Security State Bank Names New Director

The Board of Directors of the Security State Bank, Hedley, have announced the recent election of Donald K Carman as a director of that bank

K. S. Wooldridge, President, announced all of the interest in the bank owned by Jerry R. Weiner had been purchased by directors of the bank. Directors involved in the purchase include Mr. Carman, J. C. Shields, Delbert White and K. S. Wooldridge.

Mr. Carman, age 37, was born and reared in a small Iowa town. He was one of nine children. He attended undergraduate and graduate school at the University of Iowa, majoring in Economics and Finance. He served six years in the Air Force, rising from the rank of Private to Squadron Commander in four years. He was awarded numerous military decorations including the Air Medal for Outstanding and Meritorious Performance on highly classified reconnaissance missions.

He entered the field of investments and finance in Dallas in 1959. He was a Registered Investment Advisor with the United States Security and Exchange Commission until 1963.

Until recently, he was a director and vice president of Crown Western Investment, Inc., a Dallas based investment trust with investments totaling 15 million dollars. He was also a director and executive vice president of Security Management Corporation, which managed the Crown Western Investment trust.

He resides in the Dallas suburb of Farmers Branch with his three children, Keith, age 12, Robert, age 10 and Sherry Lynn, age 6.

He is a member of St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Dallas.

Mr. Carman is also a director of Bowie National Bank, Bowie, Tex.

Mr. Wooldridge states that the Board is most fortunate to obtain the services of a man with Mr. Carman's background and experience. His association with the bank will contribute much to our growth and progress.





Vehicle Inspection

Austin—Colonel Homer Garrison Jr, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has announced that the 1967 vehicle inspection period has begun.

He said that the new inspection period began on Sept 1 and will end on April 15, 1967. The inspection period is the same as in previous years.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1967, each of the five and one half million Texas registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection sticker from one of the 5500 official inspection stations,"

he said


Garrison pointed out that Texas inspection stations can be identified by the official vehicle inspection station sign displayed at each station.

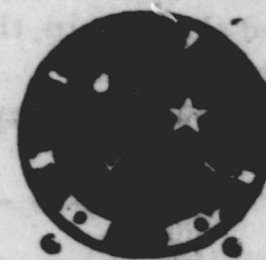

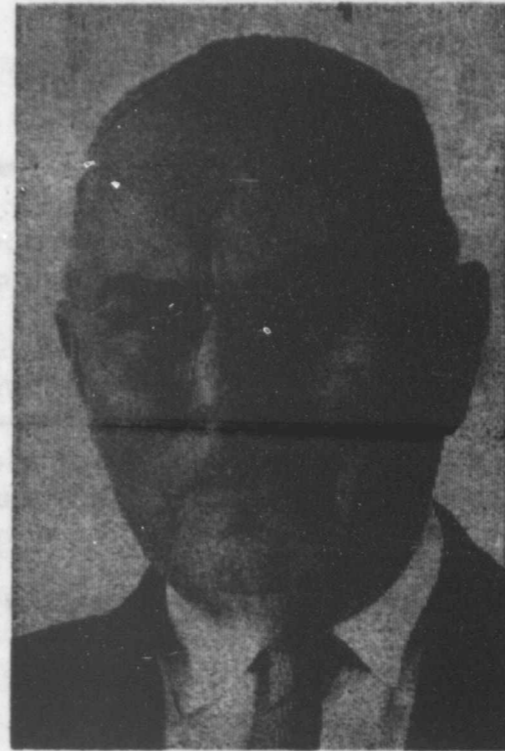

Mr Wells was born March 25, 1879 in Booneville, Miss. He first became interested in journalism while working for a weekly paper at Alvord. He began his publishing career by starting the Hollis, Okla., Herald in 1903. He was married to Miss Pearl Vineyard in Claude Oct. 30, 1904. She preceded him in death last December.

In 1910 he began the Claude Courier, and later that year started the Hedley Informer. He started the Wellington Leader in 1917 and ran it with his cousin Deakins Wells until he bought the Memphis Democrat in 1925. He ran the Democrat from 1925 until January, 1966, when he sold his interest to his partner, Herchel Combs, except for about seven years spent in other business.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. R. L. Madden of Memphis, a brother, Percy Wells of Wellington, and several nieces and nephews.

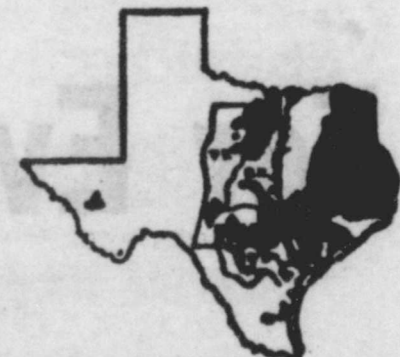
