

News From Our County Agent

The first generation of the elm leaf beetle is hatching now and beginning to damage elm trees throughout Donley County, according to Ronald Gooch, County Agent. The elm leaf beetle is one of the most destructive pests of the elm tree. The yellowish-green 1/4 inch long beetle or the small yellow to black larvae can be found skeletonizing the under side of the leaf or crawling about on the bark of the trunk of infected

This beetle can be controlled by thoroughly spraying the trees with one of the following insecticides: Sevin, DDT, Toxaphene, Malathion, or Chlordane. A second application may be necessary about midsummer to control second and third generation beetles. The addition of 3/4 teaspoon of linseed oil per gallon of spray will help the spray stick to the leaves of the tree.
