If they are: Good riddance. Let us be among the first to say we're glad to see them go.

Henry Minter and Bill Denney are fine gentlemen and are doing wonderful jobs for the community in their respective positions of deputy sheriff and city marshall.

But try as we can, we just can't work up the tremendous respect for them that the fiveyear-old-we-know-best has. He's of the opinion that there can't possibly be anything wrong with anything that the two Bovina lawmen come in contact with.

If all five-year-olds in this community have the same respect for Minter and Denney that he does, and they keep it, there won't be any problems for Bovina law enforcement officials in years to come.

And back a few months ago, when Bill was still fire chief, and city marshall all at the same time, that was a double good deal in the eyes of a youngster. Until now, we just haven't gotten around to telling him that

anymore. Maybe we should. We have spent some time trying to explain to him that newspapermen are important, too, but apparently our efforts along that line have all been useless.

Hidden Levies Top Income Tax

For every dollar in federal ncome taxes paid by an individual he also pays \$1.29 in other federal taxes, most of which are hidden.

The above formula was arrived at by the Tax Foundation, after months of careful computations.

Thus, a person whose income tax deductions is \$15 a week, pays another \$18 weekly in various other federal taxes, bringing the total tax assessment to \$33 weekly.

Though some of the taxes, such as Social Security, can be seen, the majority of the others are hidden - having been added to the manufacturers' prices on a wide variety of goods, but not shown by Carol Robbins, McCamey as separate items in the final purchase.






