## Legal Notice

All interested persons are vised that the construction of additional traffic lanes are being planned by the Texas Highway Commission on U.S Highway 287 from near the East city limits of Clarendon through Hedley The contemplated additional traffic lanes will parallel the present traffic lanes in the rural portion to provide a divided highway similar to that now built from Clarendon West. These divided lanes will transition to each other within the cities of Clarendon, Lelia Lake and Hedley. These city sections will have the present paved streets widened sufficiently to provide for four traffic lanes

Preliminary drawings showing the proposed location are on file at the Resident Engineers office in Clarendon and at the District Engineers office in Childress.

Any interested citizen may request that a public bearing be held respecting such proposed location and the economic effect of such location by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer or the District Engineer on or before the 7th day of No vember 1963. In the event such request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be given as to its time

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




