Cotton Report

With favorable weather during the week, cotton harvesting moved into the home stretch, but the quality was lower than that of the previous week, according to the USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service in Memphis.

K. B. Voelkel of the Memphis cotton classing office stated that the 23,000 samples classed during the week ending Friday, Jan. 7, was the second largest weekly figure this season and brought the total classed to 150,000. This compared with 143,000 as of the same date a year ago. It is estimated that about 75 to 80 percent of the expected Eastern Panhandle production has been classed thus far.

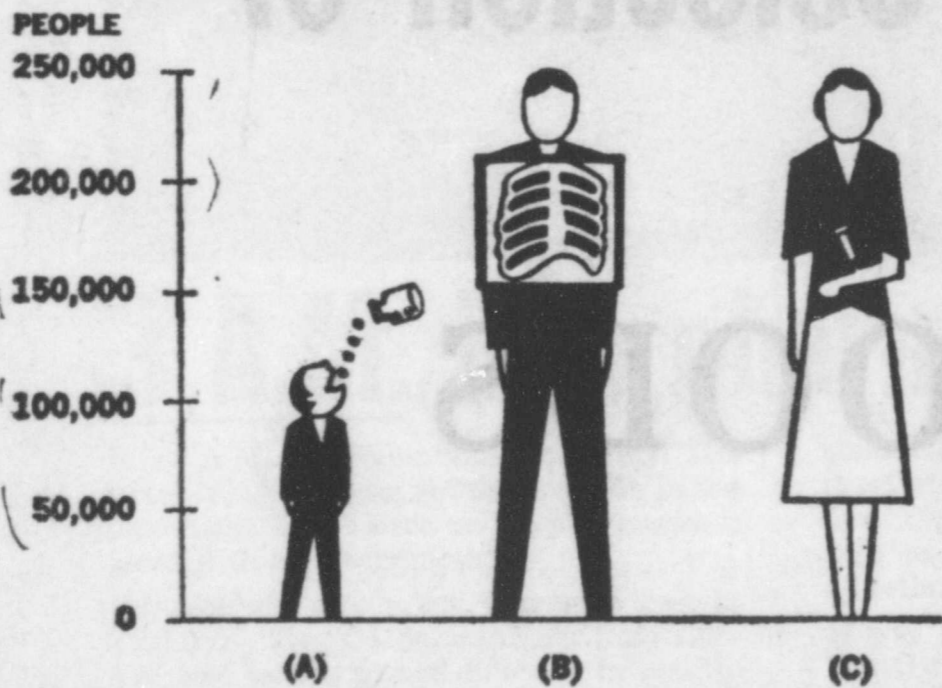

- (C) 250,000 live closely with people with newly discovered active disease.

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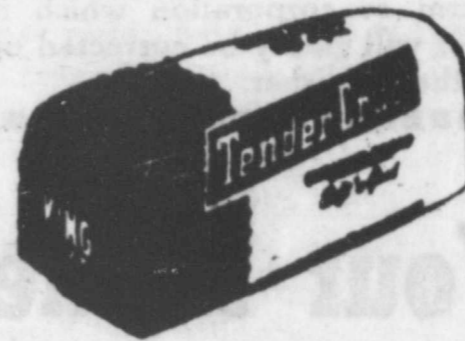
