


AUGUST STARTED out innocently enough on the local scene, but it now appears that the month will wind up being one of the wettest months on record here.

The unusual thing about it is that the extremely wet month will be recorded amidst one of the driest years, otherwise, that has ever been experienced hereabouts.

Some parts of the immediate area have received upwards of seven inches of rain within the past week. The same areas had received barely half that much in the greater part of the eight months prior to this week. ****

ON THE PLUS side of the ledger is the fact that most of the moisture fell slowly, so that the biggest majority of the rain soaked into the farmland.

True, the moisture would have been worth considerably



Monday, September 2, which is Labor Day, will be a holiday in Bovina.

The majority of businesses here will be closed and there will be no classes at Bovina Schools that day.

Labor Day traditionally marks the end of summer and the long holiday gives many the opportunity for a final trip to the mountains, lake or elsewhere before settling into the school routine and busy autumn harvest season.

Bovina Schools will dismiss classes at 3 p.m. Friday and resume regular schedule Tues-



Lightning Kills Horses, Sets Off Fire Alarm

Irrigation wells across Parmer County are silent this week-some for the first time since February of this year--following an official 6.29 inches of rain which began falling Wednesday night of last week and continued through Monday morning.

Although predictions called for skies to clear by Monday afternoon, area residents awoke Tuesday morning to leaden skies and intermittant light rain during the morning. The moisture, which fell slowly most of the time, was absorbed by the parched farmland in this area, however, by Sunday afternoon the rainfall was running off the soaked land filling every shallow depression and lake in In another weather-related the county.

causing the fire alarm to sound for several minutes about 3:30 p.m. Sunday and 1:30 a.m. Monday. Several residents apparently believed the alarm indicated a tornado alert and sought shelter in basements and cellars Monday morning.

Fire Chief Gaylon Rhodes. when contacted about the signals used by the city for tornado alerts, reminded residents that a tornado alert is indicated by intermittent short blasts on the siren during the alert followed by a long, steady siren indicating the alert has ended. The one, long steady blast on the siren is also used to signal called meetings of the fire department every other Monday night.

began Monday morning at Bovina Schools, school busses could not run on the country roads, either that morning or when classes dismissed that afternoon. On Tuesday, the busses ran their regular routes where possible but were still not on regular schedule.

The annual watermelon feast, hosted by the Bovina school board in honor of members of the faculty, was also postponed and perhaps cancelled. Superintendent L.F. Jacobs said the event would be rescheduled if the weather cleared up and watermelons were still available.

While farmers in general welcomed the rainfall after the prolonged dry spell, vegetable growers reported that their incident, a registered Quarter crops would begin to suffer if warm, sunny weather didn't return soon. **R.R. Lusk at Gateway Farms** here said that harvest had continued for most of the vegetables with four-wheel drive vehicles used in the soaked fields to gather the crop. He said the quality and tonnage of the cantaloupe and cucumbers had been affected to some degree, but that other crops were in good condition.

Observers agree that most crops still were benefitted by the moisture, with the exception of the vegetables, which were in the midst of harvest operations.

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the Emergency Livestock Credit Act will become available next week through a new loan guarantee authority of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), a rural credit service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Billy R. Boling, FmHA County Supervisor, said the agency will be prepared to implement the recently-enacted law by guaranteeing up to 80 per cent of possible loss on loans made by legally organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers.

Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee program will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for six months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally organized lenders. Boling said interested producers are urged to make applications to, and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions. The lender in turn will ask FmHA for a loan guarantee if one is required. The lender will process the application, close the loan and service it.


The maximum loan to any single borrower that can be assisted by an FmHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans will be repayable in from 1 to 3 years, although renewal for 2 years may be authorized. Interest rates will be determined between borrower and lender. Boling said the agency is authorized to guarantee up to




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
