Freeman To Be In Lubbock

This will be our last opportunity to remind farmers and other interested citizens of this area to go to Lubbock Monday, Nov. 4, and take part in the "Report and Review" meeting with Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman. This meeting will be held at 2:00 p. m. in the Municipal Auditorium and will be geared toward "dirt-farmer" participation, with plenty of time provided for a question and answer period. Farmers' advice and recommendations will be encouraged.

1963 Final Program Payments

Almost all 1963 payments have been completed under the feed grain and wheat stabilization programs. If you have not done so already, please come in and sign your final application for payment State's 1964 Cotton Allotment Set.

Texas farmers have been allotted 6,838,347 acres on which to grow their 1964 upland cotton crop under the national cotton program. This represents the State's share of the 16 million acre national allotment and of the 200,000 acre national reserve announced by the Secretary of Agriculture on Oct. 11.

At the same time the Secretary proclaimed marketing quotas for the 1964 cotton crop. December 10, 1963, was set as the date for a national referendum on the quotas.

The state allotment will be apportioned among counties and the county allotments among farms according to provisions of the law. Notices of farm acreage allotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farms prior to the referendum.

Farmers who were engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 will be eligible to vote in the Dec. 10 referendum to determine whether marketing quotas will be operative for the 1964 crop of upland cotton.

Amendments

There will be four state constitutional amendments to be voted on Nov. 9.

No. 1 is a proposal to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting.

No. 2 is to increase the amount of funds available for payments to the needy aged, the totally disabled, the blind, and needy children under 16.

No. 3 would authorize Jefferson County to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees within Jefferson County.

No. 4 would increase the amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

News From Our County Agent

County Agent Flip Breedlove is warning all livestock owners not to graze cotton fields or to feed gin trash to livestock where cotton has been sprayed for defoliation with defoliant containing Arsenic Acid. It is difficult to tell what cotton has been sprayed so it is just best not to feed gin trash to livestock. If cotton fields are sprayed for defoliation then do not graze them.

Cotton Classing

Cotton harvesting which still continued slow for this time of the year, showed some increase in field operations during the week ending Friday, Oct. 25, says K. E. Voelkel of the Agricultural Marketing Service's cotton classing office in Memphis, Texas. The daily average receipts amounted to about 1200 samples, and slightly over 7,000 were classed.

Since 80 to 90 percent of the cotton is open and could be harvested by hand labor, it is reported that most farmers are waiting for a killing frost so that harvesting might be done by the cheaper method, mechanical harvesting. A number of farmers that defoliated their cotton a week ago, stated that it would require at least another week before the cotton would be ready for harvesting. The light rain throughout this section about a week ago, together with the heavy dew the latter part of the week were not conducive to defoliation practices.

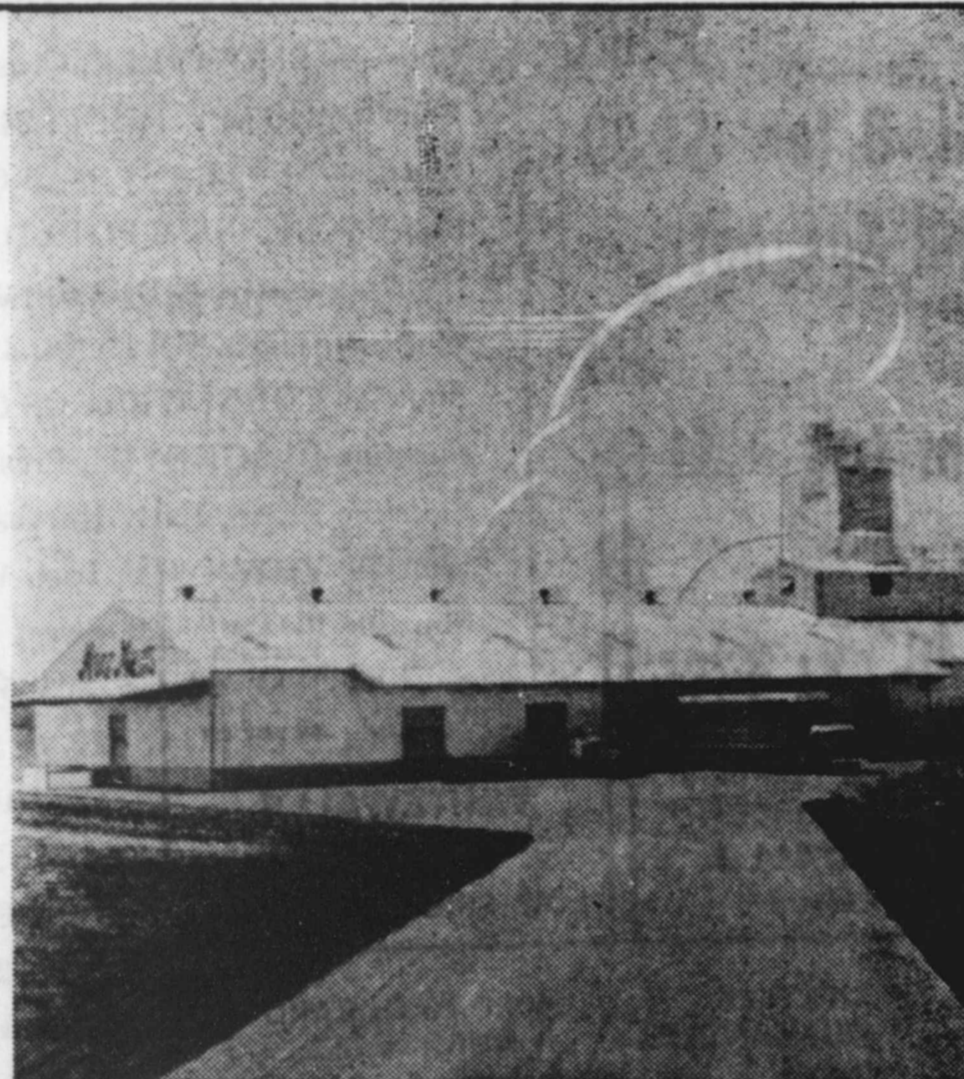

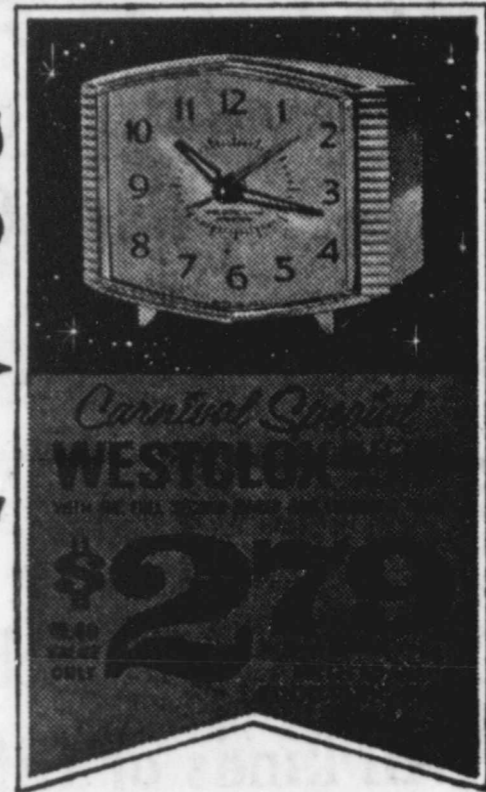
