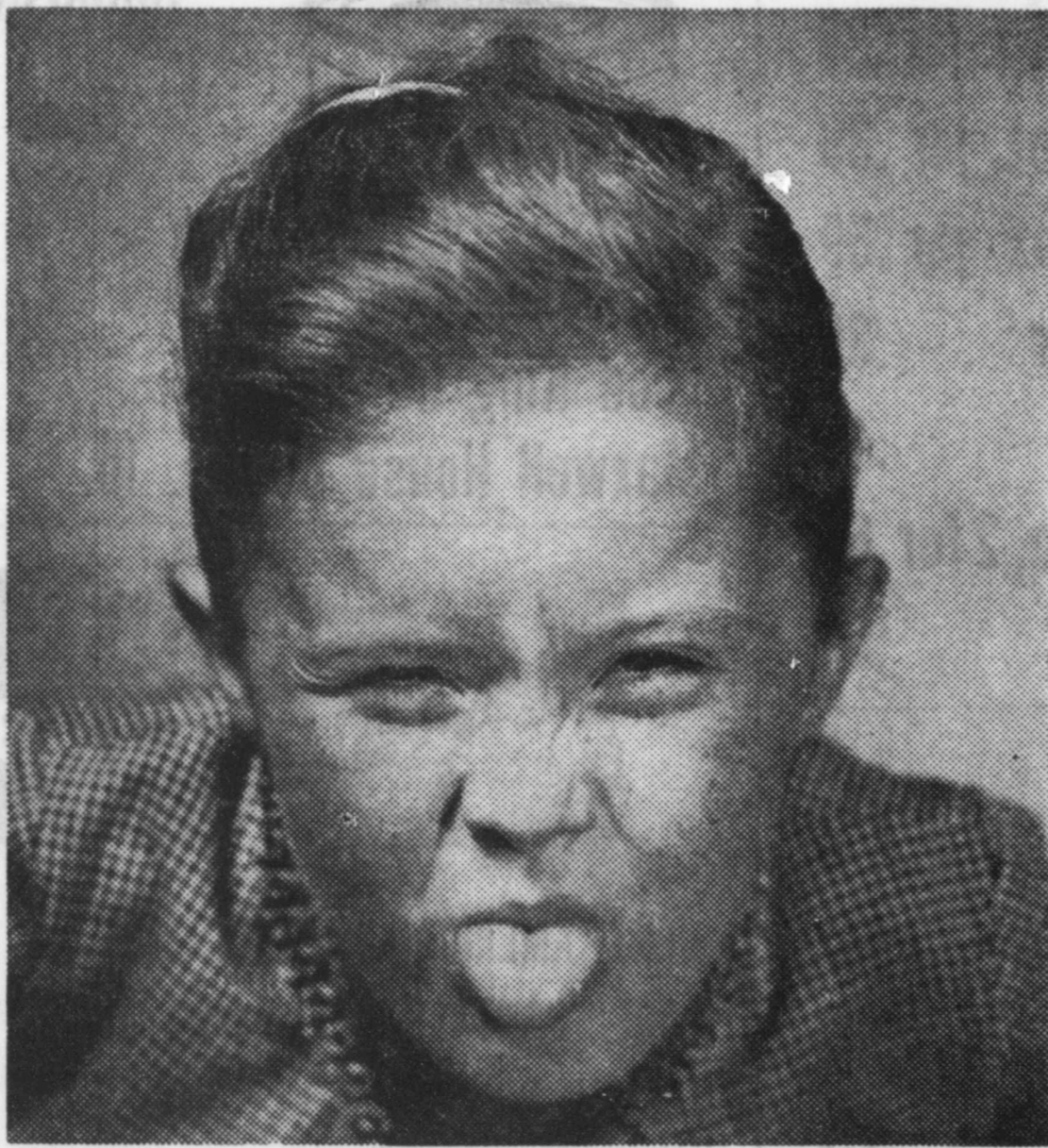

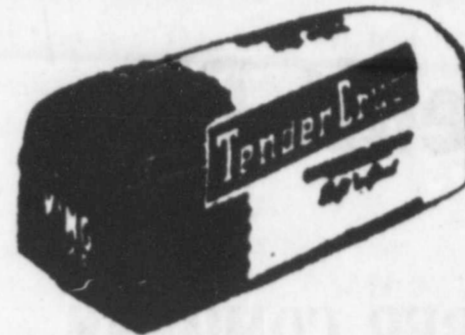
