Final Payments

Final payments will be computed by the New Orleans Commodity Office this year. As soon as possible after acreages are reported, program documents will be sent to them. It will then take the commodity office about 10 days to compute the payments, prepare the drafts and return them to us. Wheat checks can then be released immediately; cotton and feed grain checks can be released on August 28. So you can see if you certify now, you will be able to get your checks earlier.

Diverted Acres

Farm operators are reminded that diverted acres are to be maintained the entire year in an acceptable manner. Due to the recent rains additional plowing may be necessary to control weeds and thistles on this land. Don't let the weeds take your payments!

Soil Bank Farms

If yours is a soil bank farm, a reporter from this offce will measure your crops at no cost to you. You will not be required to certify to the acreages planted and—or diverted

We ask your cooperation in going with the reporter who visits your farm Please go with him, or if that is impossible, have a representative who can help him.




