Wheat Performance

Wheat performance is now complete. All plow-ups have been measured and final notices are being prepared for mailing for these farms.

Agricultural Conservation Program

We are nearly halfway through our ACP year for 1965. My how time flies! The budget is exhausted at the present time although there will be some funds come back through cancellations and under earnings on practices already approved. Priority will be given to long-term conservation practices until such time that we may receive additional funds. Funds available above the need for permanent practices will be used on a first-come first-serve basis.

Yields

The County Committee, assisted by the Community Committees, are working on county expected yields. We expect to have our report submitted to the State Office on or before June 18. We do not know at this time what effect this will have on our County yields but we are required to get this done.

Around the County

A different farming practice is being carried out on the D. G. Bray farm north of Clarendon in the Goldston Community. Mr. Bray is weeding his cotton by using geese. This has been tried in other places with favorable results but as far as we know very little has been done in this county. We hope Mr. Bray will let us know how successful this practice is so we can pass the word along to other producers in the county.

Most of the County received a lot of beneficial moisture this past week. Parts of the county also received some damaging hail and winds. We are fortunate, however, that it is still early enough that any crops up can be replanted. The moisture was very greatly needed and appreciated.

TB: the Problem that Won't Go Away

610,000 Americans still have active tuberculosis or are classified as "high risk" individuals.

NUMBER OF PEOPLE

A. 110,000 are known to have active tuberculosis.
 B. 250,000 are recently recovered TB patients, many of whom are subject to relapse.
 C. 250,000 are known to have had contact with new active TB cases recently reported.

610,000 persons, all told, are now in the TB picture—either as actively ill patients or in the "high risk" category. Christmas Seal funds help provide the hope and the means of achieving ultimate control and eradication of tuberculosis in the U. S.

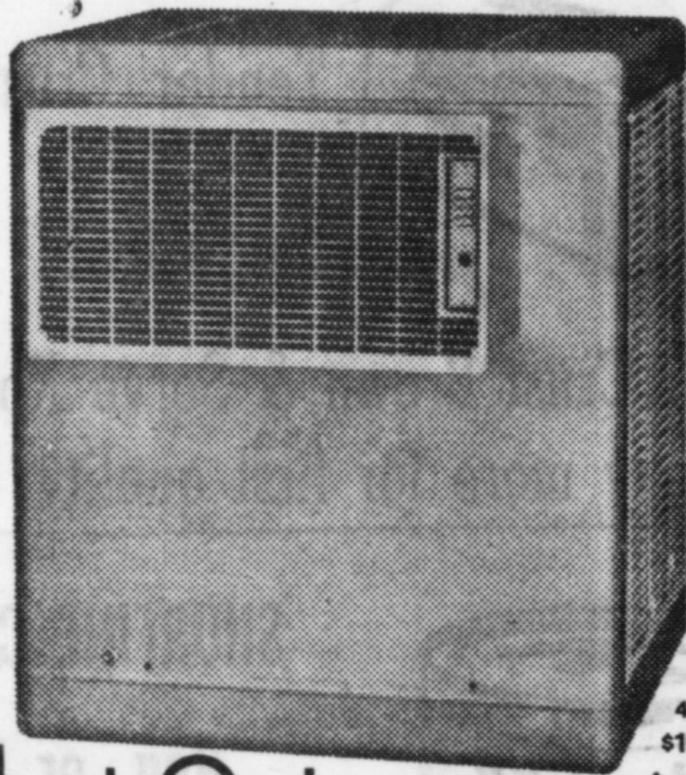

Changes in the Cotton Loan Program

The USDA has announced changes in the cotton loan program to make the program more convenient for cotton producers and less costly to CCC. Beginning with the 1965 crop of cotton, all loans will be disbursed by the ASCS County Offices only. In the past, loans could be disbursed by lending agencies also.

Under the new procedure all loan notes executed by producers, warehouse receipts, and all related documents will remain in custody of ASCS county offices until loan maturity or redemption. This will make it possible for producers and persons who purchase loan equities to redeem cotton from the loan easier and quicker because redemptions can be accomplished at county offices. In the past, all loan documents have been maintained at the ASCS Commodity Office in New Orleans.

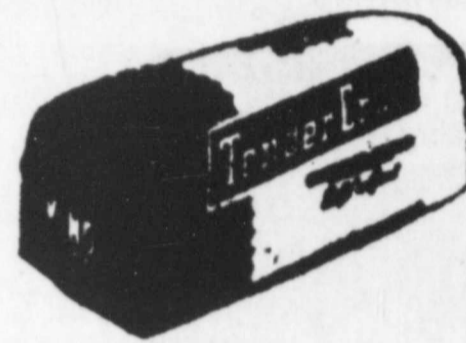
