Dedication Service

The First Baptist Church of Hedley will hold dedication services and open house for their new educational building this Sunday, June 4.

The Dedication Service will be held during the 11 o'clock morning worship service. The pastor, Rev. C H Murphy Jr. will bring the message.

The membership of the church extends a cordial invitation to all people to attend the dedication services and view the new building. Open House will be held from 2 until 4 p. m.

The new educational building, containing 1850 square feet, is air conditioned and centrally heated, and is paneled throughout. The total cost of construction and furnishings was \$8700. This low cost was made possible by men of the church who donated labor to help in construction.

The new educational space provides an additional 2 departmental assembly rooms, 7 class rooms, and ladies rest room. The new unit combined with the existing educational facilities provides the church with ample Sunday School and training space to meet the needs of all age groups.

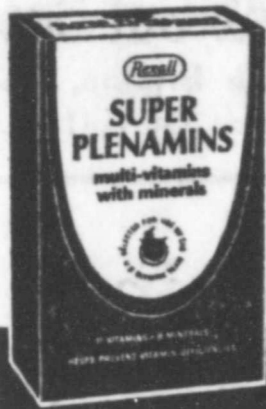

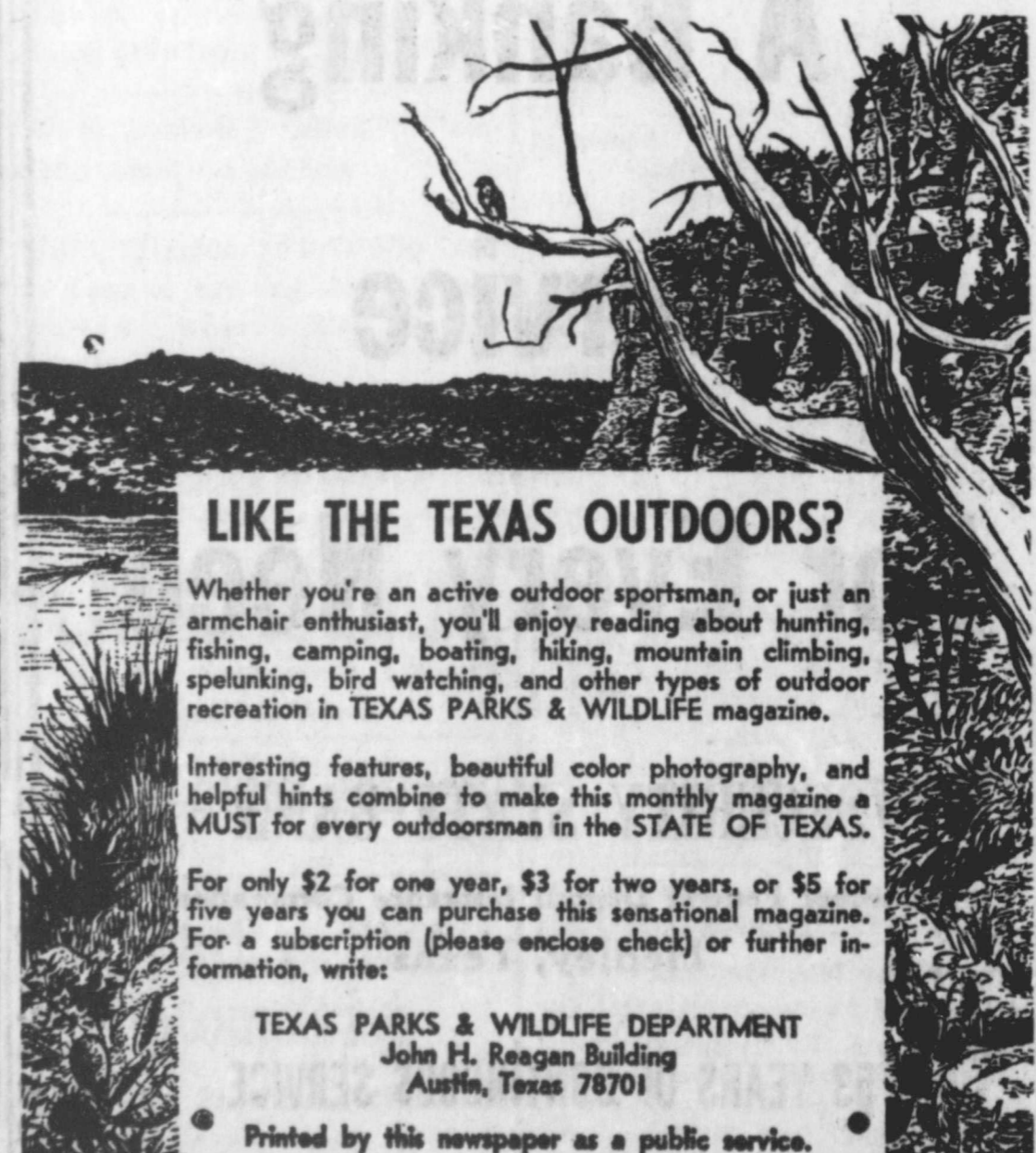
