Strike Settled

San Angelo—Negotiations between General Telephone Company of the Southwest and Communications workers of America were concluded June 11.

The new three year contract began June 1, 1964 and wages are retroactive to April 26, 1964. Other details concerning contract agreements will be released later, according to a General Telephone spokesman.

Final settlement on a new contract was reached just nine days shy of one year after negotiations began. Anniversary date of the contract which remained in effect throughout negotiations was July 20, 1963.

Final details and signing of documents will not occur for several weeks, according to Frank A. Lennberg, company spokesman.

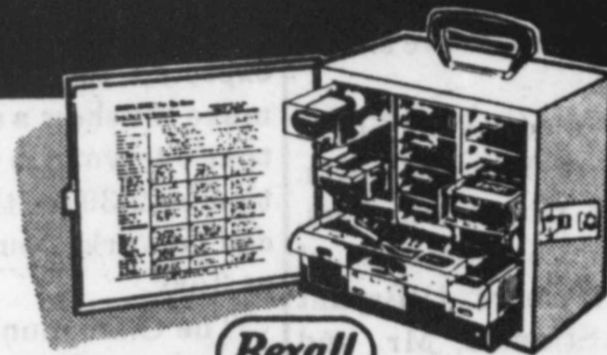

News From Our County Agent

This time of year farm people and town people are asking, "What can I use for red spiders and flies in the evergreen shrubbery?" This will also apply to ants around the house and other insects.

County Agent Flip Breedlove says that two of the best sprays to use around the house for the above purpose are Malathion and Isotox. These two sprays should be mixed exactly as the directions call for on the containers, and always remember that all sprays are considered poisonous. Always keep the wind blowing away from you, and when you get some on your skin, then use soap and water to remove.

Malathion is a good spray for the control of aphids on plants. This is especially true on alfalfa, says the county agent. If you need any information on the use of these sprays call Breedlove's office.

Highway Commission Approves 3 Roads

Austin, Texas, June 22, 1964—The Texas Highway Commission today authorized the extension of Ranch to Market Road 2695 and designated two additional R. M. Roads for Donley County.

Ranch to Market Road 2695 will be extended from the southern end of the previously constructed section, southerly and westerly, to an intersection with State Highway 203, approximately 1.5 miles east of Hedley, a distance of 11.6 miles.

The Commission's action also authorized the construction of a Ranch to Market Road extending from State Highway 203, approximately six miles east of Hedley, northerly, a distance of approximately 3.3 miles.

Cost of the extension of R. M. Road 2695 and the construction of the new R. M. Road is estimated by the Texas Highway Department at \$550,000.

A second R. M. Road in Donley County was designated by the Commission for construction for an estimated \$610,000. It will extend from the end of the new R. M. Road authorized for construction today by the Commission, westerly to an intersection with R. M. 2605, a distance of approximately 2 miles.

Action by the Commission was taken subject to acceptance by Donley County of customary right of way responsibilities required of local governments by the Texas Highway Department.

Cut matching facings, stitch to curtains with right sides together, clip seam and turn. Hem sides of curtains. Attach plastic rings across top with whipping stitch. Sew ball fringe to bottom points.

It's a Conservation merry-go-round all right. Because nature goes round and round in the process of creating, destroying and rebuilding natural resources.

Throughout the state and nation, 4-H Club members are lining up to get on the conservation merry-go-round. They are eager to do their share of protecting and replacing the forests, wildlife, grasslands, water and soil that are either used up or destroyed. They deplore senseless misuse of nature's gifts.

A new 4-H Conservation program, recently announced by the National 4-H Service Committee, offers young people incentive awards. They are county conservation medals, a free trip for the state winner to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, and \$500 college scholarships to the six top members chosen from all state winners.

The sponsor is John Deere, a long-time backer of 4-H Club work. The program is carried out under the supervision of the Cooperative Extension Service, county extension agents and local club leaders.

Winners in all categories will be announced at the close of the 1964 club year.

Farm Facts

A Texas farmer, Lyndol C. Barker of Dell City, not only has produced eight bales of cotton per acre but has averaged 6.92 bales per acre over a five-year period on 10.4 acres.

Time was when a cotton farmer thought he was going great if he could grow a bale to the acre. Standard weight of a bale of lint cotton, not counting its wrappings, is 478 pounds. The average yield across the Cotton Belt rose from 254 pounds in 1945 to 448 pounds in 1960.

Dell City is 90 miles east of El Paso in the center of an irrigated cotton-growing area where the average yield is more than two bales per acre.

Barker says there's no secret to making high yields. He just gives the cotton maximum water, fertilizer, and care.

Of Barker's 280 acres, about 130 are in cultivation. He grows cotton, cantaloupes, tomatoes, carrots, and other crops, and believes in diversification and soil care.

His land is flat, mostly sandy loam, and he rotates so that cotton is grown on the


8 BALES OF COTTON HAVE BEEN GROWN ON A SINGLE ACRE.



same plot only one year out of four.

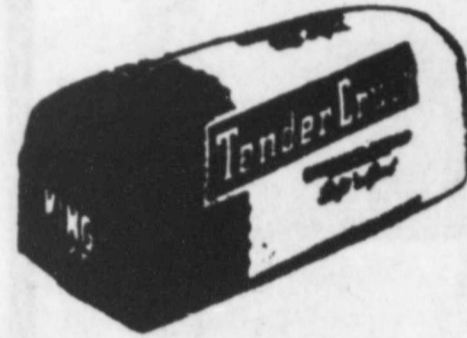
