Vehicle Inspection

Texas motorists will find higher standards will be required in automotive safety inspections starting August 28. The inspection period will continue through the usual deadline, April 15

A new provision is the increased inspection fee, from \$1 00 to \$1.75. Under the new law, front seat belts are required on every vehicle which had seat belt anchorages as as part of the original equipment. This includes all American made passenger cars beginning with 1962

The new regulations also take in two more new areas, calling for mechanics to inspect steering and rims. Stickers will not be issued to vehicles with loose steering or in which the steering wheel cannot be turned from full right to full left without jamming, por to vehicles with defective or bent rim flanges, or with loose or missing bolts, nuts or lugs






