Janice Floyd Wins Betty Crocker Test

Janice Floyd has been named Hedley High School's 1965 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She scored highest in a written homemaking examination taken by senior girls Dec 1 and is now eligible for state and national honors.

Test papers of all school Homemakers of Tomorrow in the state are currently being judged. The state's highest ranking girl will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills Inc, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow, with the state runner-up to be awarded a \$500 educational grant. In addition, the school of the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a complete set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica from Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc.

Later this spring, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join first place winners and advisors from each of the 50 other states and the District of Columbia in a tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va, Washington D C, and New York City. Climax of the week long tour will be the naming of the Betty Crocker All American Homemaker of Tomorrow. To be chosen on the basis of original test score and personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second, third, and fourth place winners in the nation will have their grants raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

The Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow was initiated by General Mills in 1954 to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. Including this year's record enrollment of more than half a million senior girls in more than 14,000 high schools, the total number of participants during the program's 11 year history stands at four million. Scholarship grants exceed \$1 million.

**Move To Save
Prairie Chicken**

Contributions are being requested to help make a down payment on about 3,600 acres of land near Eagle Lake in Colorado County as a refuge for the Attwater prairie chicken. There are about 1,335 of these prairie chickens left, about 400 of them on the proposed refuge. The birds once numbered a million or more.

The Texas Prairie Chicken Committee has an option on the land for the proposed refuge, but the option expires Feb 18. About \$20,000 has been raised for the project, but \$50,000 more is needed by Feb 18 to complete the down payment.

Donations from one dollar up will be accepted. They should be mailed to the Texas Prairie Chicken Committee, P. O. Box 52341, Houston, Texas 77052.

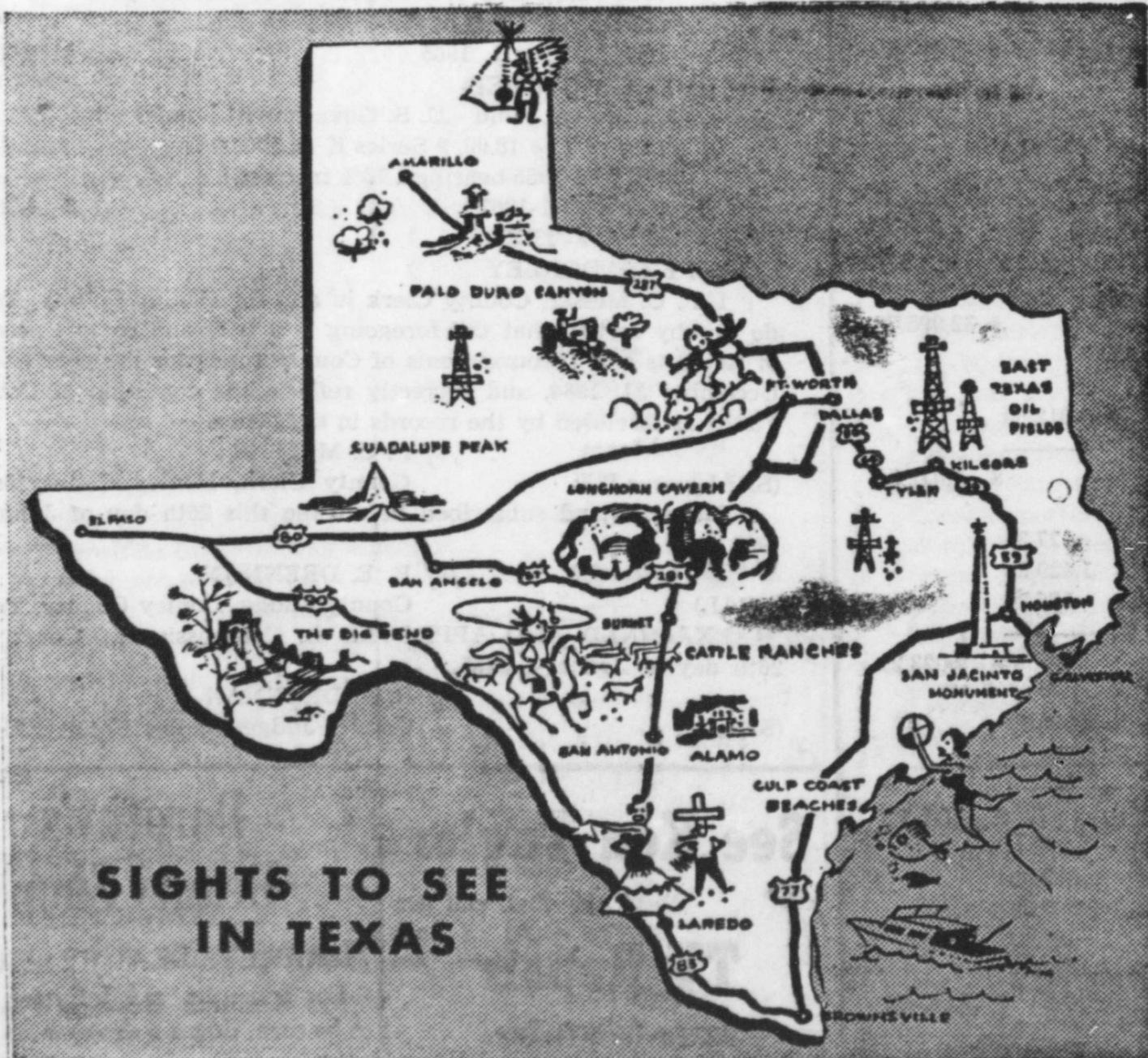



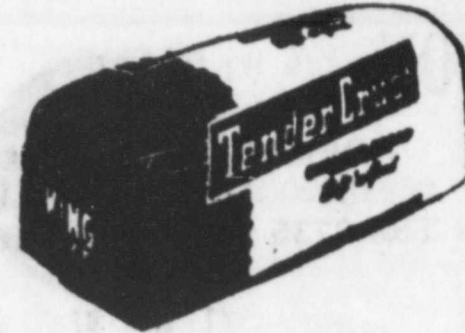
