





Unreported Wheat And Barley

There are some producers in this county who do not have a wheat allotment but who may have wheat for harvest in 1964. If you do have wheat seeded and it has not been measured, it may be to your advantage to report that acreage to the county office, as we have no way of knowing about such acreage unless it is reported to us


A'so, if you are participating in the feed grain program and have barley seeded, it must be reported. Barley is a part of the feed grain base and it is eligible for the price support payment.

Premeasurement Service For Feed Grains

We now have approval from the State Office to offer the premeasurement service for feed grains and diverted acres. The cost of the service will be the same as for cotton and the last day to make application at the Donley ASOS County Office will be April 30.






