Karla Mills and Stuart Klimek, high ranking girl and boy in the Junior Class, will serve as the honor guard.



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BOVINA HAS BEEN the "rain capital' of Parmer County for the past couple of weeks.

In the space of a seven-day period ending May 13, the city had received right at four inches of rain. By comparison, Friona recorded barely an inch during the same period, Lazbuddie had around 1.6 inches, and the Rhea community had from 1.5 to two inches. Farwell's totals were not known.

The rain has helped considerably to ease the drought-like conditions that had been plaguing our area for a number of months. The moisture should give a big assist to the farmers, who have the growing season off to one of its better starts in years.

Leading into an enjoyable period of speaking and presentation of awards, Elvin Carraway, FFA Area I president, keynoted the annual Member-Parent Banquet Thursday night in the Bovina Schools cafeteria.

Guests numbering 150 and 50 members of the local chapter were present. The list included parents, members of the faculty and administration, businessmen and farmers who have rendered special attention to the organization during the past year.

FFA Chapter President Steve Cockerham was master of ceremonies and the opening phases were conducted by chapter officers. Scotty Johnson gave the invocation, with Jimmy Rhodes giving the welcome and Gaylon Rhodes responding. Pat Ware introduced the guests. David Steelman presented the chapter awards.

Special awards, including those to L.F. Jacobs, R.T. Harbour and Mrs. Jane Sudderth were presented by Lawrence Widner, Pat Barrett and Rocky Bartlett. Closing ceremonies were conducted by Greenhand officers.

After a dinner of barbecued beef, certificates, awards, trophies and special awards were presented by chapter members, with the assistance of Widner and Barrett, FFA advisors and local vocational agriculture instructors.

Carraway said he appreciated the introduction by Cockerham and observed that they had practiced on it for only one-half hour. He indicated a belief that Bovina is outstanding in the district and the state, noted that it certainly has the prettiest girls and brought greetings from officers of the other five areas. The young FFA representative said the FFA started with a dream and became a reality in 1928.

"Today, there are 500,000 members overall; 60,000 in Texas; 55 in Bovina. This is agriculture's new generation, with new force, new drive, new motivation.

"Making the most of your opportunities today will make a big difference in tomorrow's agriculture. Discontent is the first step to progress. Find and develop individual talent and remember that learning to cooperate is the true measure of success.

Routine Matters On City Docket

The Bovina City Council held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, May 5.

After accepting the previous minutes and authorizing the city secretary to pay bills, the council took up the following agenda:

Considered and accepted a proposal by Southwestern Public Service Co. for a rate increase in the Guard Light service, based on a fuel cost adjustment. This action brings all SPSC customers in Bovina under the fuel cost adjustment formula.

Met with Gene Barber, consulting engineer for the city on the park development projects, which include the new playground and the baseball field.

Barber reported on the current status of these endeavors and noted the prohibitive cost involved in meeting the present specifications for the lighting poles which are to be erected at the ball park.

Lengthy debate took place over the Fire Department billing system. At the April 7 council meeting, while members were reviewing the

proposed 1977 city budget, the firemen's fund, along with all other funds, came under scrutiny. A result of this review was a motion being made and accepted that no charge would be made to any firemen for the first 30,000 gallons of water used per month. For every 1,000 gallons used above that, a rate of 25 cents per thousand would be charged.

Firemen, meeting with the council on April 21, opposed this provision.

Last Thurday the council discussed the action of April 7, considered the firemen's position, and agreed to abide by its original motion.

On the complaint regarding the hog pens at 9th Street and Avenue D, the council reviewed the status of its progress and results of its efforts thus far and will continue to explore the avenues open to the city for further action.

Tabled a proposed change in the zoning ordinance until a recommendation is received from the Zoning Commission. The area of the proposed change is the south one-half of lot 3 and 40 feet of Avenue I of Block 90, O.T., Bovina.

City Receives Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last Friday his office has mailed monthly city sales tax rebate checks totaling \$22 million to 867 Texas cities and towns that assess the one per cent tax.

The May checks bring to \$235.3 million the total rebates for the eight months of the current fiscal year, a \$44 million increase over the same period for fiscal 1976, Bullock said. But he cautioned that the 23 per cent increase is somewhat mislead-

ing.

Area Moisture Good **During Past Week**

The rains continued last Wednesday through Friday, dropping a total of 1.85 inches in Bovina over the three-day stretch.

West of town, 2 to 21/2 inches was reported for the same period.

Hail fell for some time on Friday in the north-northwest section and there were reports of some damage, the extent of which could not be determined.

Four inches of moisture have been measured since this particular weather pattern developed on Saturday, May 7.

"The May rebate check actually covers collections for a five week period instead of the usual four weeks, so the June checks obviously will be smaller," he said.

Bullock said that procedural changes have resulted in a substantial increase in early filings by sales tax permit holders, also inflating the year-to-date total.

Even so, Bullock said state and local sales tax collections are growing at a rate well ahead of the national average, reflecting the muscle of Texas' economy.

"We are confident that trend will continue," he added.

As usual, Texas' largest city, Houston, gets the biggest rebate check--\$4.8 million. Dallas will receive a check for \$2.3 million, San Antonio will get \$1.7 million, Fort Worth, \$924,257 and Bovina, \$5,586.96.

At a meeting Sunday in the community room of First State Bank, volunteers from the Bovina Chamber of Commerce met and selected areas to survey.

Fourteen sections have been assigned to date, with five sections completed. Six sections are available for any civic group or individuals wishing to participate in this community service. Survey packets and instructions may be obtained at City Hall.

Results of the survey are, hopefully, to be compiled in time for the next regular City Council meeting in June according to Survey Coordinators Stanley Klimek and Laurance Kriegel.



WIFE Group Hears

Elbert Harp of Lubbock, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, spoke to the members of the Parmer County WIFE on Monday night in Bovina Schools cafeteria.

Showing color slides as he talked, Harp traced the history of the feed grain program from 1960 to the present, and emphasized that decisions made in Washington in the next few weeks will affect the farmers.

Saying the White House has been dictating the contents of farm bills for more than eight years and that this is not good, Harp stated there is great pressure from the administration to pass only a farm bill it recommends, with a threat to veto anything else.

He noted the High Plains situation is indicative of the farm conditions across the nation: 35 farm organizations are trying to iron out differences for cohesive action: urged wives to write letters on individual farm problems, stating form letters are not effective.

The farmer must give thought and effort to two primary considerations, which are: Legislation and a program to bring supply and demand into balance and development of world markets.

An example: Kansas elevators are

still full from last year's crop, with a new crop coming in and no place to put it. The farmer could, conceivably, be driven to give it away. Thus, the need to continue to expand

overseas sales promotion. In closing, Harp said, "We can be effective when the farmers get together to be effective."





Big Nick Softballers Off To Excellent Start

Big Nick's Traders competed in the recent May 5-8 pre-season slowpitch tournament in Amarillo,

emerging with a seventh-place tie in the annual event.

Some 64 teams entered the double elimination tourney, including 41 teams from Amarillo; five from Albuquerque; four from Midland; three each from Clovis, Hereford and Lubbock; two from Oklahoma Lane and one each from Colorado Springs, Weatherford, Okla., and Abilene. Several of the top-rated teams in the Southwest competed, including tournament champions Barrett's Body Shop of Abilene; runner-up North McArthur Church of Christ, Oklahoma City; third-place Lubbock Raiders and fourth-place finisher Kerr-McGee, Oklahoma City. Tied for fifth place were Goodrich of Midland and Carpet Warehouse of Amarillo. Tied for sixth were Schumann of Midland and Albuquerque Merchants. In a seventhplace tie were Big Nick's Traders, Pizza Planet of Amarillo, Mike's Exxon of Albuquerque, and Argonaut's Energy of Amarillo. The Traders won its first game of the tourney, 15-10, over SW Church of Christ, Amarillo and then dropped the second game to the Lubbock Raiders, 17-4. Dropping to the loser's bracket, Big Nick's was credited with a forfeit win over First National Bank of Amarillo; won by a 25-4 count over the Great Gatsby, Amarillo; downed Schumberger of Midland, 15-5, and defeated Itsa Italian Ice of Albuquerque, 19-6. Schumann Engineering of Midland took a 10-9 win over Big Nick to eliminate the Traders from the tournament on Sunday morning. Standouts on offense for the Traders included Doug Harrison

A five-run rally in the bottom of the sixth inning in their game at Friona enabled the Friona Senior Babe Ruth team to edge Sudan, 9-8 in a league game Sunday afternoon. The win enabled the Friona team to earn a split in its first two games. The team had lost at Muleshoe in their season opener, 6-4.

A two-out, two-run single by third-baseman Dan Cox, the team's leading hitter after two games, pulled the game out of the fire for the local nine. Cox had a no ball, two strike count when he lined a pitch into centerfield to score the tying and winning runs.
