# Mustangs Bi-District Champs! Ease By Cotton Center 50-48 Tuesday Nite

With one side of Dimmitt High School gym's concrete bleachers crammed full of excited basketball fans and Cotton Center's side almost as full, Bovina's Mustangs eked out a 50-48 win over the Cotton Center Elks last night in a bi-district game.

The win earned Bovina the right to play in the Regional Tournament in Canyon Friday and Saturday. The Mustangs will first play Briscoe, winner of districts 11 and 12 at 7:00 p. m. Friday.

Last night's game was close, there was never more than six points separating the two teams

who were the best in their respective districts.

The Cotton Center boys played a slow, methodical brand of ball and forced the Mustangs, ordinarily a fast break team, to play the same way most of the game.

The first quarter saw both teams hold a two point lead at times, but when the quarter ended, the score was tied 12-12.

The second quarter netted the Mustangs one point. It ended 25-24. However, Neil Smith and Darrel Read both stole the ball from Elk ball handlers during the quarter and dropped the stol-

on ball through their own basket to keep the locals in front. They held a scant lead throughout the quarter.

At the intermission, the tension was on as much as ever, the one point lead the Mustangs held wasn't enough to make anyone feel at ease.

With 5:33 remaining on the clock, the Mustangs lost the lead and Cotton Center led 28-27. Read poured in a jump shot to give the local five the lead back, but it was quickly gone again. The Elks scored three field goals—six points—and were in possession of a 34-29 lead before the

Ponies could counter again.

Erith Hawkins and Larry Ezell closed the gap in the score with three free throws between them to make the score 34-32, seconds later, Ezell tipped in the tying two pointer.

A Cotton Center long shot rolled around the rim and then fell out of the basket as the buzzer sounded to leave the third quarter score tied 34-34.

With the beginning of the fourth quarter, the tension was still building, if that was possible.

Hawkins made two field goals early to give the Mustangs a four point lead, then, Smith, the

Mustangs' play maker, calmly and coolly dropped in a jump shot from the free throw line to increase the lead to six points. 6:08 remained.

But Cotton Center tied it up shortly with two field goals and two free throws. Hawkins came back with two more field goals. Read added a jump shot to gain the six point lead back, 46-40.

Cotton Center made two points, then Smith countered with two, 48-42. The Elks made a shot from the side to make it 48-44. Then Smith, who was being rushed passed to Hawkins, who had been left open near the goal,

Hawkins laid the ball in the basket to make the score 50-44 to end the Mustangs' scoring for the night. Just 44 seconds playing time remained. Two free throws for Cotton Center made it 50-46 and a tip in with two seconds left made the score 50-48.

Hawkins lead the locals' scoring with 20 points. Smith tossed in 14. Ezell made eight. Read, handicapped by the best guard he has played against this season, made six, and Billy Richards made two. Billy Johnson didn't score.

## Agreement Adopted By Gas Association

Farmers belonging to the Parmer County Gas Association adopted a partnership agreement among themselves at a meeting Friday night in Bovina. The group will own some 25 miles of natural gas pipe line that will run north of Bovina.

Floyd Dunavart was elected permanent chairman of the group at the Friday meeting. He had been acting as temporary chairman. O. W. Rhinehart was named vice-chairman and C. R. Elliott, secretary-treasurer.

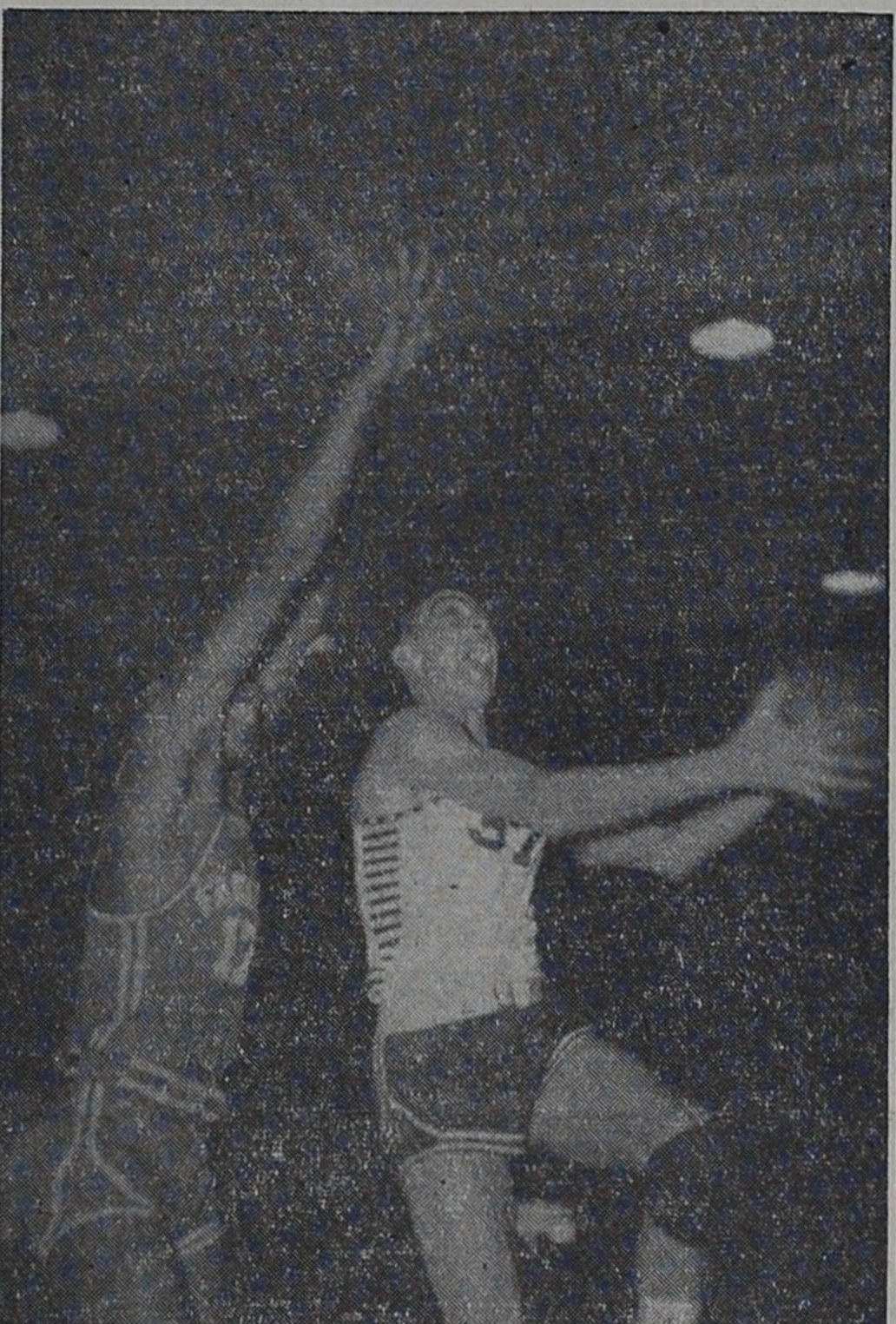
Contract for construction of the line was let to Bob Orr of Panhandle Steel Company of Amarillo and the construction is expected to be completed by the last of this week.

Approximately 40 irrigation wells will be serviced by the line.

The Association will have an annual meeting about the first of February. At this time, problems, if any, will be discussed and officers for the coming year will be elected.

Pioneer Natural Gas Company will pay for four and one-half miles of the line. The remainder of the cost will be paid by the farmers who will use it.

A committee, composed of a few of the members, will work out minor details concerning the association.

# MUSTANGS REPEAT AS DISTRICT CHAMPS

## Girls End Season Tied for Second

The Bovina Fillies are tied with Farwell girls for second place in the first quarter and 19-17 in the second. But the champions proved too much for the hard-trying Fillies in the third quarter when they pushed ahead 31-25 by scoring 14 points while the Fillies made only six.

The Fillies opened the tournament Thursday night against Adrian. Pauline Lloyd made 19 points for the Fillies, while Janice Richards made 15, and Dee Pounds made 10. Irma Jordan made 29 points for the losers.

The score by quarters was Bovina 12, Adrian 8, after the first, 24-22 at the half, and 33-41 at the end of the third.

The game with Lazbuddie Friday morning was the fourth meeting for the two teams with Lazbuddie winning this and the two conference games and the Fillies defeating them in the Farwell Invitational tournament in January.

The Fillies managed to keep a two-point lead during the entire

first half, with scores of 12-10 in the first quarter and 19-17 in the second. But the champions proved too much for the hard-trying Fillies in the third quarter when they pushed ahead 31-25 by scoring 14 points while the Fillies made only six.

Janice Richards led the scoring with 21 points, while Pauline Lloyd made 13, and Kay Leake made two.

The Fillies will meet Farwell, who placed second in the tourney by defeating Vega and losing to Lazbuddie, to decide the second place winner next week.

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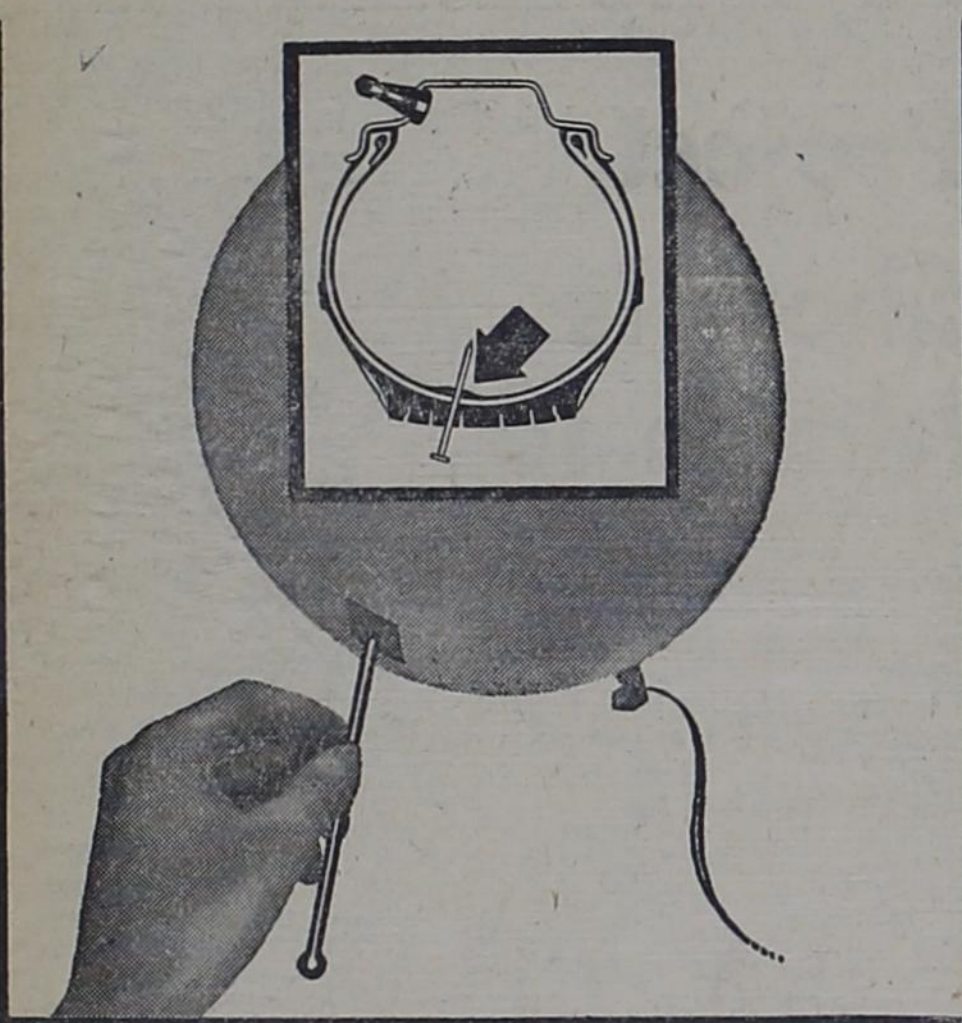

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
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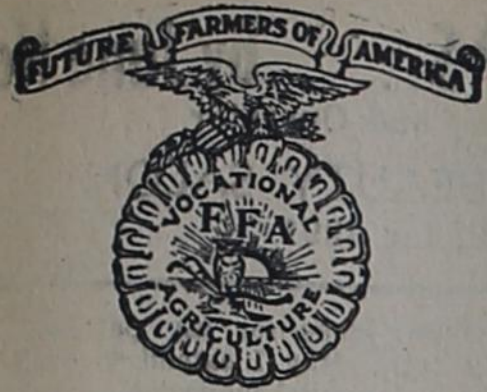

### Vegetable Council Is Organized To Push New Industry

Farmers, businessmen, and others interested in bringing organized production of fresh vegetables to the Plains met together at Plainview February 14 and brought into being the West Texas Vegetable Council, the first large-scale group of its type ever to appear in this part of the state.

Although the constitution and by-laws of the organization are now in a formative stage, it is no secret that the aim of the Council will be to bring about a survey of the possibilities of large-scale vegetable production in the region, and to supervise the establishment of such.

Ronald Davis, Lazbuddie farmer, who first started the ball rolling on the effort, was elected temporary president of the organization.

Other officers, also on a temporary basis: L. A. Marshall, Floydada, first vice-president; Don Anthony, Dumas, second vice-president; Jason O. Gordon, Plainview, secretary-treasurer.

The 35 members of the council present heard talks from several ag officials, including Dr. W. N. Williamson, assistant director of Extension Service, A&M College.

He stressed the need for a survey to determine the feasibility of such a move before production steps are taken.

The council also listened to Dr. John McNeely, marketing specialist from the A&M Experiment Station. He gave an optimistic note to the meeting by pointing out the increased growth of the fresh vegetable markets in this country due to diet changes, increasing population, the decline of "back yard gardening," and other factors.

One of the major steps taken at the meeting was the issuance of a formal request to G. G. Gibson, director of the Extension Service, asking that assistance be given in making the preliminary survey, which the Council feels should be gotten under way as soon as possible.

Pledges of cooperation were obtained from Dr. George Elle, assistant dean of agriculture at Texas Tech, who said that all the facilities of that department would be available for the work; and a like expression of help from the agriculture department of West Texas College by Dr. R. M. Callihan, head of that department.

Work of the Council was divided into four categories, and committees named to proceed along those lines. Committees and their members:

Survey—Gene Quest, Lubbock; R. G. Jones, Anton; Arno Struve, Abernathy.

Finance—Don Anthony, Dumas; Hosea Foster, Canyon; B. R. Evans, Tulia.

Organization—Gene McLaughlin, Ralls; Arlon Miller, Floydada; Herman B. Thornton, Lockney.

Education and information—Nelson Welch, Friona; Arlin Hartzog, Bovina; E. O. Baker, Muleshoe; Don Williams, Farwell.

Until the organizational committee workers can draw up a constitution and by-laws, the Council will work informally on its goals.

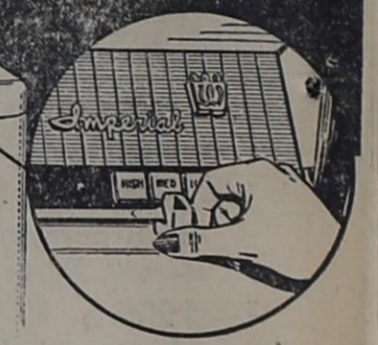
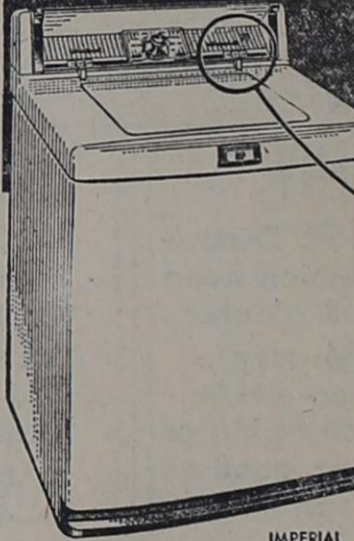

HISTORY OF THE FARM BUREAU

The earlier farm organizations in the United States were, in the main, Protest Movements, Political Movements, organized for one particular purpose. The Farm Bureau is none of these. It was organized to represent, speak for, and enable, farmers to work together on a broad National front in solving

their problems. It's organization and development came about as a result of a desire of farmers to assume their full responsibilities as citizens to take their places at the first table on a basis of equality with other organized groups.

PHILOSOPHY OF FARM BUREAU

The basic philosophy of Farm Bureau is stated in American Farm Bureau Federation as follows: In order to maintain and improve our capitalistic system and prevent further steps in the trend to socialism, which if unchecked may lead to Communism, we assert the following beliefs:

"We Believe: In the American Competitive system under which supply and demand in the market place are the deciding factor of price. That every man is entitled to earn money honestly. It is his right to save, invest and spend his money as he chooses. He is also privileged to own property he desires within the limits of the laws."

"We Believe: In voluntary co-operation as a part of the American way of life."

"We Believe: That our economic system should be permitted to produce at the highest possible rate of efficiency."

"We Believe: That monopoly in any form is dangerous, whether it is by government, industry, labor, or agriculture. That property

BASIC CONCEPTS OF FARM BUREAU

It is a FARMERS organization. It is financed by farmers, run by farmers, to do for farmers what farmers want done.

It is a GENERAL farm organization. Its membership consists of producers of all kinds of farm commodities from every state in the union and Puerto Rico. A basic concept is "The interest of farmers can best be served by reconciling differences within agriculture."

It seeks to develop a CONSTRUCTIVE program designed to prevent problems or to solve those which cannot be prevented. It is not a protest movement—not 19th century belly-aching. Important phases of its program are (1) education; (2) public relations; (3) self help; (4) legislation, etc.

Its membership is a FAMILY MEMBERSHIP. Farm problems don't have gender—neither mas-

culine or feminine. Its organization structure is completely DECENTRALIZED. Organization discipline springs from desire to cooperate—self discipline, not imposed by higher organizational authority.

Its policies are developed on a NON-PARTISAN basis and support is sought on a BI-PARTISAN basis. The accomplishments of the organization; the seventeen years of consistent membership growth; the fact that it is not only the largest farm organization in the United States but also the largest in the world, the largest in the history of farm organization—provide evidence of the soundness of these basic concepts.

Watch next week's paper for some of the accomplishments of Farm Bureau that benefit the farmers in this area.

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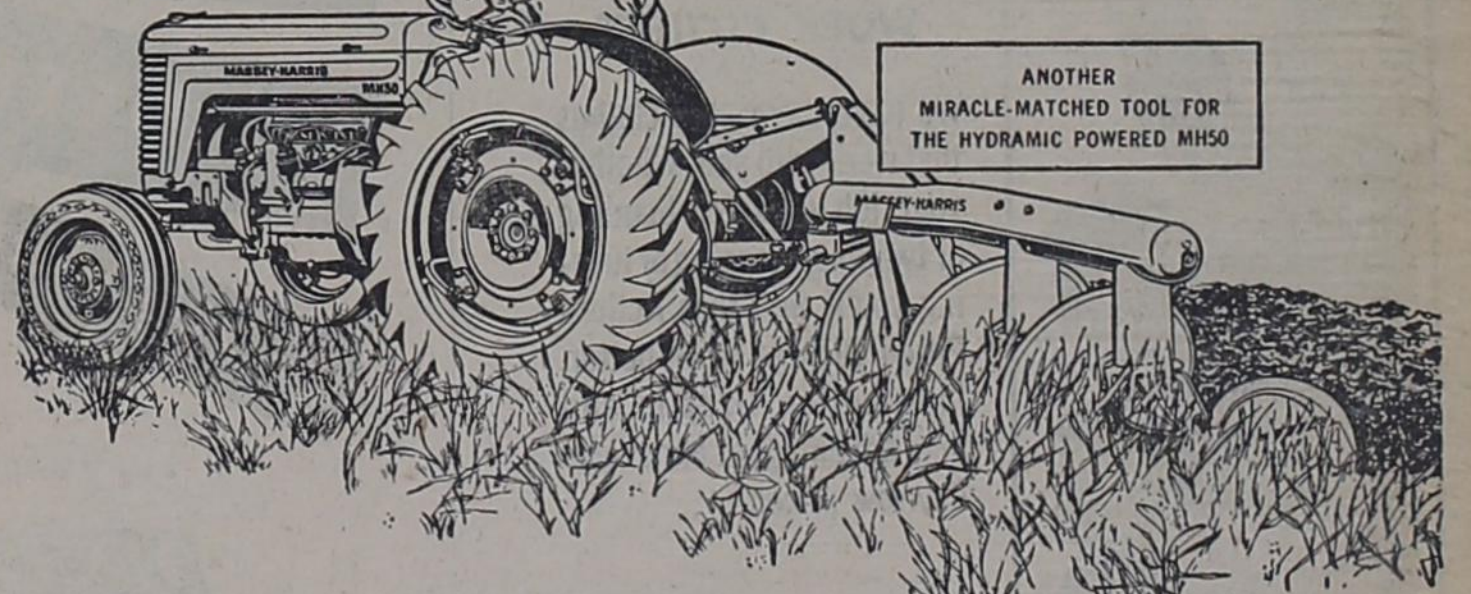
