Improving Reproduction Efficiency Is Theme of A&M Short Course

Discussions at the 22nd annual Beef Cattle Short Course at Texas A&M University, August 21-22, will center on Improving Reproductive Efficiency. The event will begin with registration at 7:30 a. m. on August 21, at the Ramada Inn in College Station.

"The program is a follow-up of last year's event," announces County Agricultural Agent Greg Gerngross. "The short course is designed to complete the story of management factors which limit breeding performance of beef cattle."

Emphasis will be given to genetic factors, death loss and disease. Select topics will include artificial insemination, cross-breeding, cow and bull fertility, calving losses, controlled calving and double muscling.

"Much emphasis will be placed on increasing the calf crop since calf crop percentage is the most important consideration affecting beef production," points out Gerngross. "With each one percent increase in calf crop, the Texas cattle in-

She then taught at Old Dewey in South Taylor Co., and later at Turner's Chapel, north of Abilene. Among her pupils was Wiley Post, famous aviator who was killed in a 1935 crash.

She married C. L. Graham August 12, 1908 in North Park, Abilene, at the home of her parents.

Survivors are her husband; one son, George of Brasoria; two daughters, Mrs. Swofford of Clyde and Mrs. George Poe of Winters; one sister, Mrs. T. D. Taylor of Sacramento, Calif.; one brother, Robert Cooke of Arlington; five grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

One son, Robert, died in 1945. Grandsons and great-grandsons served as pallbearers.

He pastored many church in the area, including Rule, Hamilton, Rising Star, Junction, Quitaque and Bangs. He was an Army Chaplain in World War II, and taught Bible at Howard Payne. He retired in 1959 as Head Chaplain of the Texas Department of Corrections.

Rev. Greer married Emmat Carter on June 11, 1906 in Brownwood. She died in 1963. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Abilene.

Survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Ray Ellis of Abilene; one brother, Cal Greer of Bangs, and three grandchildren.

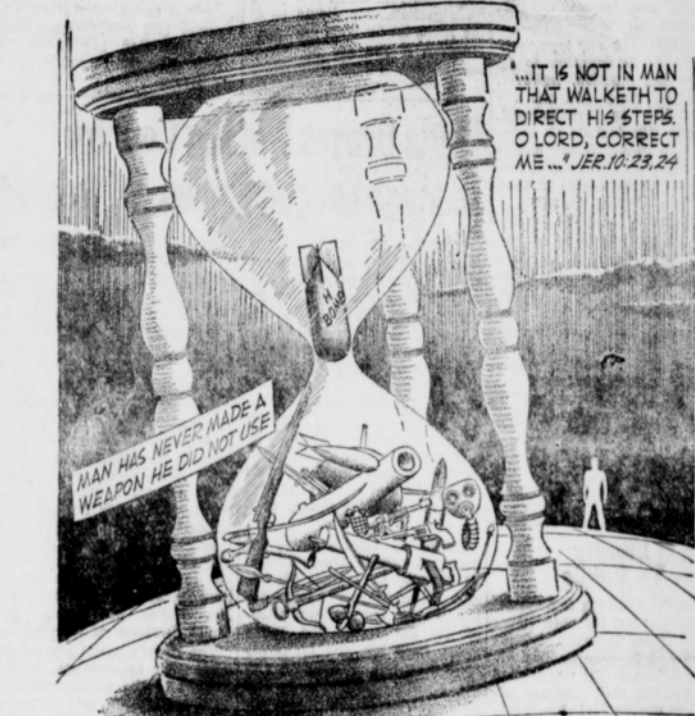

TO THE CITIZENS OF BAIRD:

We, the undersigned, are members of the City Council of Baird, and consider it an honor and a responsibility to serve on this Council. We would like to tell you more about the functions of the City Council and the operations of our City Government. Too often lately, the question has been raised "What am I getting for my tax dollar?" This is simple to answer. The City of Baird does not operate on tax money. With a budget of around \$240,000.00 per year, the city taxes account for only around \$20,000.00, or 1/12th of the annual budget. Of this \$20,000.00, approximately \$5,500.00 goes to retire Park and Improvement bonds. This leaves the City with \$14,000.00 to \$15,000.00 tax money to spend. Costs for Cemetery Operations - \$5,600.00; Street Improvements and Upkeep - \$9,300.00; Fire Department - \$3,200.00; Chamber of Commerce - \$1,020.00; Recreation - \$3,200.00; Police Protection - \$5,600.00, plus insurance and costs to assess and collect the taxes and maintain the records, total around \$30,000.00 each year. If we were to provide you with these services using your "tax dollar," you can readily see that our City Taxes would have to be nearly doubled. So, we think that you are getting a real bargain for your "tax dollar."

Some other necessary expenditures made by your City in the past two years, which again, were a tax operated city, would have to come from your "tax dollar," were the purchase of a Bucket Truck a Riding Lawn Mower, a Trencher, a Dump Truck, and a Fire Truck. These were all costly items, but necessary equipment for the upkeep of our Transmission Lines, our Park and Cemetery, our Water Lines, our Streets and our Fire Safety. Still needed to be purchased is a Heavy Maintainer, one large enough so that we can properly maintain our streets.

As was pointed out in a previous article, the City Government is composed of a Mayor and five Councilmen. The Councilmen and their responsibilities are: Mayor - J. L. Ault; Mayor Pro-Tem - Jerry Loper; Streets - Jimmy Godfrey; Utilities - Charles Walker; Parks & Cemetery - Jim Lane, and Water - Steve Warren. These men do not function as individuals, but as members of the team, with the Mayor as the Administrative Officer, and in his absence, the Mayor Pro-Tem. It would be impossible to get anything accomplished day by day if each Councilman were to try to arrange the work-load for his co-called department, since our City employees work in all departments when needed, and are under the supervision of one City Superintendent.

We feel that the main job of your City Council is to wisely and prudently administer the use of all of your city dollars, and in this undertaking, we welcome your suggestions. If you have a "gripe" about something that your City is or is not doing, we welcome your complaints, and will strive to remedy the situation, whatever it is. The Council meets on the Second and Fourth Tuesdays each month, and our meetings are always open to you.

Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Property tax reform may be one of the big issues before the 1973 session of the Texas Legislature.

This is the prediction of Texas Research League in a newsletter analyzing the subject.

The property tax, notes TRL, is the largest source of revenue for support of the government in Texas. Collections exceeded \$1.4 billion in 1970 and rose \$220 million between 1968 and 1970.

Recent federal and state court decisions holding public school finance systems based on locally-imposed property taxes unconstitutional focused new attention on such taxation. The decisions stimulated interest of House and Senate committees on extensive reforms.

Criticisms of revenue source and proposals for reform may center on these factors as pointed up in the TRY study:

Administration is inequitable. Different standards apply to different types of property.

There are too few professionally-trained assessors, and many tax offices lack even the most fundamental tools such as tax maps and appraisal cards on each parcel of property. Furthermore, there are far too many tax office sand districts. (Given an "impossible tax law" to administer, local officials do remarkable well, according to a Tax Policy Committee study.)

Personal property - tangible and intangible - is particularly difficult to assess. Some states have given up attempting to tax all property, and recognize this fact in basic laws.

Taxpayers are at a marked disadvantage in redressing grievances over illegal or inequitable assessment in the courts.

"ABOLISH BOARD" — Former State Insurance Board Chairman Larry Teaver says the best way to promote insurance regulation reform in Texas is by the drastic remedy of abolishing the Board.

Teaver was rejected for Board membership by the state Senate, and apparently has returned to Gov. Preston Smith's staff.

He told an interview panel that insurance industry influence cannot be removed from regulation without getting rid of the Board which he charged is industry-dominated.

The former chairman suggested the present three-member Board should be made a nine-member, part-time citizen board or that an elected insurance commissioner be chosen to head the regulatory agency.

DEATH PENALTY REVIEW SOUGHT — Texas and Georgia will ask the U. S. Supreme Court to review its decision declaring the death penalty, as it is most often applied, unconstitutional. Meanwhile, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has received a request from the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles for an official interpretation of the June 29 Supreme Court decision. The Board also wanted to know if the death penalty actually had been declared unconstitutional. Some justices hinted a constitutional death penalty provision may be possible.
