Grazing Assns.

Farmers and cattlemen are acquiring needed land resources by forming grazing associations and obtaining financial assistance from the Farmers Home Administration, the agency's Donley County Supervisor, Claude Moore, has announced.

A grazing association is composed of a group of family farmers and ranchers who join together to acquire and develop land to provide seasonal grazing for livestock belonging to its members.

Eligible to form associations are neighboring farmers and ranchers who operate family size units. Financial and technical assistance is provided by the Farmers Home Administration.

Loans are available to qualified borrowers for periods up to 40 years at an interest rate of 5 percent. Interested individuals should con-

tact Claude Moore, County Supervisor, at the Agriculture Building in Clarendon, form a steering committee, and begin looking for suitable acreage.

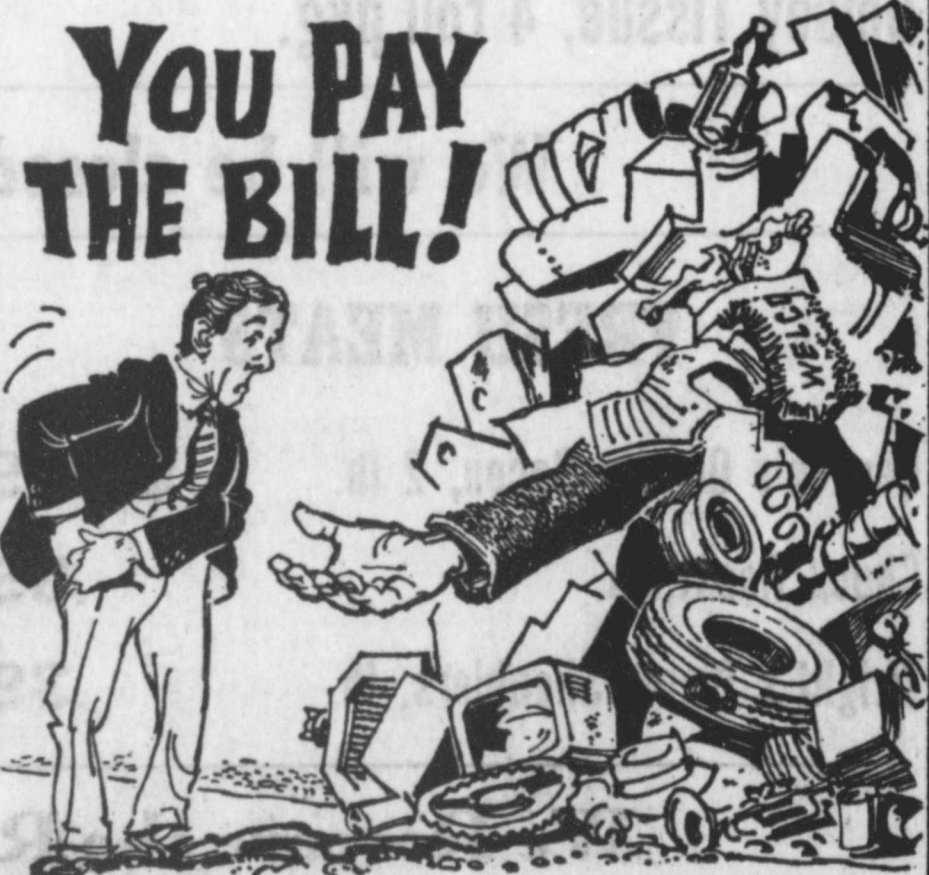

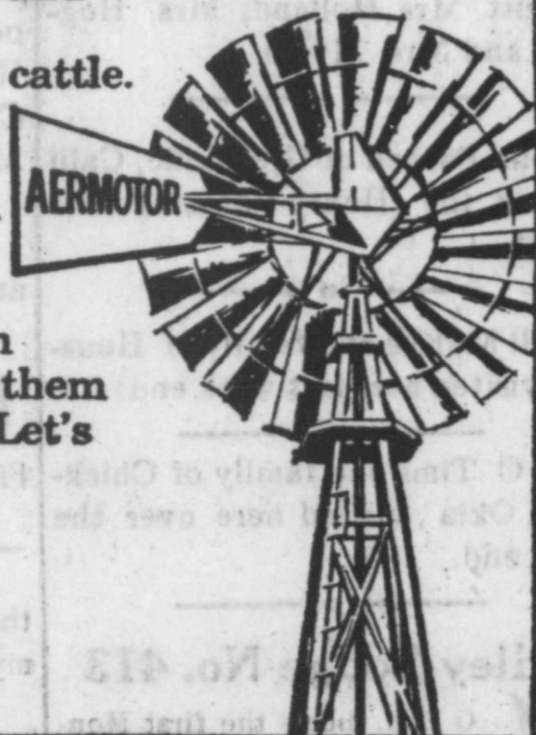
