## Senior Class Play

The Senior Class is presenting Accidental Hero, by Phyllis Woodruff Sapp, as their annual class play, on Friday evening, Oct. 9 at 8 p.m. Admission is 50¢ for adults, 25¢ for children.



#### Vehicle Inspection

Austin—Col Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the time has arrived for Texas motorists to have their vehicles inspected again

Garrison said Sept. 1 marked on 25th the beginning of the 1965 vehicle inspection period as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. 2:00 on 23rd As in previous years, the period Jan. 8, En will end on April 15, 1965. March 12,

"This means that between now and April 15, 1965, more than 5,200,000 Texas registered vehicles school will have to be inspected at the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas," he said.

Garrison urged motorists to have their vehicles inspected in the routine visits to garages for ordinary maintenance and repairs and thereby eliminate the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection sticker




