Proof of Production

The response has been very good to the letters mailed out last week requesting producers to bring in proof of their 1963-64 production of wheat, feed grains and cotton. If you have not yet been into the office concerning this matter, let us urge you to do so before June 1.

The county and community committeemen will meet within the next few days to begin work on establishing yields based on the expected 1965 production for the three commodities for each farm. Your proof of production will be a big help to the committeemen in setting up these yields.

Changes in the Cotton Loan Program

The USDA has announced changes in the cotton loan program to make the program more convenient for cotton producers and less costly to CCC. Beginning with the 1965 crop of cotton, all loans will be disbursed by the ASCS County Offices only. In the past, loans could be disbursed by lending agencies also.

Under the new procedure all loan notes executed by producers, warehouse receipts, and all related documents will remain in custody of ASCS county offices until loan maturity or redemption. This will make it possible for producers and persons who purchase loan equities to redeem cotton from the loan easier and quicker because redemptions can be accomplished at county offices. In the past, all loan documents have been maintained at the ASCS Commodity Office in New Orleans.

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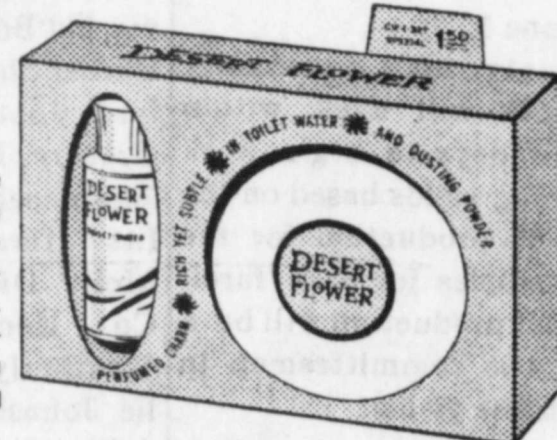

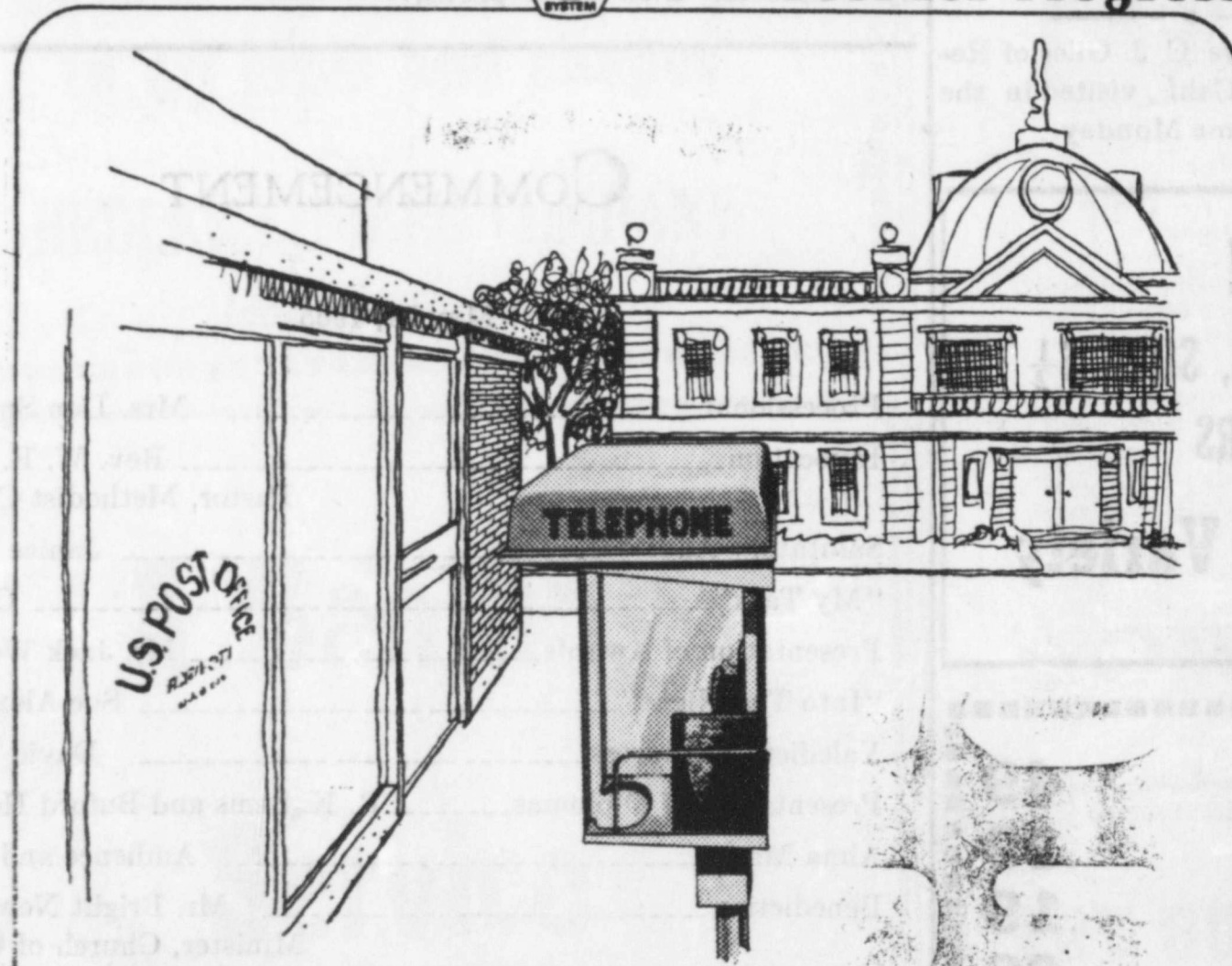

Business Census

Donley County's 36 service establishments had total receipts of \$363,000 in 1963 a decrease of 20% from 1958, according to a report of the 1963 census of business just released by the Bureau of Census, U S Dept. of Commerce. The last previous census covered operations during 1958.

The service trades in the census of business included those providing personal services to individuals miscellaneous business services, auto repair and other repair services, amusement and recreation services and hotels and motels.

The selected service trade establishments in the county employed 30 persons exclusive of proprietors, and had a payroll for the year of \$62,000.

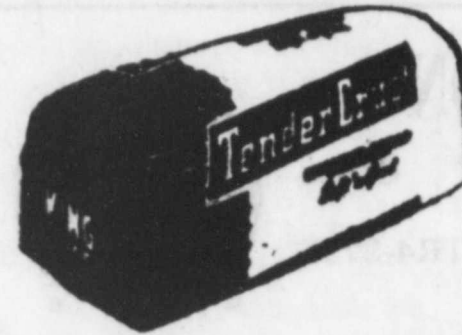
