MOST PEOPLE AGREE that President Carter's action in breaking off diplomatic relations with Iran, expelling the Iranian diplomats and training pilots was entirely in order, and was not a bit too soon.

In fact, most people think that even more stiff action should be taken, if there were some which could be.

One observer has said that the only thing the Iranians recognize is force, and that the U.S. government should already have arrested 50 Iranians and jailed them, so we would have more of a bargaining point.

This, of course, would be "illegal arrest," and our government, attempting to be a model nation, would not stoop to violations of international law. But when you're dealing with people and nations who don't play by the rules, sometimes you have to get down to their level.

Some type of positive action needs to be taken, to bring about the release of the American hostages, who have been held entirely too long already.

AMERICANS ARE FINDING new ways of hedging against inflation, with the annual inflation rate not only in the "double digit" category, but well into the double digits at that.

Some have gone from savings accounts to investing their savings in such things as gold, silver, diamonds, etc. However, in the case of the silver market, numbers of investors, including the wealthy Hunt family of Texas, found out last week that even this type of investment has its pitfalls when the market plunged drastically after having climbed to record highs.

Collections of all sorts have always been considered good investments--coins, stamps, etc. The news this week told of the auction sale in New York of "the world's most famous stamp," an 1856 one-cent stamp from British Guiana.

The stamp was sold at auction for \$850,000, the largest amount ever paid for a single stamp. The stamp is the only existing one of its type and has been described as the most valuable single object in the world "for its size and weight."

The stamp had been put up for sale by Irwin Weinberg, a collector from Wilkes Barre, Pennsylvania, who bought it as a hedge against inflation in 1970 for \$280,000. The amount was a record at that time for a stamp sale.

Stamp experts had thought it possible that the Guiana stamp could have sold for over a million dollars at this week's auction sale.

IT SEEMS THAT WE are having more wind, or perhaps having it in "faster doses" than even our area usually has in the spring.

The big blow of Monday, March 31, was one of the worst in these parts in several years. Oldtimers could remember times when there was more dust in the air than last week, making it darker, but few could recall the wind ever blowing any harder than it did that day, and for the prolonged time.

Hopefully, the spring "zephyrs" will diminish soon. We don't need any more of those destructive types.

Co-Op Has Underground Office Here

The West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative is building new underground offices to service the Sharp, Parmer and Oklahoma Lane exchanges.

One of the new offices is located on the Jimmie Cockerham farm north of Bovina. Cockerham explained to the Blade that this office was partly above the ground due to the nature of the location.

The other 12x20 offices will be completely underground. The reasoning for the offices being built underground is so the structures will not be harmed by the weather; plus the fact that the system has to be maintained at a certain temperature.

Being underground, the correct temperature will be easier to maintain.

The one and one-half million dollar investment in equipment, offices and lines will include the latest digital system equipment available. The services which will be offered to the users will be the touch tone, call waiting, conference call, call forwarding and speed calling.

According to Cockerham, the new offices will be in operation in the month of June.

Junior High Favorites Told

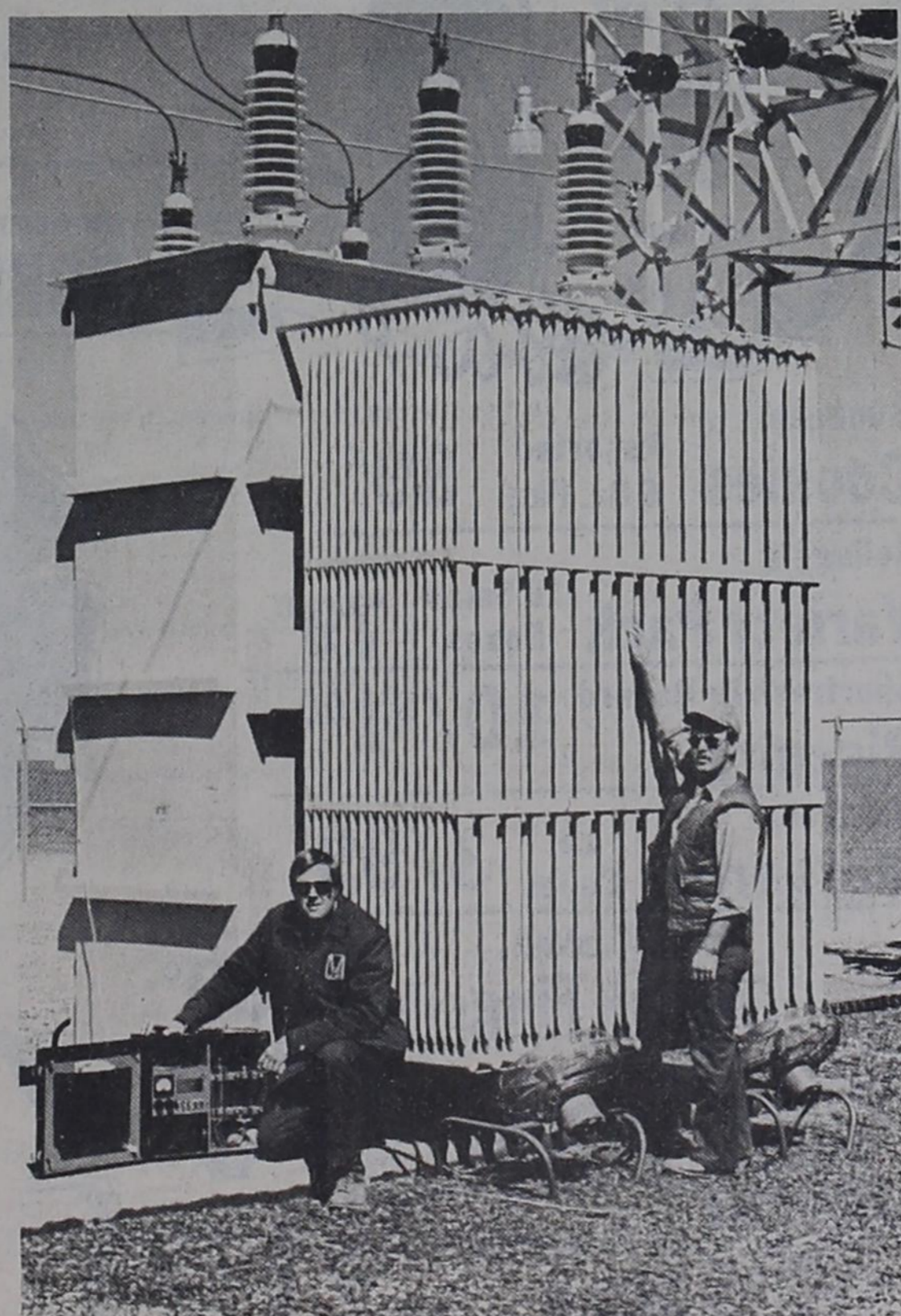
Bovina Junior High School students recently chose class favorites and "Mr. and Miss B.J.H."

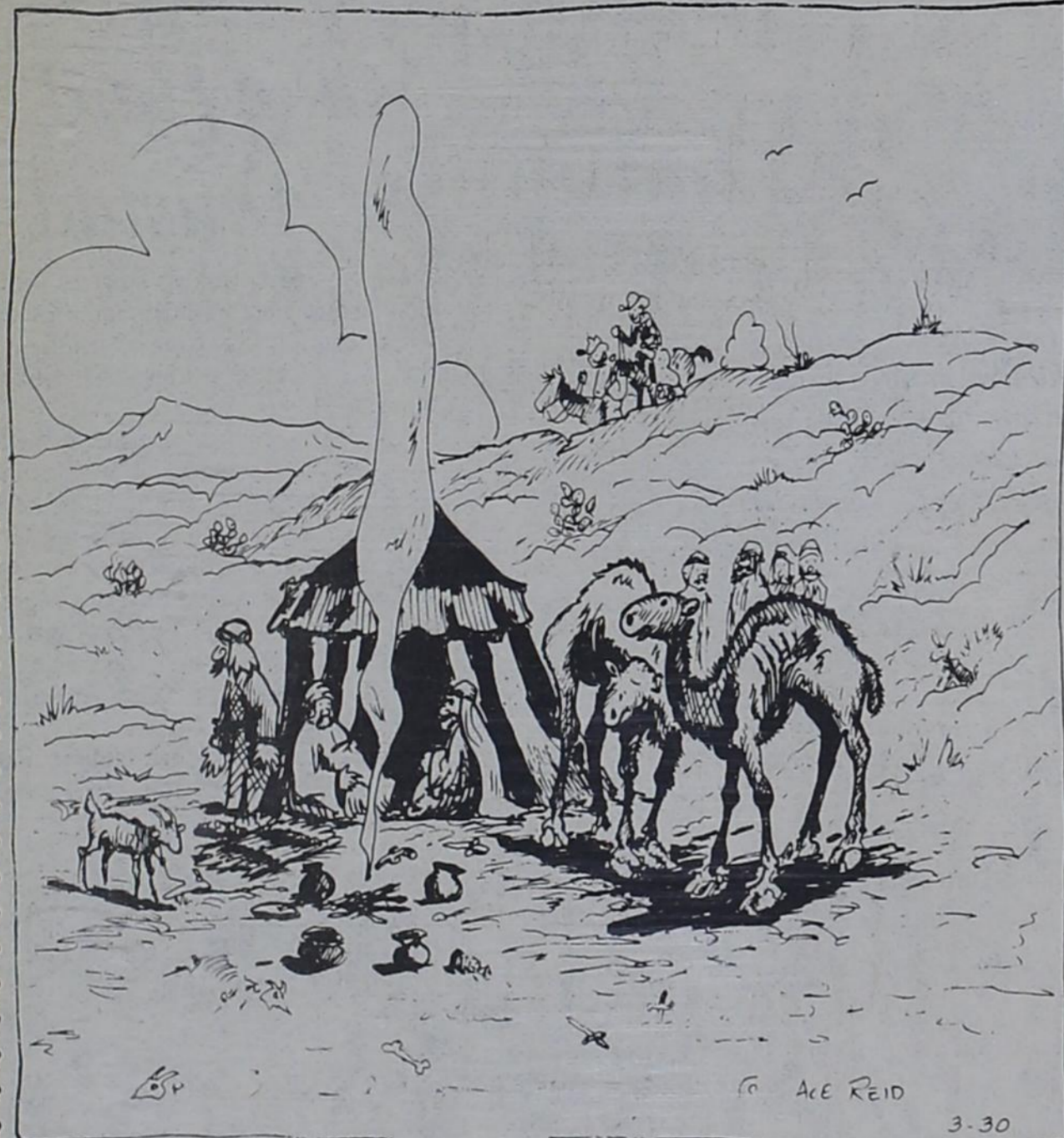

Last weekend I fixed Mexican food for all of my aunts. While I was looking for a Guacamole salad recipe I came across this great hint. To keep the Guacamole from turning dark while it is waiting to be served, save the large pit from the avocados and bury them in the salad. It works! Not one dark spot on the salad.

Here is the recipe I used:
3-5 avocados
1/4 teaspoon garlic, grated
1 small onion, grated
1 teaspoon salt (to taste)
1-2 tomatoes
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Red pepper sauce (to taste)

Select soft avocados. Peel and mash with the lemon juice, onion and garlic. (I found a pastry blender does a better job of mashing than a fork). Chop tomatoes fine and add with salt and red pepper. Serve on shredded lettuce or as a dip. Mayonnaise may be added if you like.

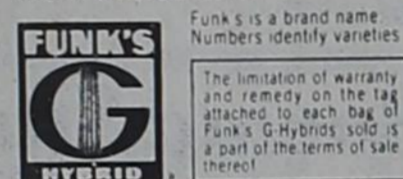

Beef dishes will be judged on the basis of taste, appearance, originality, ease of preparation and practicality.



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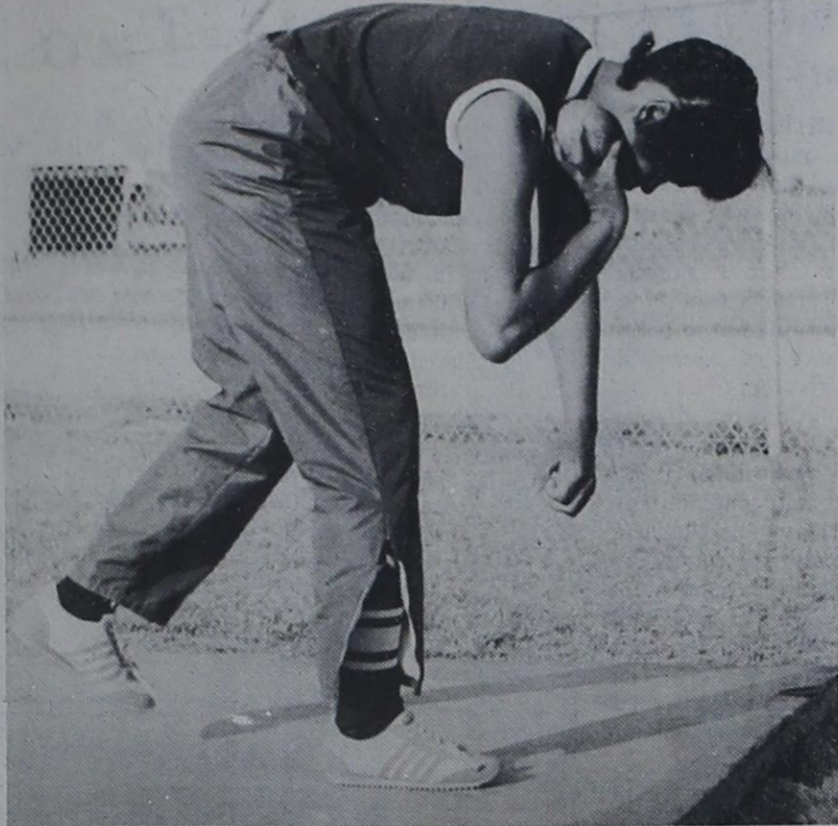
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TSTI Sets Career Day In Bovina

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Jesus' Certainty

What is the source of our faith? Jesus! But is He really the source of our faith? You say, "Well, yes." All right, what about Him? Is it the fact that He was born in Bethlehem? On The Farm In Parmer County

By SETH RALSTON

Since most crops have diseases that are carried through the non-growing season on crop residue, farmers should practice residue management along with crop rotation to reduce the chances of diseases in next year's crop.

Populations of disease-causing organisms build when a susceptible crop is present and conditions are favorable for development. Most rotation programs will lower pathogen populations. However, under intensified production when the same crop is grown year after year, special steps have to be taken to avoid organism buildup, often at a high cost.

In minimum tillage systems, crops are usually rotated, and this helps keep certain disease organisms at a low level. However, a few have the ability to span more than one crop or to live in organic matter that comes from most any crop.

The temperature of the interior of the sun is estimated at 20 million degrees Fahrenheit.

Most disease-causing organisms require oxygen for survival. When crop residue is on the surface, they have no difficulty staying alive. Once crop residue is buried deeply, organisms that require little oxygen for survival go to work while disease-causing organisms soon die.

Some producers like to maintain a certain amount of crop residue on the surface as a mulch for water conservation and wind erosion control. This works satisfactorily if residue is kept out of the seed furrow at seeding time. Otherwise, seedling diseases may be more severe.

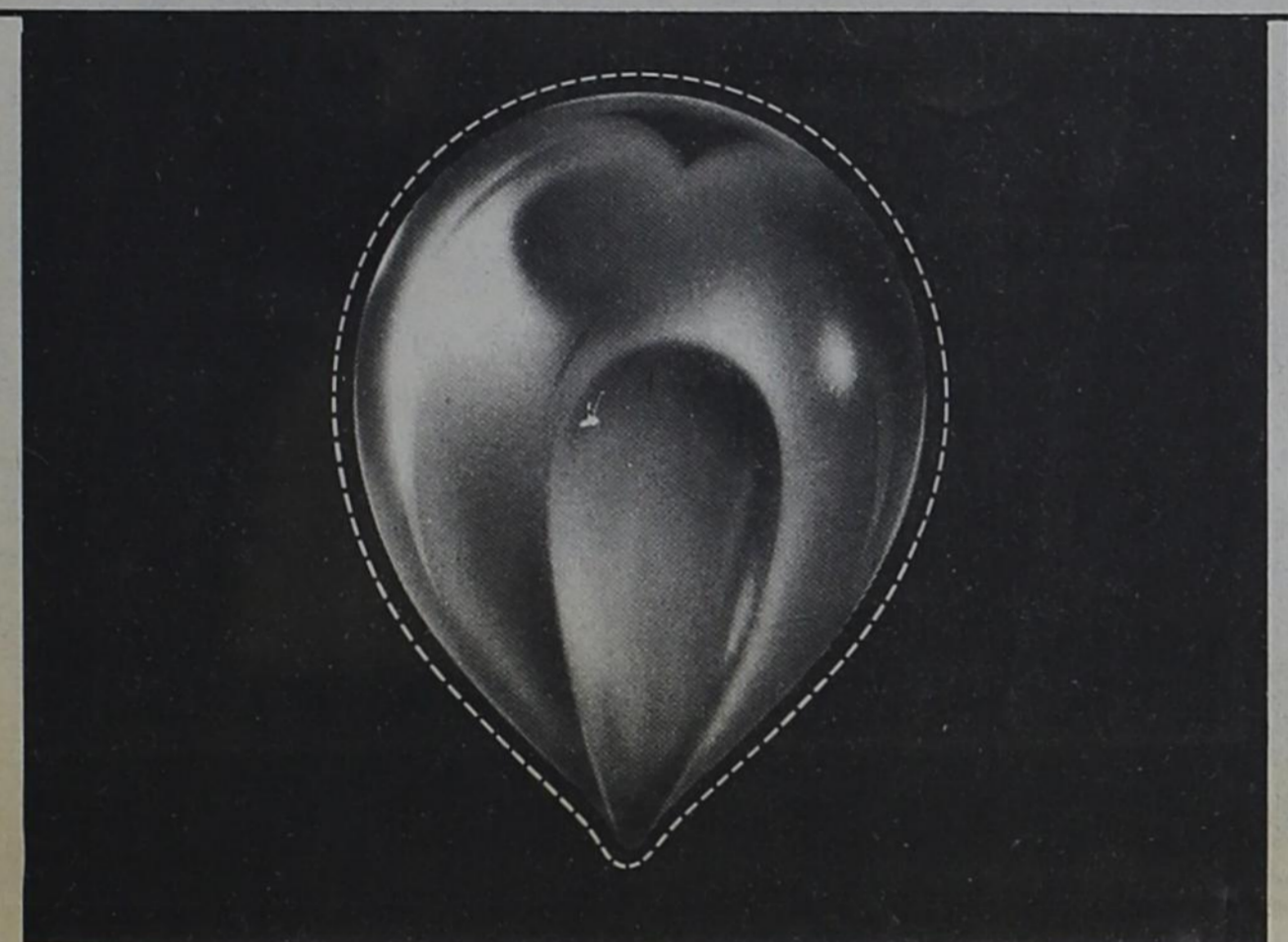
