Transportation Contracts at CJC

Transportation of students from surrounding towns to Clarendon Junior College is available through student car contracts. A student who resides in an area town may enter into a contract with the college to transport other students from his area Thedriver-student is paid according to the distance each student travels in his automobile to school. There must be a miuimum of three students riding with the driver before a group is eligible for a contract. The college will pay two cents per mile for travel, plus the following amount each month: 60 miles or over travelled one way

-\$10 per rider, per month 50 to 60 miles-\$9 40 to 50 miles-\$8

30 to 40 miles-\$7

Under 30 miles-\$5

Students who ride with a contract driver may also pay him a like amount each month. Such a contract enables a student to drive his car to school at almost no expense to himself and provides the same transportation for those who ride with him at a very nominal cost.

Palo Duro Canyon State Park

Etched deeply in the high plains of the Panhandle, just south of Amarillo, lies a spectacular gorge, widely renowned for its scenic beauty. This is Palo Duro Canyon, a great 15,000 acre state park of Texas. You enter it on a road which winds for miles along the bottom of the vast gorge. You see many remarkable formations such as the "Lighthouse" and "Balanced Rock" which have been formed by centuries of erosion which created the Canyon. As you drive slowly along the Canyon's beauty is enhanced by constant changes in delicate coloring. Coronado explored the Canyon in 1541, and in 1876 Col. Goodnight drove the first wagon train down a huge rock slide into its great gulf. Palo Duro Canyon is easily reached on major highways through many of our towns, and is a high spot in places to go and things to see in General Telephone Country.
