A Mystery

According to a recent issue of the Abilene Reporter-News, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Mosley of Abilene bought a large two story brick home in Abilene a few months ago, located at 802 Mulberry, and in doing so also brought to light a first class mystery.

Leonard was digging in the back yard, getting ready for spring gardening, and struck a slab of what he thought was concrete. When he got it dug out he found it was limestone instead of concrete and saw traces of lettering on the underneath side. When he cleaned it thoroughly the message became clear. It read:

Thomas Campbell

Born

Feb 9, 1802

Died

Jan. 14, 1873

Former owners of the place could give the Mosleys no information. A search of historical records shed no light. There was never a burying ground, to anyone's knowledge, at that spot.

There were Campbells among the early settlers of Abilene, but not that early. The year of death, 1873, was eight years before Abilene existed. In that year the only white people in the Abilene area were travelers along the old military trails, cowmen and hunters, all there only temporarily. None of those travelers seems likely to have had an engraved stone along in case of his death.

The Mosleys believe that the best guess is that some prankster or vandal left the stone where it was found. But when, and from where, they cannot say.

As we said in the beginning, it is a first class mystery.

Mr. Mosley is an officer in the First State Bank at Abilene, and is a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Mosley.

NOTICE

This is to give notice of intention to introduce a bill during the Regular Session of the 59th Legislature to amend certain provisions of Chapter 35, Acts of the First Called Session of the 53rd Legislature, being the Act creating Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority. Such legislation will: Change the name of the Authority; add certain territory to the Authority, and detach other territory therefrom; authorize the Authority to acquire and develop underground water and water rights; provide for investment of the Authority's funds; provide for supplying water for users within and without the Authority; make provisions relating to the making of a contract with Texas Water Development Board under which said Board or the State of Texas will require water storage facilities (as provided in Chapter 49, Acts of the Fifty-eighth Legislature) in a reservoir to be constructed by the Authority and with reference to making provision for the accumulation of a fund for the purchase by the Authority of such storage space by fixing and maintaining adequate rates and charges which shall be paid by cities heretofore and hereafter contracting to buy water from the Authority; repealing Section 23 of the Act; and enacting such other amendments or provisions as the Legislature may determine.

This notice is given in accordance with the requirements of paragraph (d) of Section 59 of Article 16 of the Texas Constitution.

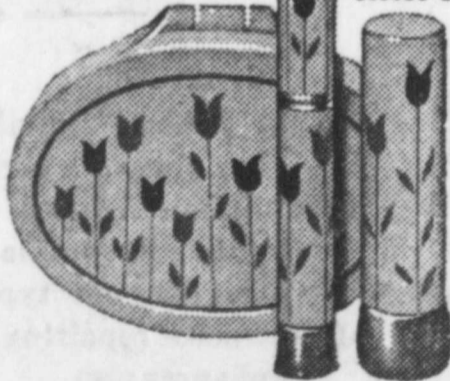

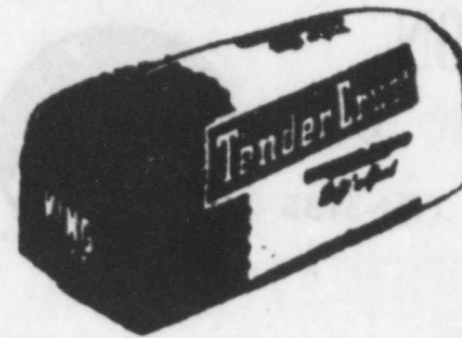
