
A 590 lb. bale was ginned from 2500 lb of seed cotton.



News From Our County Agent

It's time for farmers and ranchers to file their claim for refund of federal tax on gasoline used for farming and ranching purposes, says County Agent Ronald Gooch. This claim will be allowed only if filed on or before Sept. 30, 1965. The period covered by this claim is from July 1, 1964, through June 30, 1965

Any farmer or rancher needing Form 2240, which is used in filing for the tax refund, can obtain them by contacting the County Agent's office.

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
Melodrama at Hall County Celebration
