## Primary Election

In the first primary election here Saturday, 332 votes were cast. Preston Smith led the ticket for governor and Ben Barnes led for lieutenant governor. Calvert led Blankenship, Davis led McGee, Denton led Reavley, Simpson led Bruce, and Hazlewood led two opponents.

In races of local interest, Bill Cornell received 174 votes for sheriff and Frank Tyler 141. Over the county an unofficial total gave Cornell 836 and Tyler 637. Junior Hill received 224 votes in Hedley and 46 in Lelia Lake for commissioner, while Bill Cooke received 90 in Hedley and 31 in Lelia Lake, making the total Hill 270, Cooke 121. In the district attorney race, Jack Boone received 155 votes in Hedley and Robert Montgomery 133. Over the district, an unofficial return gave Boone 3967 votes and Montgomery 3425.

Other candidates were unopposed. All the referendums were voted down in Hedley.

The voting period is tentatively set for May 13 through May 17. If approved by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote, it will permit such transfers for 1969.

**Tornado Season**

Texans are reminded that the tornado season is with us again. Statistics from the United States Weather Bureau show that Texas led the nation again last year in total number of tornadoes, with a total of 232, which was an all time record. Only two months of last year were free from tornadoes in Texas, January and November. More than half of them, 124, came in September, 115 of them in connection with Hurricane Beulah.

Weather alerts may give that extra margin of time which might mean the difference between life and death, but it is still up to each individual to take the safety measures necessary to protect himself in case of a tornado. The safest place to be is still a storm cellar.

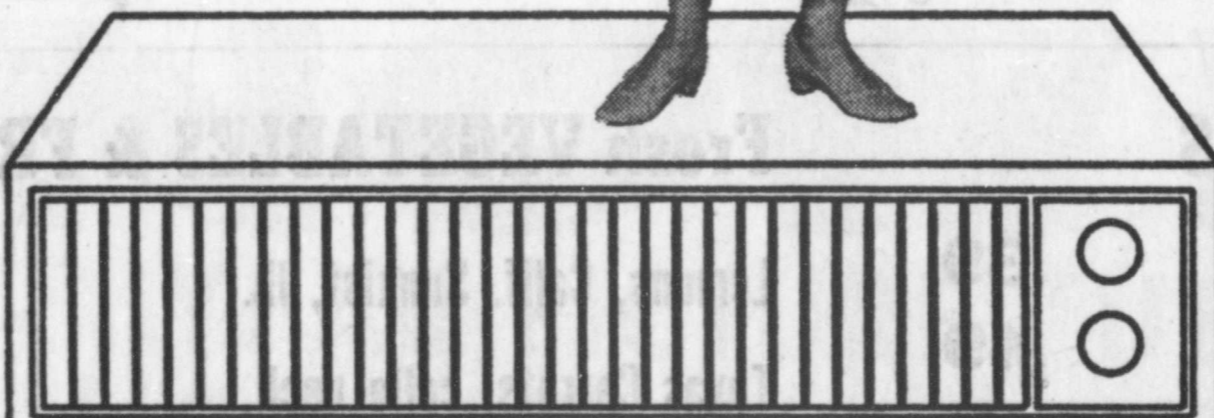

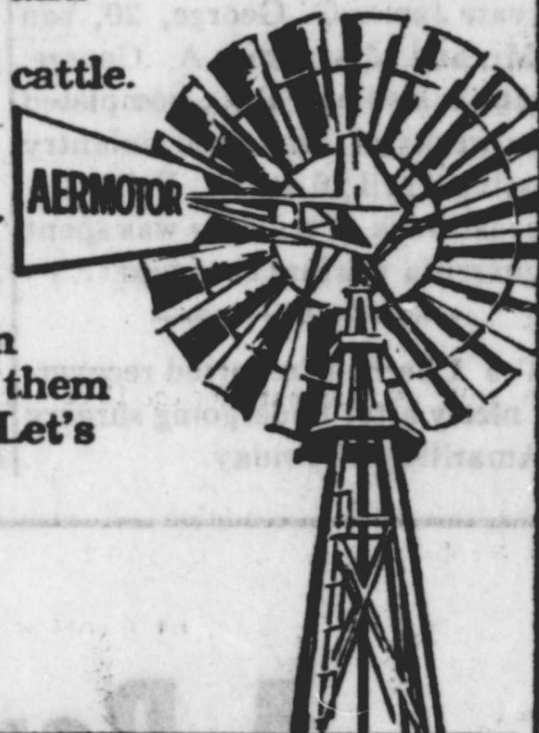
