With one side of Dimmitt High School gym's concrete bleachers crammed full of excited basketball fans and Cotton Center's side almost as full, Bovina's Mustangs eked out a 50-48 win over the Cotton Center Elks last night

in a bi-district game. The win earned Bovina the right to play in the Regional Tournament in Canyon Friday and Saturday. The Mustangs will first play Briscoe, winner of districts 11 and 12 at 7:00 p. m. Friday.
