Water Rate Increased

Due to demands by the Texas Water Development Board, the Greenbelt Water Authority has drastically raised the rate for water to the member cities, forcing each city to make a much larger charge for water than heretofore.

The rates for the City of Hedley were set at \$6.00 for the minimum of 2,000 gallons, and \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons thereafter up to 40,000 gallons, and 90¢ per 1,000 for all over that amount.

This price increase will be on your bill for September, which you will receive Oct. 1st.

This is the project for which Hedley voted 188 to 0.
